It was explained that the singing will again be held on the third Thursday night in September. Starting time will be 7 p.m.



Because of the far-reaching magnitude of the matter, I cannot hope to show all the ways people are being effected by ignorance of God's righteousness. A few examples should suffice for the honest, serious seeker of God's way to Heaven. The rest; and by far the majority will continue upon the "Broad Way" to eternal damnation — deceiving and being deceived, (Rom. 16:17, 18); allowing themselves to become "merchandise" for the blind leaders to use as a means to their end; or gain. (II Pet. 2:1-3), Our world is full of the Jim Jonses of all sectarian religions, who are making millions of dollars, much fame and glory using the blind, gullible, simple and weak. How tragic indeed, seeing that God's way, His "highway" is so plain and easy to follow that — "Wayfaring men, though fools, shall not err therein" (Isa. 35:8).

First, the establishers of their own righteousness, (Rom. 10:3) say in effect: I can make my own door into God's Kingdom. It doesn't make any difference what church you belong to, the church won't save you anyway; there will be people saved out of all the churches; we just don't all interpret the Bible the same way. Sounds real righteous doesn't it? Much better than those old narrow statements recorded in some Bibles; I just won't read them any more because they hurt my feelings, I'll get me a - Good news for modern man, or some other recent edition of the Bible that changes those unpleasant statements so they sound the way I know they should sound. Besides, more people will make it to heaven my way, through my door. Is this what the apostle Paul had in mind when he recorded the righteousness of God: (Eph. 4:17-18)? It reads: "This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind, Having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart:"

Please take a good reliable Bible — one that is not a one man translation: no more than a commentary and scripture interpolation, and study the following scriptures as they pertain to the subject under consideration. (John 10:1-9; Matt. 16:17, 18; Rom. 16:16; Acts 2:47; I Tim. 3:15; Col. 1:17, 18; John 17:21; I Cor. 1:10; Rom. 12:5; Gal. 3:28; Eph. 4:4-6). Only a blind and dishonest person can miss the righteousness of God in a study of those scriptures.







The Book of Revelation tells us that they will have "one mind, and shall give their power and strength unto the Beast. (The soon coming World Ruler.) Today we see fulfillment of these prophecies beginning to come to pass. The Common Market of Europe now has nine nations. Unless something unforseen happens Greece will probably become the tenth nation; making Daniel's prophetic number complete. (Dan. 7:7, 3) Greece did sign a treaty with the ECM, May 28, 1979. The next step will be the acceptance of Greece into the ECM. It has been reported that the Roman Catholic and the Greek Orthodox Churches have just recently resumed diplomatic relations. This act suggests a more complete unity and the inevitable acceptance of Greece into the ECM. The development of this union follows Daniel's prophetic guidelines exactly. They are standarizing their monetary system, scholastic systems and common citizenship. Notice also that the whole world is conforming to the metric system. In a one world government these systems would need to be standard.

Some other conditions that line up with these end-time prophecies include the United Nations and the Ecumenical World Council of Churches. This could give rise to the one-world government and the one-world church system. Rev. 17:13 states that ten nations will give all their power to one man, the Beast, the one-world ruler (Antichrist) whom God has foretold us about. In Rev. 17:8 we are told that this Beast will ascend out of the "bottomless pit" and "they that dwell on the earth shall wonder". Many will believe in him and even worship him as God. This Antichrist world ruler will make war on the Saints of God and overcome them. (Dan. 7:25) (Rev. 13:7-10). He will have power over all kindreds, tongues and nations. No one will be able to make war with him. (Rev. 13:4-8) After the rise of the Beast we see the rise of the False Prophet (Rev. 13:11-18) who will enslave the minds and souls of men. The second Beast' will be similar in many ways to the first. The first Beast is a political leader while the second Beast is a religious leader. Notice the first Beast rises from the SEA; which is from the unrest of troubled nations. (Rev. 17:5 — The waters (sea) which you saw...are peoples and multitudes and nations and tongues.) Notice the second Beast rises from the E'ARTH. Having religious power he will merge all religions together. In Rev. 13:11 we see he has two horns like a Lamb, showing he will try to imitate Jesus Christ. Many will fall for his deception. From all of this Satan has set up a blasphemous imitation of the Tribune God. The first Beast will proclaim himself God. The second Beast will masquerade as the Messiah. The liberated demons (Rev. 16:13, 14) will imitate the power of the Holy Spirit. The False Prophet will have as much power as the Antichrist. The False Prophet will: (1) exercise unlimited authority (Rev. 13:12); (2) force people to worship the Roman Antichrist (verse 12); (3) perform great miracles (verse 13); (4) deceive the population (verse 14); (5) make a seven year covenant with Israel (Dan. 9:27); (6) force the people to worship the Antichrist's image in the Temple (Rev. 13:14); (7) murder all non-conformists (verse 15); (8) force the people to receive the "mark of the Beast" (verse 16).

Regarding the "Mark of the Beast" in Rev. 13:16-18, this mark will be in their right hand or in their forehead. No one can buy or sell who doesn't have this mark. It will be a MARK of the NAME of the Antichrist or the NUMBER of his name; the number 666. Our society is dominated by numbers, and since everyone must have a social security number, this could be the vehicle used to usher us into receiving that 'fatal mark". In Rev. 14:9-11 we learn the consequences of taking that mark; eternal doom in the lake of fire!

People have been anticipating these "last days" for so many years that it's hard to believe we could actually be the generation that witnesses it. But prophetic events are falling together so fast that we have to heed what Christ himself said: "So likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors. Verily I say unto you, This generation shall not pass till all these things be fulfilled." (Matt. 24:25)
