



#### S.S. Child Aid Stops At 16, New Law Says

The spouse of a retired or disabled worker and the widow or wiidower of a deceased worker, though not of retirement age, may still be eligible to receive social security benefits as long as they have a dependent child of the worker in their care.

Prior to September 1981 the parent of the dependent child could receive benefits until the child attained age 18, said Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. A provision of the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981 was that effective with Septemeber 1981. benefits to the parents of de pendent children will tereminate pon the child's attainment of a

The law provides a grace period for those persons entitled prior to September 1981. Benefits for those entitled prior to September. 1981 will continue until the child attains age 18 or until September 1982. whichever occurs first.






