

With the ample moisture that we have received recently, small grain producers in Callahan County can look forward planted within the next 20 to 30 day's.

Seedbed preparations, proper rates of fertilization and seed variety selection are major items to consider when planting small grain crops, said Gregory Gerngross, county agent

grazing cannot be realized withcut adequate soil fertility and most soils in Callahan County art low in one or more nutrients. Scil tests are the most accurate indication of what nutrients are available and which ones are in short supply. Cartons for mailing the soil samples are available from the office of the County Agricultural Agents as are instructions for taking samples.

Seed variety selection is also important in realizing the most grain crop in this area. Oat prayer. varieties recommended for this county include Alamo X. Nora. Ora, Norwin, New Nortex, Bronco and Moregrain.

Wheat variety recommendations are Tasco. Caddo, Sturdy, Crockett 70, Triumph 64, Improved Triumph and Scout 66.

Recommended barley varieties are Will, Era, Rogers, Cardova and Tora.

If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number and or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.






