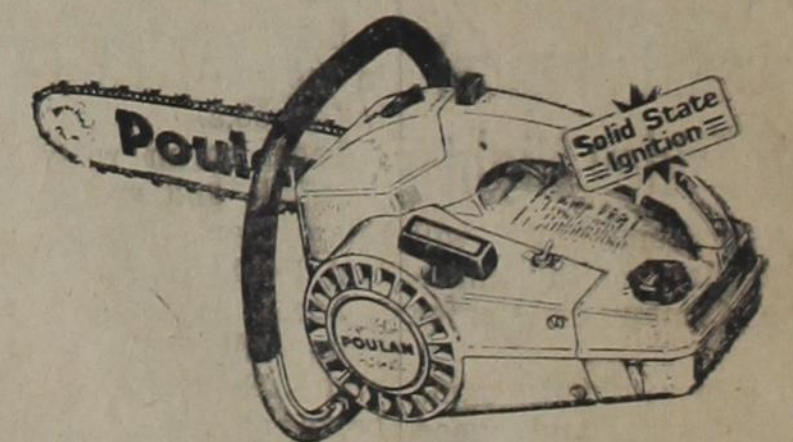

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered 3 at City Hall Building, in Cross Plains, Texas, in said School District, with Alton Hornsby as Presiding Judge and Evelyn Tyler and Helen Walker, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Peggy J. Dickson is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Cross Plains Independent School District Tax Assessor's Office, within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day, for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding

the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Alton Hornsby, as Presiding Judge, Evelyn Tyler, Helen Walker and Ethel Sims as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and

subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Callahan County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Joe E. Hanke, Jr., Randy Foster, Reggy Stover, Charles Payne, Benny Glover, John D. Montgomery, Roberta Conlee, and the following voted NO: None.

SPACE SHORT THIS WEEK
Unexpected ads forced several items to be omitted or shortened in this week's Review. They will be printed later.

POLICY STATEMENT

I promised some time ago to have printed a statement of what I would do when elected as your Mayor. A recent review of material contained in the Full Application for the HUD Community Development Block Grant of \$1,500,000 and the recent Public Notice requesting the release of those funds demands I make clear my position on such material.

I do not lie because I have neither the innate talent of a liar nor the wish to waste what little memory I have in remembering the lies I have lied. The Directorate of Engineering, USAFE, differentiated among lies.

Not strictly factual. A minor lie or perhaps only carelessness. Correct and resubmit.

Factual omissions as noted. These are sins of omission rather than commission, perhaps due to laziness or a desire to secure approval of a prohibited item. Do the required homework. Unfactual. This is an outright lie known to be a lie to the liar and an insult to the reviewer as it demeans his intelligence and/or knowledge. Future submissions will be viewed with a jaundiced eye. Tear this one up as it will never be accepted.

There exists in the community some house holders whose personal habits contribute to unsightly and deteriorated structures. This is not strictly factual. The personal habits of householders does not and can not contribute to dry rot, termite damage or painting undone because of low income or the infirmities of old age. Almost all of the trash, litter and scrap metal lying about, as well as the great piles of debris left from fires or torn down buildings is connected with the personal habits of business establishments or the dictum of Mayor Edmondson will not be picked up by City capability and the cost charged against the property owner, in accordance with Texas law.

Due to the piecemeal extension (sic) of sewer service, excessive pumping stations are required. This is factual omission. The facts are that HUD Rules and Regulations absolutely prohibit pumping stations but the proposed sewer extensions are all below any possible connection to the existing system. The homes located where they are impossible to drain to the existing system were located as they are because that land was cheaper because of the necessity of building septic tank disposal.

The factual omission is that it is not the piecemeal extension that requires pumping stations but the lower invert elevations of the proposed sewer runs. As this can not be made to fly because of the illegal pumping stations it is rejected.

Inadequate domestic water supply, year around, critical in summer requires reationing (sic). This is unfactual, in the extreme. During my twelve years in Cross Plains there has never been rationing of water. I do not believe rationing possible with an operating potable water system, not until that system is shut down for the rationing period. I have seen no

shortage of water "year around" and can not conceive how there can have ever been any during the six months of winter and spring when it rains. Last year, during the driest two months of the year and using the figures supplied by Mayor Edmondson to the Cross Plains Review there was available to every man, woman and child in Cross Plains four to five times the average requirement, including lawn watering. Any Civil Service reviewer would reject this item and direct it never be resubmitted as it is absolutely unjustified and utterly unrequired.

Mayor Edmondson signed a certification reading: "To the best of my knowledge and belief data in the preapplication/application are true and correct. If elected Mayor I would insist on that document being withdrawn as I know the data are in a great many or almost all instances untrue and incorrect. And I would never, as Mayor, a Registered Professional Engineer or as a Citizen, sign any paper, document or statement until I had assured myself it contained nothing but the truth, the whole truth and I could sign it with no mental reservation of any kind and with one hand on the Holy Bible.

If you want a Mayor who is unfactual, who deliberately turns a neat, well kept lower middle class neighborhood into a blighted area, a slum; who treads underfoot the rights of the old and the infirm, who states that he is going to impose upon Cross Plains Code Enforcement that would mean you can not run a pipe to an outside hydrant, can not install a light in your shed, can not make an addition to your home without the permission of the Municipal Building (City Hall) I know how the Masonic Building in part became the City Hall but I can not understand how or when the City Hall became the Municipal Building. If you want the preceding you now have it and you can retain it by staying home for the Democratic Primary and if your wishes then are endangered come out on Election Day to write-in your Leader.

I can not promise you blood, sweat and tears but I can promise that no one will get that to which he is not entitled, that everyone will earn any money he gets from the City, that Cross Walks will be installed, that hazardous steps and crumbling curbs will be repaired and that every effort will be made to decorate Main Street so that not only will it be a season of Joy but a remembrance of that Christ Jesus who was born on Christmas Day. Rats and mice will be reduced to the point of no economical return, I will fight to get a leash law enforced and rabies inoculations made. Finally, an agenda for Council Meetings will be published ten days before the meeting, a record will be made and published of all votes and all letters regarding violations of County, State or Federal Laws will be published immediately upon receipt.
