School Bond Sale Slated Thursday; Building Okay

Sealed bids will be opened Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in regular meeting of Cross Plains School Board for \$650,000 unlimited tax bonds.

The bid opening is the first

item on Thursday's regular meeting of the trustees for Cross Plains Independent School District.

The competitive sealed bids will be opened and read publicly

by trustees at the Homemaking Laboratory in the Elementary School Building.

Joe Smith of Abilene, representing the Southwest Company and the school's financial adviser, noted that the bonds will be sold on an "all or none" basis.

General obligation bonds, and interest and principal will be paid from proceeds of a continuing, direct annual ad valorem tax upon taxable property within the district.

It was noted that according to sale bidding information "The Board of Trustees will take action to award the Bonds (or reject all bids) promptly after the opening of bids."

Cross Plains Trustees approved plans for a new high school building in a resolution last Thursday. They also agreed to open bids for construction of the facility at 4 p.m. Thursday, August 7.

Bond sale will be first item on Thursday's agenda following the prayer opening the 7:30 p.m. session.

The agenda was released for the meeting by Dr. Scot Edington, superintendent of schools, as follows: prayer; sale of bonds, considering passage of an order authorizing issuance of bonds and approving the official statement;

minutes; bills; Title I program; housing classes and offices 1980-81; plans for new high school facility; student handbook; set dates for budget workshop; personnel (executive session), custodian, personnel contracts.

No Lawn Watering, Please City Pleads

City Council, Mayor O. B. Edmondson and Billy D. Dillard, city utilities superintendent, all are pleading with citizens of Cross Plains not to water lawns.

City asked for a voluntary halt on lawn water last week when water usage was surpassing pumping capabilities. At that time Cross Plains consumers were using about 30,000 gallons more water than maximum pumping capabilities, therefore depleting reserves needed for emergencies such as a major fire. Usage was peaking at 300,000 to 305,000 gallons.

After the request for voluntary cutback, water consumption dropped somewhat, and Dillard reported about 100,000 gallons returned to storage. Continued hot weather, however, pushed water usage back above pumping capabilities Sunday and Monday.

Dillard qualified that statement explaining that the extended continuous pumping of the wells, has weakened them and pumping maximum is down to about 260,000 daily. Consumption, however, was up to 275,000 gallons on Sunday and on Tuesday Dillard reported about a 20,000 gallon loss Monday and Monday night.

All city officials are pleading for continued voluntary ban on all lawn watering.

Council does not wish to place mandatory limits on water usage, and Edmondson and Dillard both explained that if lawns are not watered, there should be enough for all other uses.

Cross Plains and much of the State of Texas was sweltering through its third week of extremely hot, dry weather. Temperatures most of these days were near or exceeded 100 degrees.

Lack of rain is hurting almost all aspects of agriculture. Most crops are suffering, especially milo and hay crops. Gardens and

pasture grazing is burning up, and in some places stock water is already getting low.

Last rain fell here June 19-22 when light to heavy showers were received across this part of the state.

Cross Plains is using fund provided by a grant from Department of Housing and Urban Development to search for another possible water source.

Preliminary testing of an existing well on the place at Cottonwood known as the Spivey place recently rated production at 150 gallons per minute. Three test holes were scheduled to be drilled for additional test starting Tuesday.

Water taken from the existing well was tested by the City of Abilene and the quality was reported as good, according to Dillard.

Census Takers Make Final Local Rounds

Census takers are making their rounds in this area, calling at households which have not mailed back their 1980 census questionnaires. They are making telephone calls at most households which have mailed back incompletely filled out questionnaires.

Billy Yarbrough, manager of the district office in Abilene, says the round-up should be completed in the next few weeks.

"You can easily tell if someone who knocks on your door is a census taker," the manager advises. "We all wear red, white and blue identification cards with the U. S. Department of Commerce seal and 'Census Enumerator, Official Credential' printed on them, and each bears the wearer's signature. Census takers also carry large portable folders boldly lettered 'U.S. Census-1980' against a red, white and blue background. The portfolios contain maps, questionnaires, and other supplies."

Householders should promptly report to the police anyone who claims to be a census taker but cannot produce this identification.
