An average of those 10 estimates would be 1,380 and that's probably very close to the final answer which is expected from part of next month.

For him it marked the end of more than a quarter of a century in the grocery business, the last 17 years of which have been with the J. R. Beadel chain. He had worked here previously for the late I. "There have been a lot of changes since I first began," he said Saturday, "a dollar which once bought a bag full of groceries now does well to pay for a single item. A family of three which used to require about \$40 worth of groceries per month now needs at least \$300. Like every other facet of American ife inflation has not overlooked the food merchant."

A large grocery store in a town like Cross Plains grossed about \$50,000 a year when Jimmie first began, whereas, the store to which he surrendered management Satur day sold well over a million dollars worth last year.

"I've gone home exhausted a lot of nights," Jimmie remembers, "but there have been mighty few days I didn't for people whose friendships I shall cherish forever. They've been great to me." enjoy.
