A fifth candidate has filed in the upcoming election for three seats on the Cross Plains School Board.

Latest to return signed application is Mike Kelley, local contractor and minister.

He joins the three incumbents, Roberta Conlee, Randy Foster and John D. Montgomery, plus Billy L. Reed, another newcomer to local politics, in the race for the three places on the board.

There were no new aspirants for places on the Cross Plains City Council during the past week. The three incumbents, O. B. Edmondson, who seeks return as mayor, and W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy and Ray Purvis, both seeking re-election as aldermen, all remain unchallenged.

Both elections are scheduled for Saturday, April 5, and candidates have until 30 days prior to the election, March 5, to file with names to be printed on the ballot.

Voting Is Underway In Beef Referendum

Voting began Tuesday in the beef referendum designed to approve or reject organization of a beef board whose duty it will reportedly be to offer self help to the cattle industry.

Voting will continue through Friday, Feb. 22, at ASCS offices across Texas. It was reported that 40,220 Texas cattlemen registered January 23 through February 6 to vote in the referendum.

Approval of the question will take at least 50 per cent of those registered voting and a simple majority of those voting approving.

If the referendum passes funding will be through investment of 20 cents per \$100 sales on cattle which will raise an estimated \$30 to \$40 million to be used by a beef board comprised of 60 cattlemen from across the nation. Secretary of Agriculture will confirm board appointees submitted from cattle industry nominations, and assure funds are spent within the law. Those not wishing to participate will have contributions refunded.

County Junior Livestock Show Set Here Saturday

Annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will be held Saturday, February 23, at the show barn north of Cross Plains, according to Scotty Mitchell of Baird, president of the association.

The show will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 23, with judging of the sheep classes followed by goats, swine, dairy cattle and beef cattle. Judging of the rabbits and poultry will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will be judged by James Coalson of Abilene. Bobby Lemons of Colorado City will judge the remainder of the classes.

myself. I am in here and they have cut all my checks... I have been sick... and worried... because I don't like living here... I want to do my own housework and cooking. Everybody says I am too old but I don't feel that way, I feel a person should be free and do the things they like to do. Here I only eat and sleep and I would enjoy doing my own housework and cooking so I hope they will build some apartments because I need some peace and I love to live in Cross Plains.

I am writing on my lap as I don't have a decent place to write a decent letter. I'm so happy you are trying to help the elderly in Cross Plains. I have always loved that place and I had good health there but I don't feel good here and have never felt welcome. All the people seem to like me and put me first but I don't like it here so will cease. All I do here is piece quilts and crochet to pass the time. Just wish I was back in C. P.; that will always be my home even if I never get back alive. You must be tired hearing me and my troubles so by for now. Your Friend"

If the above gets some Reverend of Business lady off dead center and charging dead gallop on a course that will insure no other active, alert, competent and capable eighty year old, born and brought up in Cross Plains, male or female is forced to leave because there is "no room in the inn" my work will have been justified.

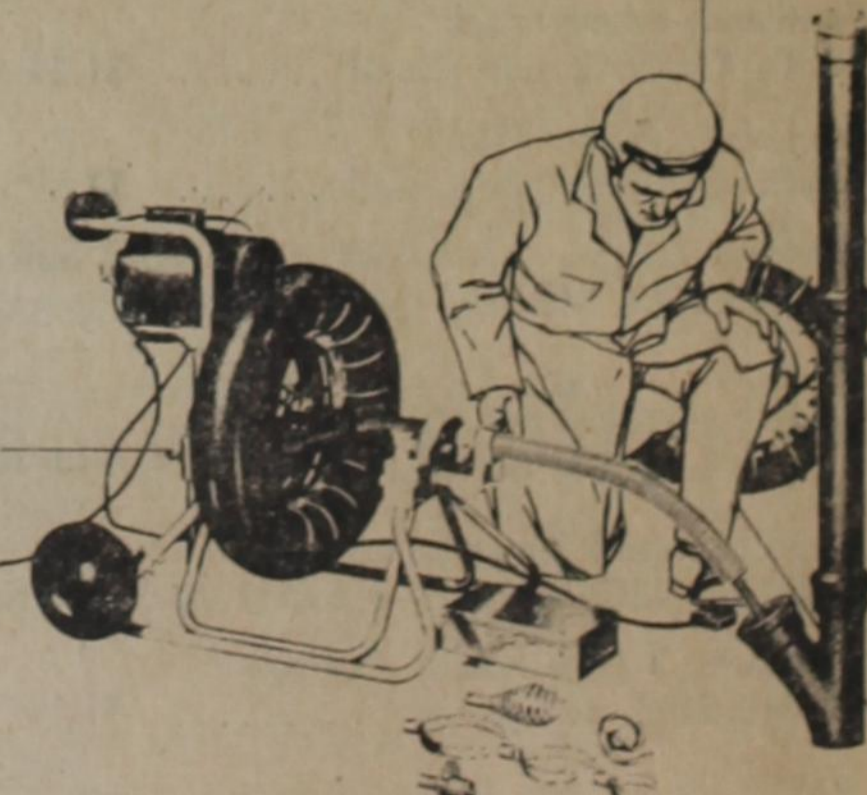
