It was thought by local kinsmen that he might be allowed to return home first of next week if his rapid recovery continues.

City Hoping Search For Water Ending

Although no one will officially say so, most local city officials believe that the search for additional water supply for Cross Plains may be drawing to a close.

Using funds provided in a grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Cross Plains has drilled four test holes and is in the process of drilling another on the 126-acre place east of Cottonwood known as the V. I. (Slim) Spivey place. It was revealed here Tuesday that three of those test wells produced 50 to 60 gallons per minute, one was rated at 100 gallons per minute and another at 160 gallons per minute.

The fifth test well was scheduled to be completed Tuesday, but mechanical trouble with the drilling rig has postponed the completion date.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson said that pending the outcome of the last test well, the City of Cross Plains might initiate proceedings leading to the purchase of the property. "The expenditure amount to be announced when decision is made to purchase the land, will not cost local taxpayers," the mayor stated, "funds used will be provided by HUD."

Quality of the water has been previously tested by Abilene-Taylor County Health Department and was okayed.

Don't Water Lawns

City officers are continuing to ask Cross Plains residents not to water lawns, noting that demand for water is continuing to be high. Residents of the city were first asked not to water lawns on July 7 through electric media. Since that time the pleas to continue the ban on the water use has been renewed weekly through this newspaper.

Billy Dillard, city utilities superintendent, said pumping and usage of water is just about breaking even now, noting that pumping capabilities has diminished to about 260,000 gallons daily from the 34 wells in service. Most of the wells have weakened from continuous pumping, but have now about leveled off, he believes.

"If we can continue to follow the same course until the weather

er cools or we get a good rain," he opines, "then I believe we can get by without further water use curtailment."

Trace Of Rain

A trace of rain fell in Cross Plains Saturday night, but was not of sufficient amount to benefit vegetation. The sun continues to burn drying plants by surpassing the 100 degree mark daily, a condition which has become commonplace for the past month or more.

Crops are suffering from lack of moisture as is pasturage for

livestock. Water storage in eathen stock tanks is also low in some parts of the Cross Plains area. As the vegetation grows drier, hazard of wildfire increases, and local firemen have already answered numerous calls in past few days.

Only traces and a shower early July 22 which gauged .30 to almost a half-inch have fallen in this immediate area since June 22 when showers yielded from 1.50 to more than 4.50 inches in various portions of this section of the state.

55c Top School Tax Levy Without Public Hearing

A maximum tax rate of 55c per \$100 of assessed valuation may be levied by trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District for 1980 tax year without holding a public hearing on the matter.

Peggy J. Dickson, tax assessor-collector for the Cross Plains School District, advised the school board of the 55 cent maximum tax rate last week.

Last year's rate per \$100 of assessed valuation was \$1.04, but that was on a 50 per cent of market value assessment. This year's rate on taxable property will be figured on 100 per cent of market value.

It was pointed out by Mrs. Dickson that trustees are limited by state statute not to exceed by more than three per cent the tax rate of the previous year or the rate which would have been

required if assessment percentage changes.

Tax rate will be determined when trustees complete work on the 1980-81 school year budget. The board is scheduled to begin a budget workshop Wednesday night which is expected to take the next night or two to complete.

Mrs. Dickson's statement to trustees follows.

"I Peggy J. Dickson, tax assessor-collector for the Cross Plains ISD, in accordance with the provisions of Article 7244c, V.T.C.S., have calculated the tax rate which may not be exceeded by more than three (3) per cent by the governing body of Cross Plains ISD without holding a public hearing as required by Article 7244c, V.T.C.S. The rate is as follows: 55c per \$100 of assessed value."

Trustees Meet Tonight To Start Budget Work

Cross Plains Independent School District trustees are scheduled to meet Wednesday (today) at 8:30 p.m. in a special session to be held in the Home-making Laboratory of the elementary building.

Several items are listed on the agenda, which has been released by Dr. Scot H. Edington, superintendent of schools. The meeting was originally scheduled primarily to begin work on the school budget for the 1980-81 school year. That is expected to take trustees two or three sessions to complete. It is expected that the board will attempt to complete that undertaking this week. Another major portion of Wednesday's session is expected to be taken with bids on services, housing classes and administrators for the upcoming school year, and personnel.

The following agenda was released by Dr. Edington: housing classes and offices, Vaughn Pirtle; Horace Mann Insurance representative, Alan Holcomb; certify the tax roll, Peggy Dickson; consider bids on oil, gasoline, flats, paper goods, janitorial supplies, typewriter cleaning, milk,

etc.; consider lunch and breakfast prices; accreditation report; personnel (executive session), and budget workshop.

Both were rushed to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by Cross Plains EMS ambulance. Newsom was pinned in the wreckage about 30 minutes.

Warrants for arrest of the driver of the Chevrolet pickup, who left the scene on foot and had not been found at midmorning Tuesday. His identity had not been revealed by Department of Public Safety Patrolman Don Gosnell of this city Tuesday morning.

Both vehicles were destroyed and both caught fire. One was extinguished by a passerby, and EMS member Mike McClure put out the other.

Local authorities and volunteers searched the area for some time Monday looking for two persons then believed in the pickup. It is now believed only one person was in the vehicle.

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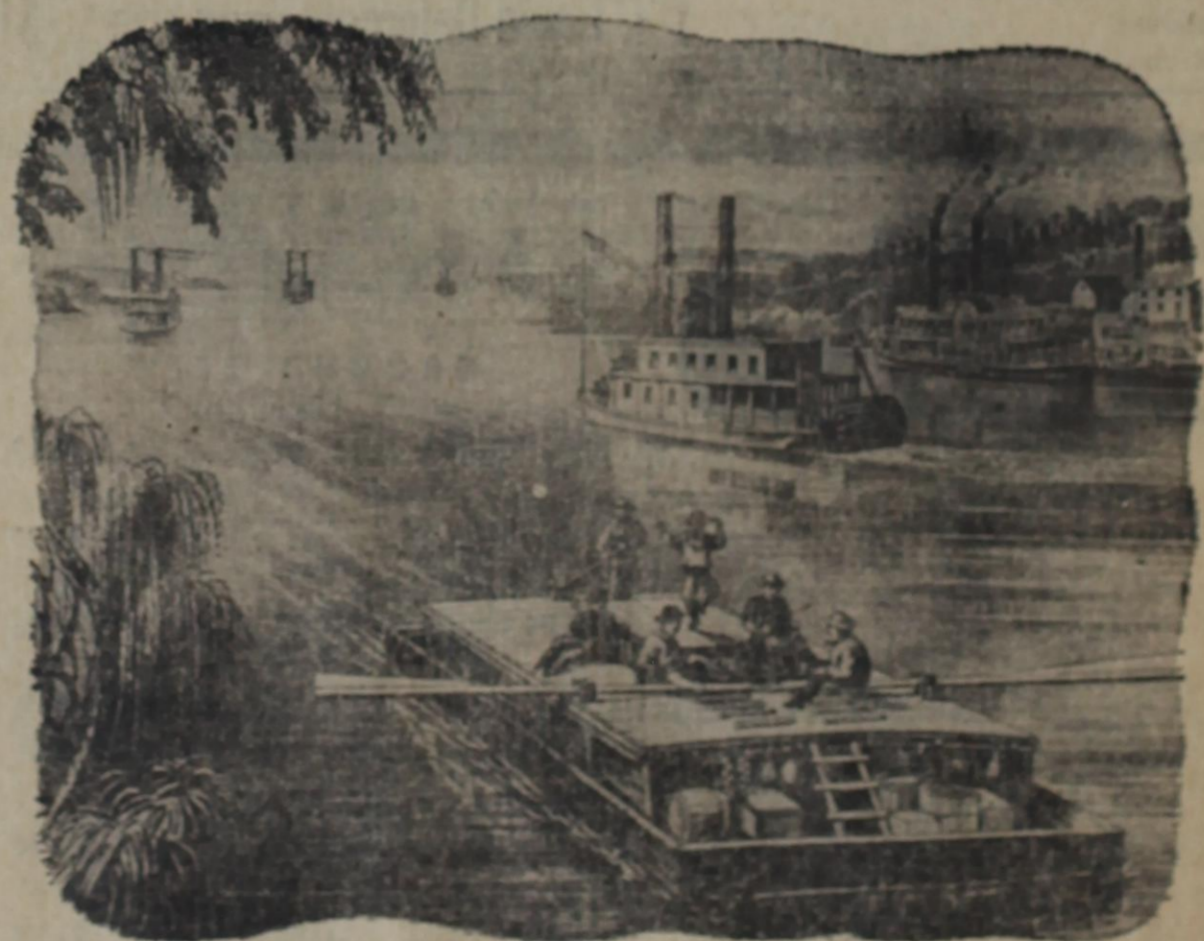

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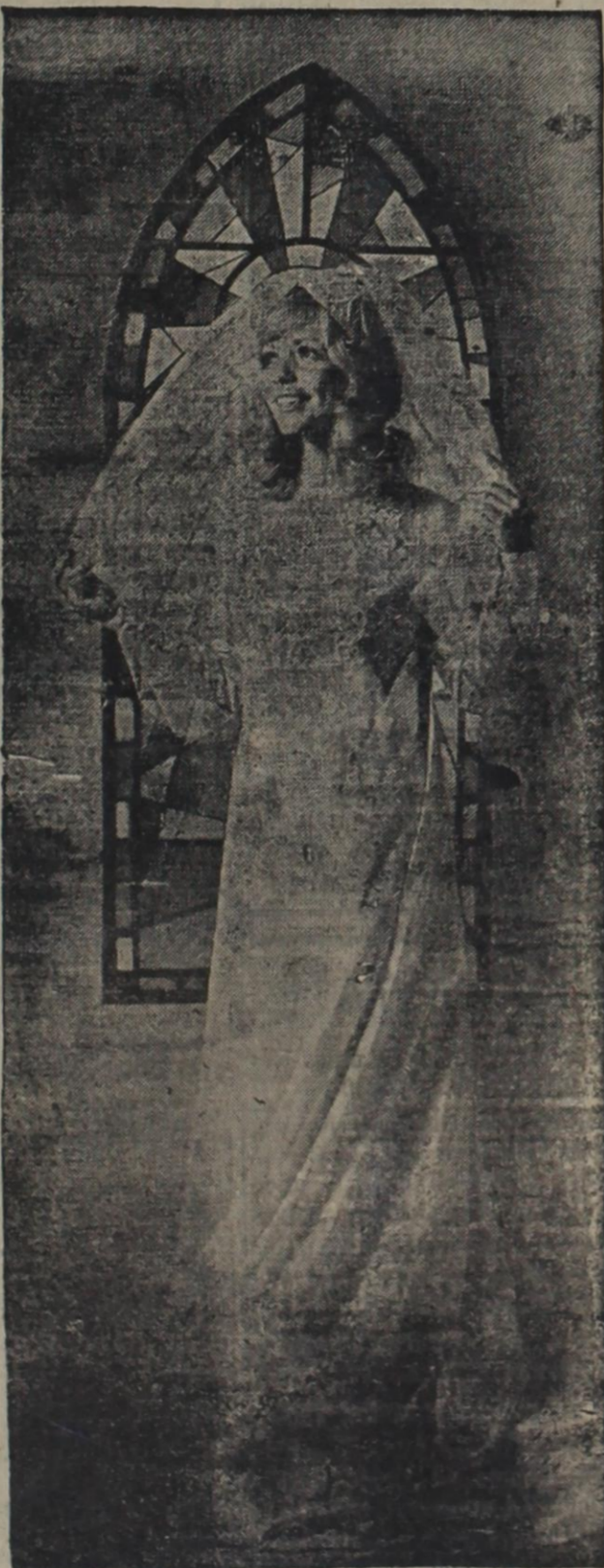
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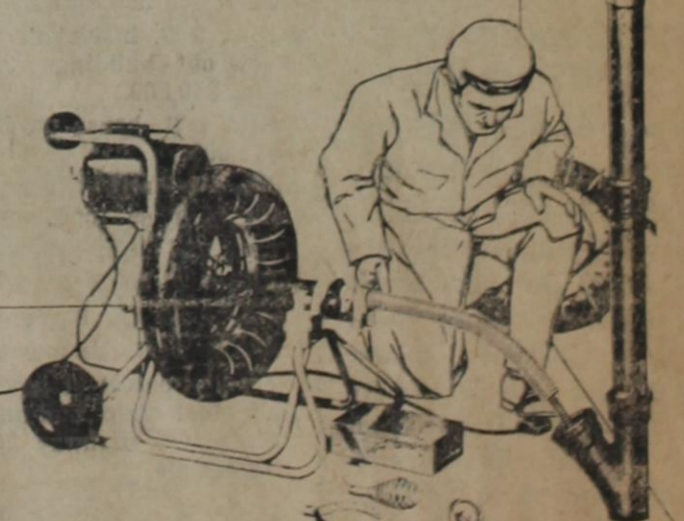
