

6 Arrested By City Marshal Here Last Week Are Tried

City Marshal Chuck Thomas, assisted by Coleman County Sheriff Corky Chapman, arrested six men here Monday and Tuesday of last week on charges of theft and making alcoholic beverages available to a minor.

Theft involved three suitcases taken from the John Lane family of Upton, Wyoming in the city park here about four weeks ago. Lost contents of the suitcases were valued at \$534.77, and felony theft charges were lodged against five local residents, three adults and two minors.

Charged with the alcohol infraction was Bruce Powell, 22 of Brownwood, and charged with theft were Jerry Don, 18, and David Hinkle, 17 and David Worley, 18, along with two juveniles. The arrests were made at the Worley home in the east part of town here.

Trials for the accused were held in County Court in Baird, Friday, and Judge A. E. Dyer Jr., placed the juveniles on probation until age 21, and explained to them that any violation of probation will result in their being sent to the State School for boys at Gatesville.

The older men entered pleas of guilty and because of their age Judge Dyer reduced the charge to misdemeanor theft and found them guilty. He set punishment at six months in jail, probated over a two-year period and assessed each a fine of \$200 plus court costs of \$52.

Rising Star Bank To Get New Home

Construction will soon begin on new quarters for the First State Bank of Rising Star. The new facilities, reported to cost around \$150,000, will be built at the corner of West College and Anderson, a block from the downtown business district where the financial institution has been housed since 1910.

Contract was awarded to Leonard Day of Odessa, lowest bidder, according to C. W. Rutherford, president of the Rising Star Building Corp. through which the contract was let.

Construction on the new facility began Tuesday.

Construction is scheduled to begin and contract specifies completion within 120 calendar days.

The building was designed by an Abilene architect. It will be of masonry construction with steel frame and gypsum roof deck. All exterior glass will be heat-absorbing solar bronze set in bronze aluminum.

Interiors will feature terrazzo floors, carpeted areas and vinyl covered walls. It will encompass private offices for bank officials, space for safe deposit boxes, lounge for customers, large bookkeeping room and a room for public and private meetings.

A drive-up window for auto banking will also be provided.

First 1971 Peanuts Arrive At Pioneer

First crop peanuts to be processed in this area arrived at Pioneer Farmers Cooperative Monday afternoon. Two producers brought in a total of five loads.

Two loads came from George Ledbetter of Clyde. The nuts were in the ground 140 days, and were reported to be not as mature as should be. The peanuts were beginning to come off vines therefore forcing harvest.

Three loads were brought in by Sterling Tucker of Rising Star. The kernels were reported nicely filled out.

The trio will be required to make equal payments on restitution to the Wyoming family and will pay \$10 per month, probation officer fee, for two years.

Powell was found guilty, also and sentenced to 10 days in jail, plus a fine of \$250 plus court costs of \$52. He will be held for Brown County officers who want him for violation of probation on a charge of possession of marijuana there when he was given a seven year prison term (probated). He was also accused of offering local juveniles Belladonna, a restricted drug.

Suitcases taken at the park here were found west of town along Highway 36. Two were found 10 miles west of town in an old abandoned cistern, and another was found in tall weeds on a creek bank in the same area. Some jewelry taken from the suitcases was found under an old abandoned car, and some jewelry is still missing, Marshal Thomas said.

Total costs to the trio found guilty of theft amounts to \$1,530.77, and any failure to live up to the probation regulations will see the individual jailed at Baird for six months.

Ex-Local Man Named Air Force's Recruiter

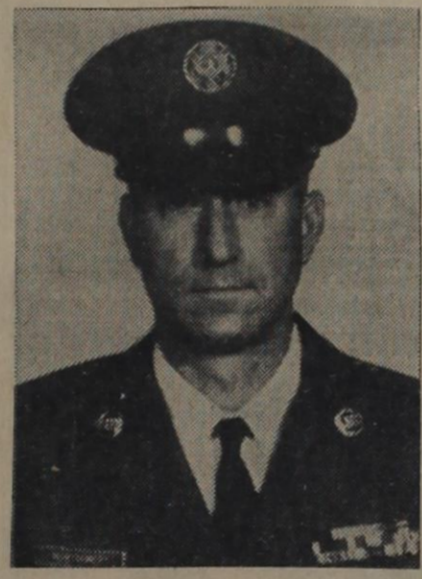

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

HEAT MARKS

White blemishes caused by heat are usually very difficult to remove without complete refinishing. If the damage has not penetrated too deeply into the finish, the following suggestions may prove effective:

This is part 4 of your FURNITURE FIRST AID HANDBOOK from Higginbothams. Clip it and add it to parts 1-3, then watch for part 5!

WHITE SPOTS - CAUSES UNKNOWN

Many white spots or rings on wood furniture can be removed, but success of the treatment depends on the amount of damage and the cause. Try these methods:

METHOD A - Rub blemish with cigarette or cigar ashes, using cloth dipped in lubricating oil, vegetable shortening, lard or salad oil. Wipe off immediately and re wax.

METHOD B - For rottenstone or table salt on blemish with cloth dipped in any of the lubricants listed above.

METHOD C - For varnish or shellac; do not use in lacquer. Dampen cloth with spirits of camphor or essence of peppermint and dab on the spot. Do not wipe; let dry undisturbed at least 30 minutes. Rub down with rottenstone and oil (see part 1 of HANDBOOK articles).

METHOD D - With a cloth, rub on a thick paste of FFF powder pumice and linseed oil. Use cloth wet with naphtha to wipe surface often for inspection. Finish with rub-down of rottenstone and oil (see part 1).

METHOD A - Stroke spot lightly with cloth moistened with camphorated oil. Do not use a linty cloth as fuzz may stick to the wood. Wipe immediately with a clean cloth. If rough, rub with 3/0 steel wool dipped in Beautiflor or lubricating oil.

METHOD B - Try rottenstone and oil treatment (part 1).

METHOD C - Try METHOD C under WHITE SPOTS - CAUSE UNKNOWN (above). See Higginbothams first for your furniture needs.

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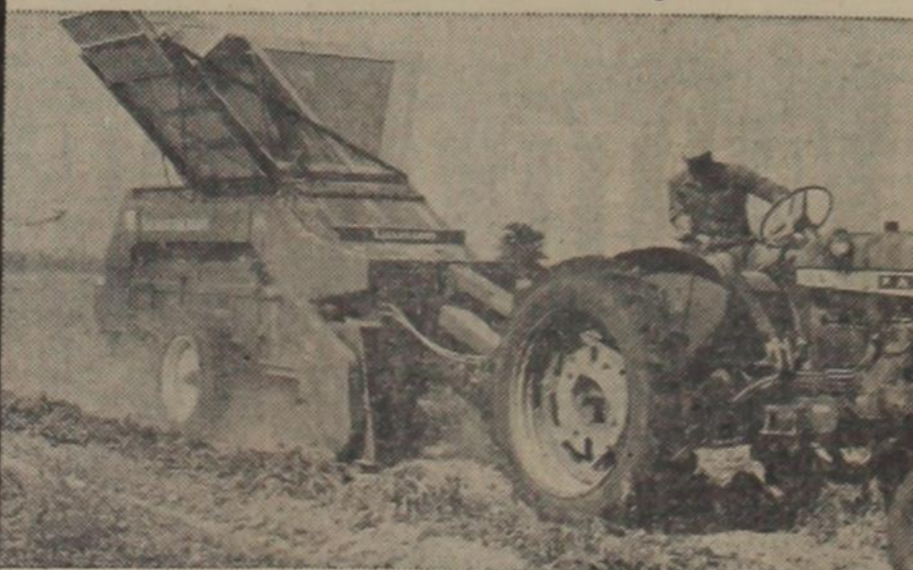
