

## 125 Scholars Claim Places On School's Last Honor Roll

## Democratic Runoff Vote Is Saturday

A light vote is expected in Callahan County in the Democratic Runoff Primary Election scheduled to be held Saturday.

Only three races will be on the ballot, all to decide judgeships. There is no county or regional races to spark interest. There was only one county-wide race in the Primary last May 3 which saw just 345 voters go to the polls in Cross Plains and 2,275 across the county. That contest was between incumbent Sheriff Bill Skinner of Baird who rebuffed a challenge by newcomer to county politics, Adrian Huddleston of the Clyde area.

Voting Saturday will be held in Cross Plains in the City Hall, and polls will be open here across the state from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

First on the ballot for Democratic nominee will be contest between John C. Phillips and James P. "Jim" Wallace for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1.

W. T. Phillips and Mike McCormick are battling for the Democratic nomination for

Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, and Edith Roberts and Tom Davis are vying for nomination for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3.

Absentee balloting closed Tuesday in the runoff election, and Callahan County Clerk Darlene Walker reported only one absentee vote had been cast. "Oh, we mailed out 12," the county official stated, "but none of them have been returned."

Alton E. Hornsby, Precinct 3 Democratic Chairman, asked those voters who come to the polls Saturday to please have registration cards handy. "It makes the balloting quite some easier," he explained. It was also pointed out that any eligible voter, except those who voted in

the Republican Primary last month may vote in Saturday's runoff. "You did not have to vote in the first primary to vote Saturday," Hornsby stated.

Other precinct votes will be held in the following sites: Baird Precinct 1, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 2, Lions Club Building; Putnam Precinct 4, Community Center; Eula Precinct 5, Eula School; Denton Valley Precinct 6, Denton Baptist Church, Oplins Precinct 7, Community Center, and Clyde Precinct 8, Clyde High School Cafeteria.

Republicans will not have a runoff election.

There will be no election board maintained at the Review due to the lack of local races.

## Sale Of Controlling Stock In Local Bank Is Asked

Controlling stock ownership in the Citizens State Bank of Cross Plains could be changing hands in the near future.

It was reported in an area daily paper last Friday that the State Banking Department had received an application by Marshall Newcomb of Abilene and James H. Odom of Tuscola to acquire control of the Citizens State Bank.

The application was filed Monday, May 19.

The daily paper also stated that no public hearing will be held on the application unless it is disapproved by Banking Commissioner Robert E. Stewart.

It was explained by a spokesman for the State Banking Commission in Austin that a ruling is ordinarily made on such an application in 30 days or less. It was added that if no ruling is made on the transaction in

30 days, it is considered approved.

Jack W. Tunnell, president of the Citizens State Bank, noted Tuesday that a complete report of the transfer of control will be made as soon as "there is something to report," referring to okay or disapproval of the proposal by the Commissioner.

Newcomb is presently a member of the board of directors of the bank here.

## Beadels Deal Buffs First LL Loss; Cats Challenge

The Beadels dealt the league-leading Buffs first loss of the season in Cross Plains Little League play last week. Cats bats boomed for 34 runs, 17 in each game, and remained just one game off the pace in early standings.

Action started last week with the Beadels scoring four runs in the bottom of the third on three walks and two singles overcoming a 4-1 deficit at the hands of the Buffs. Each team got a run in the first and Buffs claimed the edge in top of the third with three runs on two singles and four free passes. Buffs almost tied the score in the top of the fourth, but failed for the final 5-4 tally.

Cats beat the Kilowatts 17-7 in Tuesday's nightcap. Kilos surged to a 4-0 advantage in first half-inning, but Cats claimed a 5-4 edge in home half of the frame. Kilos scored two unearned runs in the second, but Cats rallied for 11 scores in the second as 16 batters trekked to the plate, collecting five singles and seven walks. Cats got another run in the third for the final 17-7 score.

In Pee Wee action on Tuesday, May 27, the Cubs nipped the Giants 6-5. In the same league on Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m. the Angels claimed a share of the league lead with a 2-1 three-inning victory over the Cubs. Both squads own 3-1 records.

Cats resumed scoring in the curtain-raiser Thursday posting

a 17-5 victory over the Beadels. Eleven of those runs came in the first inning when seven singles were recorded along with a like number of free passes. Beadels tallied two unearned runs in the second and three more in the fourth. Cats padded the lead in the second with three runs, another in the third and two more in the fourth.

## Update Given On County Tax Appraisal District

(Editor's Note: Following is an article authored by John D. Montgomery of Cross Plains, who is the representative of Cross Plains School District on the directorate panel of the Callahan County Tax Appraisal District.)

"This (county-wide tax appraisal districts) is something that was mandated by Senate Bill 621 in the last session of the Texas Legislature. All counties in the state must be in compliance by Jan. 1, 1982. It is not something the school boards, city councils and commissioners courts thought of. It takes assessing taxes away from local governments and centralizes it in one office per county. This office will do everything but figure the actual taxes and collect them for each taxing unit in the county. There are nine taxing units in Callahan County. We will still have to have a tax collector unless we vote by referendum to have the central office do this also.

"The last time the board of directors met, which there are five in the county, most all tax assessors, (school) superintendents and some city governments were represented at the meeting. We asked them to meet

with us to try to get an idea what it would cost to operate the office the first year. Estimates were from \$200,000 to \$300,000. Each taxing unit will be assessed a per cent of the operation of this office in relation to the percentage of taxes assessed in the county. Cross Plains Schools assesses about 15 per cent of the taxes on county property, so we would be assessed \$30,000 as our share per year at the lower estimate of \$200,000 plus total cost of records of this school district on property outside the county which will probably be about another \$15,000 per year unless the percentage change, which they will from year to year. This would not count reappraisal which is also required by Jan. 1, 1982, and if outside appraisers are hired, it would add another \$35,000-\$40,000 to our school taxes. All property is supposed to be reappraised every five years.

"The City of Cross Plains assesses .98 (less than one per cent) of the taxes in the district so they would be assessed an additional \$2,000 for their share of office operation plus a share of reappraisal, however it is done. These figures will be reflected

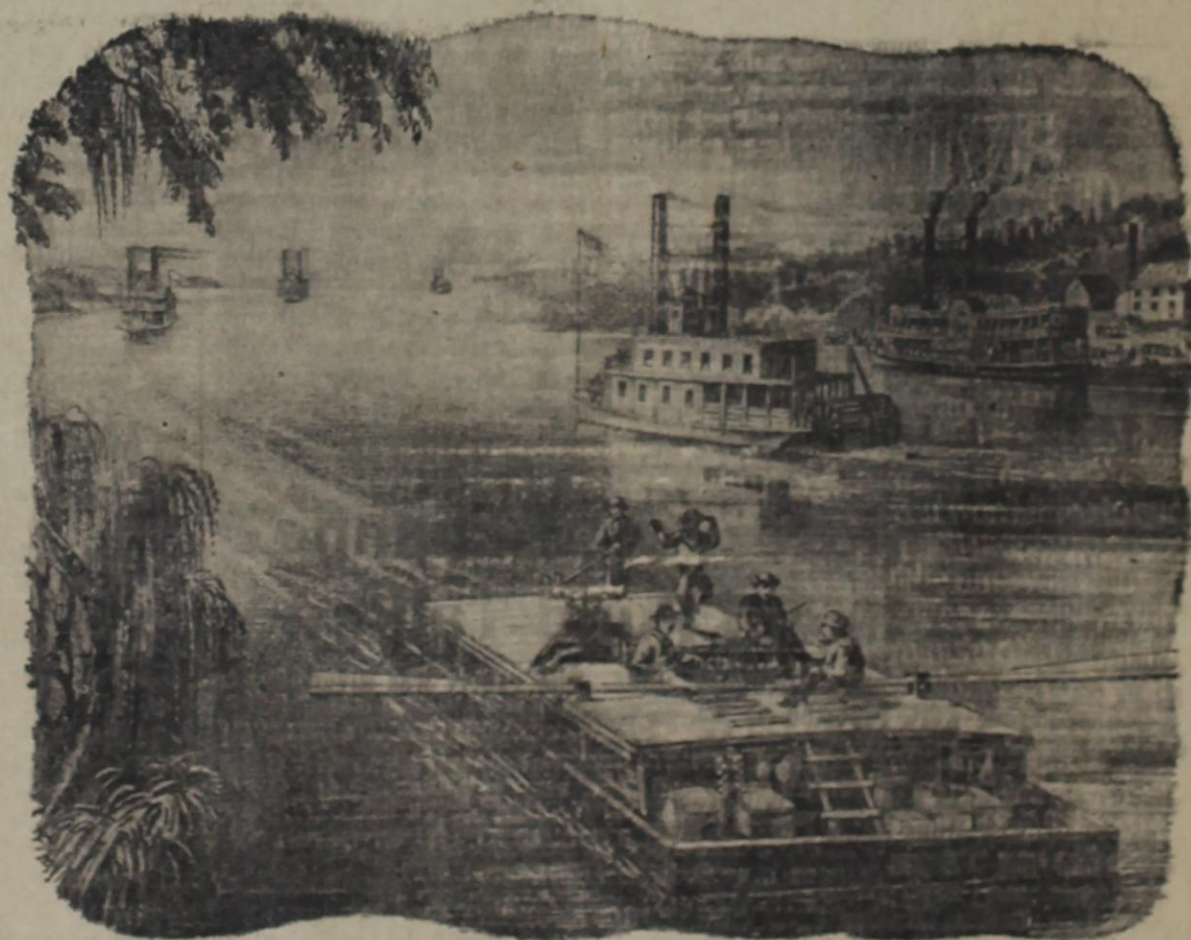

## Stenholm Bill Would Aid Royalty Owners

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that a major effort is now underway in the Congress to exempt small royalty owners from the recently enacted windfall profits tax.

Stenholm recently introduced legislation which would exempt the royalty owner of up to 10 barrels-per-day of royalty interest under the windfall tax. The bill, H. R. 7211, is similar to one Congressman Keith Sibelius, R. Kansas, introduced about the same time.

Stenholm said that he and Representative Sibelius have decided to join forces in an effort to improve the chances of getting the legislation through Congress. While he expects passage to be an uphill battle, Stenholm said he believed many representatives in the Congress are beginning to realize the need to deal with some of the "injustices" of the windfall profits tax.

"I don't believe that the American landowner should be penalized simply because his land contains natural resources, whether it be oil, natural gas, or coal," Stenholm said. "This country was founded on the strong belief in the free enterprise system and the right to private ownership of property."

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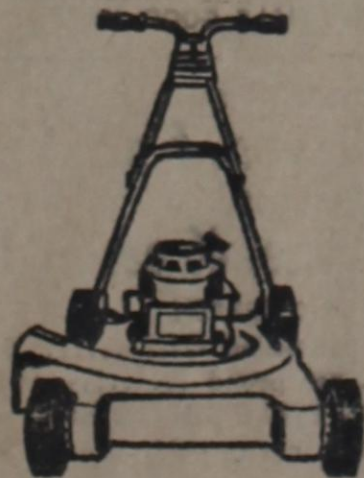

After a wedding trip to San Antonio, the couple will live at 48491 South 5th in Abilene.

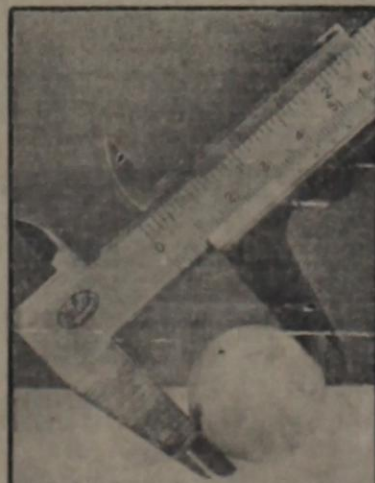

Each person you meet has an interesting and unique life story, once it is told. So it was with Mrs. Beulah Arvin who lacks only six months being one hundred years old. My interview with her at the Colonial Oaks Nursing Home in Cross Plains revealed only a brief outline of her long and interesting life. More visits would be necessary to get a full story of her life. I became better acquainted when I visited earlier in the week. Her love for singing was shown when she joined me and Mrs. Bell Barr at the piano. Some of her favorite songs were "What a Friend," "Amazing Grace," and "Fanny J. Crosby's 'Rescue the Perishing.'" On that visit I inquired as to what she attributed her long life. Her reply was, "The Good Lord."

I made a later appointment to interview her more fully about her life. I found this little brown-eyed lady, with slightly graying hair, dressed in a pretty pinkish dress, all smiles and ready to talk. Her manner of speech brought laughter to us several times.

Mrs. Beulah Arvin was born Nov. 24, 1880, in Lee County, east of Austin. Their trading post was McDade in adjoining Bastrop County. She lived there until she was grown. She began an itinerary which took her into several states before settling at Cottonwood. She and a brother and wife, and a sister and husband started, by covered wagon train, to Crowell, Texas. They passed through Brannon Wells, Cottonwood and to Turkey Creek where they visited an uncle, Jack Holley. They rested a few days and "the girls got some washing done."

On arriving in Baird they were forced to rent a house and await the eminent birth of her sister's baby. (This son, J. W. Cozzine, lives in Houston at this time.) After her sister's recovery from unexpected complications, part of the group proceeded to Crowell. She, her sister and children went back to the Holley's place intending to follow the others later.

Mrs. Arvin had a lifetime scholarship in bookkeeping to Nixon Clay Commercial College. She remained at Cottonwood for four years, where she was trying to decide whether to be a nurse, or a school teacher. She decided to go to Houston where she learned the Gregg System of shorthand. ("I still like that system," she said.)

The link in her story was missing at this time, but it seems she returned to Cottonwood after four years in Houston. She had been promised a job with Lee Automobile Tire Co. within a year. Her intention was to return to Houston. A fortune teller told her she would never go back to Houston. You'll be in a little town in the Northwest, and that she would lose some money. She attended a party where she met Mr. Arvin. After that, she said, "I don't want to go to Houston." She married Major Arvin on Nov. 17, 1924. She and Mr. Arvin traveled to California, Arkansas, to Rio Grande Valley, always "prospecting." They bought a home in Cottonwood, but decided to go back to California, where they worked in the grape harvest ("two bunches would fill a hamper.") On their return trip they visited an aunt

in El Paso, came to Collingsworth County where they visited her sister.

They were living in Rising Star when Mr. Arvin died suddenly. At the time of his death she was thrown into a state of shock which lasted for several days. Mrs. Arvin could tell me no more of the chain of events. She came to the Cross Plains Rest Home in 1977.

After a brief rest for her, I asked, "Is there any special event in your life you would like to tell me?" She thought a minute and said, "Yes, I attended Abilene Christian University when it was called, 'The Children's Classical Institute.'" Also, "I was baptized into the Church of Christ, in Millam Lake, when I was a young lady."

At this point I told her and her roommate goodbye, with a promise of visiting her again. I left her with that same smile she greeted me with.

on our next tax statement. "We will have to decide how we will reappraise within about a month so we can work up a budget in order for us to let each taxing unit know their share of this before they start working on next year's budget so it can be added in."

"The county assesses about 19 per cent of the taxes in the district and each county taxpayer will also help pay the county's share of this office operation plus the county's share on the reappraisal."

"I don't think any of the board members are overjoyed with the tax prospects in the future, but the other four are good, honest conservative men, and it will hurt us as well as everyone else. I know we will be real cost conscious and do the best we can. If any of you have any ideas about reappraisal I would be glad to talk to you."

"As things progress I will keep you informed through our local newspaper."

**Remind Local Peanut Producers Of Cutoff**

Cross Plains area peanut handlers are reminding peanut producers of this area that the cutoff date for contracting additional poundage 1980 crop peanuts is Monday, June 16. That is the date the forms must be in the county ASCS office.

It was explained that this year the acreage allotment poundage quota forms must be signed by both the operator and producer if they are not the same.

It was also stressed by local handlers that if necessary papers have not been completed by the deadline, there will be no contract with that individual producer this year. The contracting with peanut companies is on nuts produced over and above the assigned poundage on allotted acreages.
