One of the major changes concerns the method of com puting monthly benefit amounts for workers who become dis abled. Hammons said. Under the old law it was not uncom mon for a young disabled person with few years of work to receive a larger benefit than ar older worker who had worked many years. The 1980 Amend ments correct this inequity.

Another important change allows disabled beneficiaries who return to work despite their impairments to continue to be covered by Medicare for an additional 36 months after their entitlement to cash benefits stops.

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





Mrs. Aiken asked, "Are you : are some 10 million in the United States today. That is one out of every 20 Americans carry a gene which is capable of destroying a child. Because carriers show no signs of the disease. who is not a carrier.

"When two CF carriers marry, there is a 25 per cent chance with each pregnancy their child will be normal. A 50 per cent chance the child will be a carrier and 25 per cent chance their baby will have cystic fibrosis.

"An infant with CF is born every five hours. That is one of every 1,600 babies. A CF victim dies every eight hours, more than half before they are out of their teens.

"There is no way to assure anyone they are not carriers, and only one sure way to determine who are carriers, to give life to a cystic fibrosis victim.
