We have great news for all the Comanche County Electric Co-Op customers. Truett Dawkins, along with several other directors of the REA, were in San Antonio last Tuesday and Wednesday. On Wednesday the group went by bus to a site where the Brazos System has a lignite coal generator plant under construction to supply electricity to its 17 co-ops. One of these systems being the Comanche Co-Op. They have begun the mining operation, but the plan is not due for completion until 1981. Mr. Dawkins reports that there will be plenty of electricity for REA customers for the next 50 years even though the price of electricity may go up a few cents, we can be proud to know that we will have this service. The cost of this operation will be \$350 million; to dig this coal they have bought one shovel that cost \$9 million. This shovel takes a bite of 40 yards at a time. The other shovel, that cost \$22 million has a bigger bite. It holds 65 yards at a time. Truett said this was quite a sight to see, and he didn't think he could lift the shovel that holds just 40 yards.

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

Phone Company Notes Free Numbers

New, free-calling numbers to Continental Telephone's Baird Customer Service Center are shown on the first page of phone books just received by local residents and business people. Customers wanting to reach the telephone company are now advised to dial the Baird number direct, like any long distance call. But these calls are free.

Alan Armstrong, customer services manager for Continental Telephone, explained that a special computer program at the firm's accounting center rejects billing any calls dialed from Continental exchanges in the telephone company's Baird office. "We provide free calls to the 555-1212 director assistance numbers in the same way," he said.

Armstrong says that dialing the office direct is faster than the old way of placing "Enterprise" calls with the operator. However, if customers call from a non-Continental exchange they should call collect.

The number listed for reporting emergency telephone troubles after normal business hours is also a free call.

The new phone books contain listings for Continental Telephone customers in Cross Plains, May, and Rising Star with a separate section in the back for numbers in other exchanges. Handy information is also included such as nearby postal zip codes and calendars for 1980, 1981, and 1982.
