

News From COUNTY AGENT

VITAMIN A DEFICIENCY

When ranges are green, vitamin A deficiency is seldom a problem; But the situation now is that the grass is brown and deficient in the vitamin A on most ranges. Growth, maintenance, reproduction, or lactation will be retarded or stopped entirely whenever the feed intake is inbalanced or inadequate. Vitamin A is required by cattle of all ages but is particularly essential for young calves and cows during the last two or three months of pregnancy and for the production of milk with a high vitamin A content. Lack of vitamin A is the major cause of poor reproduction and high calf losses. Animals lacking in vitamin A are more subject to diseases of the lungs and the deficiency often effects their nervous system, sometimes leading to paralysis in the hind quarters.

Vitamin A deficiency can be avoided by feeding a balanced protein supplement fortified with a supply of vitamin A, plus the necessary grass, carbohydrates, and minerals. Good quality leafy green alfalfa or peanut hay are good sources of vitamin A. One or two pounds per head of cattle per day should be enough to keep up the vitamin A content in the animals

Balance in the bank for the local chapter at the end of 1950 amounted to \$548.73, however, unpaid bills at that time were \$365.20.
