TAX RELIEF DEADLINE FOR 1980 IS APRIL 1

All persons who qualify for homestead exemptions on ad valorem taxes on property are reminded that deadline for signing or requesting the exemption is April 1. Persons 65 or over may request that relief, but must sign annually at respective tax offices where the exemption is sought.

Agriculture use tax requests are also granted for only one-year periods. That deadline is also April 1, and forms are available at the respective tax office where relief is sought.

up in the pole vault event. He cleared 7'-11".

Cross Plains recorded five blue ribbon finishes in the running events.

The 440-yard relay team was timed in 48.7 seconds. Winning quartet was composed of Jeff McCoy, Johnny Neeb, Chris Porter and Tony Apple.

The mile relay unit also won in a time of 4:06.0, and included Neeb, Porter, Charlie Pat Grider and McCoy.

Mites finished one and two in the 440-yard dash as Neeb won the event in 57.7, and Porter was runner-up in 58.8.

Apple won two firsts in dash events. He was timed in 23.7 in the 220-yard dash and 10.8 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

McCoy ran second in the 120-yard intermediate hurdles in a time of 19.7, and Grider was fourth in the same event in 21 seconds.

Todd Forbus was fifth in the mile run. He was timed in 5:55.0.

Precision And Accuracy In The Use Of English

A story, old when it was told in the Fifth Grade of the Montpelier, Vermont Grammar School and now some sixty-five years older is of the Professor of English at Smith College who was caught in their kitchen by his wife while kissing the maid. "John!" she gasped. "I am surprised!" "Remember your responsibilities as my wife," he admonished her. "You have surprised me and you are astonished."

Referring to the article in last week's Review headed "Filing Deadline," the third paragraph reads ad verbum (to a word) Gravlin, local retired engineer who has been critical of the city and its operation, is contesting O. B. Edmondson, incumbent.

The following is not critical but a good humored review to clarify an ambiguous remark. It must be remembered that a Professional Engineer writing on English usage may be as out of his depth as Mayor Edmondson is when he attempts to grapple with engineering.

Local retired engineer . . . Local is used incorrectly as I was neither born nor brought up in Cross Plains and I am retired only from the Civil Service of the U.S.A. In all the fifty states and Guam, I am not certain of Puerto Rico, only a Registered Professional Engineer can legally call himself a Professional Engineer. The term engineer is meaningless as it can legally be used with sanitation, stationary and renovation to mean respectively a garbageman, a guy running a steam engine for a cotton gin or one who restuffs sofas. However, field engineer is commonly used to differentiate between a Professional Engineer working in the outdoors, usually on construction work, from a Professional Engineer called an office engineer and who works inside away from sun and rain and snow and cold and wind. The sentence should perhaps have read—Gravlin, a retired Civil Servant, has lived in Cross Plains twelve years and is a Professional Engineer.

Who has been critical of the city and its operation . . . I have never been critical of Cross Plains and never shall. It must be kept in mind that I live in Cross Plains not because of an accident of birth but because, when I was free to choose any place in the world to live, I chose Cross Plains. I am very fond of Cross Plains and love the little home I have made for myself here and hope to die in it, God willing. I am not retired as a Professional Engineer and will not be as long as I am alive and can pay the Registration Fees. . . . Brethren and sisters you have not seen criticism yet, nor the warranted castigation and correction.

I do not know how many thousands of dollars have been wasted the last three years through indefensible street work on Avenue F between Third Street and First Street and on First Street between Chestnut and Texas 206. This will be fully dealt with next


