Week End Rain Showers Please About Everyone

Rain is usually beneficial, and its positive aspects normally outweigh the negative side. Rarely though, is virtually everyone happy to see moisture. The rain showers Friday night and Saturday may have been the exception.

Everyone seems to have been pleased with that rain which fell gently and gauged about an inch or slightly more over most of the Cross Plains area.

Grain crops were given new life. Wheat was hurting, and without the rain harvest was expected to be extremely slim. Expectations now are ranging in the "average" area.

Although peanut planting is not yet underway, at least not in large scale manner, the rain came just in time to help farmers ready land for the crop.

Gardens and pastures also were given a needed boost by the moisture.

Gauges in Cross Plains showed 1.15 to 1.25 inches from the showers which began Friday night and continued intermittently into Saturday morning.

Mrs. Wayne Brown reports as much as 1.20 inches falling in the Cottonwood sector, and that amount was measured at the Jake Carter place west of the Atwell community. R. T. Watson, who lives near Burkett, gauged 1.15 inches, and G. T. Dawkins in the Sabanno community reported 1.10 inches. J. T. Beggs at Pioneer got .90 of an inch, and in Rowden Mrs. N. V. Gibbs reported gauges varying from .50 of an inch to twice that much in the northern part of that community.

The rain fell slowly with an oc-

casional brief, hard shower. The 1.15 inches of rain brings to an even 7.00 inches of rain falling here in 1982. Only an inch of rain was recorded here in April outside of that which began falling last Friday total of which was carried into May.

383 of a registered 1,162, according to figures released by Precinct Democratic Chairman Alton E. Hornsby and Charles Walker, County Democratic Chairman.

Throughout Callahan County just over 27 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots, 1,583 out of a

possible 5,847, at eight polling places and absentee.

Budget Cuts Threatening 2 Green Thumb Workers

Editor's Note: Following is a story written after Congressman Charles Stenholm had addressed Green Thumb Workers at Coleman, attending training session, that budget cuts in 1983 are threatening their jobs. It will affect three Cross Plains residents, Green Thumb Workers Dessa Higgins and Laverle Threatt, and sponsor Lovie Nichols, director of the Multi-Purpose Center in Cross Plains.

U. S. Rep. Charles Stenholm of Stamford told more than 120 Green Thumb workers and sponsors attending a training session in Coleman on April 13 that he believes "funding will be restored" for the senior employment program.

Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employs almost 1,000 low-income, rural persons aged 55 and over, in 106 counties. It is currently funded along with other senior employment programs by Title V of the Older Americans Act—but President Reagan's proposed 1983 budget does not provide funding for Title V.

"Green Thumb is a high priority program for one reason," Stenholm said. "It's a work program, not a giveaway program."

The two-term congressman, who is unopposed for re-election, also cited the favorable cost-benefit ratio of Title V. Green Thumb workers provide services to senior centers, schools, libraries, and museums and, at the same time, maintain their own dignity by avoiding welfare rolls.

Stenholm reminded his audience that difficult times require sacrifices from all segments of society, and this might mean a reduction in cost of living increases for social security recipients. The majority of those present said they could accept a moderate reduction—of three per cent or so—in their cost of living increases.

For his part, the congressman said he "was personally going to decline" the tax benefits recently

approved by and for members of congress. "I won't ask sacrifices of the people without sacrificing myself," he said.

Stenholm predicted the current budget problems would eventually be resolved by making some cuts in defense spending and by increasing taxes to offset the big deficits anticipated by most economists.

In earlier comments, Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller also said that Green Thumb had a good chance of survival.

"I think the Texas delegation is going to vote to continue the program," Moeller said. "Texas has the best Green Thumb program in the nation, and you, the workers, deserve most of the credit for that." Moeller also thanked Green Thumb sponsoring agencies for their strong and effective support.

More than 25 per cent of the polls registered in the Eula and Denton Valley precincts voted. That is 95 of 370 at Eula and 59 of 228 at Denton Valley. Twenty-seven per cent of the 159 registered at Oplin voted Saturday in the Democratic Primary.

S.S. Child Aid Stops At 16, New Law Says

The spouse of a retired or disabled worker and the widow or widower of a deceased worker, though not of retirement age, may still be eligible to receive social security benefits as long as they have a dependent child of the worker in their care.

Prior to September 1981 the parent of the dependent child could receive benefits until the child attained age 18, said Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. A provision of the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981 was that effective with September 1981, benefits to the parents of dependent children will terminate upon the child's attainment of age 16.

The law provides a grace period for those persons entitled prior to September 1981. Benefits for those entitled prior to September 1981 will continue until the child attains age 18 or until September 1982, whichever occurs first.

This change in the law does not affect the child's own benefit. The child's benefits can continue until age 18, and possibly beyond age 18 depending on his status as a full-time student.

This change in the law was only one of several changes brought about by the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981, Hammons said. For further information contact Social Security Office by calling (915) 698-1360 or 1-800-392-1603 if you don't live in Abilene.

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

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

Texas lawmakers definitely will be returning to Austin this summer for the purpose of abolishing the state property tax, and Gov. Bill Clements says he will call the special session for May 24.

Clements is asking the Legislature to approve a constitutional amendment doing away with the tax—which hasn't been collected since 1978—because of a lawsuit scheduled to go to trial in June.

That suit, brought by Midwestern University, is seeking to restore the tax, which was used to finance construction at 17 public senior colleges and universities before the Legislature reduced the assessment rate to 0.0001 in 1979.

Clements says nearly \$1 billion in past and current taxes would be due if Midwestern wins the suit.

Clements had hardly announced his plans for the session before several groups began calling for the governor to open it to several other issues. Some of those issues include appropriating millions of dollars to offset major increases in state employees' monthly health insurance payments, to offset federal cuts in the Work Incentive Program and to help fight the imported fire ant.

The governor, however, has said he will not allow lawmakers to consider anything but the property tax issue, and has indicated he hopes the matter can be handled in as little as two.

The summer session will inconvenience some lawmakers who will be campaigning for the June 5 runoff elections.

GOP Offers 800

A total of 800 candidates for public office appeared on the 1982 Republican primary ballot last Saturday, according to State GOP Chairman Chester R. Upham, Jr. This is the largest number ever to compete as Republican candidates in Texas.

We are really pleased with the large number of excellent candidates who sought election this year as Republicans. The interest in our Party has also resulted in a record number of Republican primary contests," Upham said. "In addition to the statewide contests and the five important referenda questions, Republican primary voters had a choice of two or more candidates in 11 congressional races, seven State Senate districts and 24 House districts."

The increase in the Republican primary can also be seen in the number of counties which conducted elections. In the last non-presidential year, 186 of the state's 254 counties held a Republican primary. This year, there were 225 counties covering over 98 percent of the state's population.

troller and Land Commissioner in addition to expressing their views on local option parimutuel wagering on horse races, gun control, Sunday blue laws, mandatory penalties for repeat drunk drivers, and initiative and referendum.

Mayors Panel

The Mayors Advisory Committee to the Governor has identified water as the major issue of concern to their cities, and the group has decided to study several other issues they believe the Legislature should address during the 1983 legislative session.

The panel, chaired by Temple Mayor John Sammons, has agreed that water—whether the lack of it or too much of it—is the number one priority to be dealt with next year.

The mayors believe development of a state water plan should no longer be looked at as a West Texas issue and should be given statewide, non-partisan support.

The panel also identified crime, utility rates, financing for needed capital improvements, fire ants, housing and streets and roads as other major problems that need to be addressed soon by the Legislature.

The panel will present its recommendations on those matters to lawmakers and the governor in July or August.

Harding Woes

As if State Treasurer Warren G. Harding didn't have enough trouble with his two indictments for official misconduct, Harding now is being accused of sexually harassing female employees in his office.

Harding, who has been indicted for allegedly using state employees to perform campaign work for him on state time, has been accused of the sexual harassment by John Cutright, one Democrat who opposed Harding in the hotly contested treasurer's race.

Cutright says that a Dallas newspaper has complete documentation on the matter, and officials of the Travis County District Attorney's Office have confirmed that the harassment allegations are part of their investigation into the treasurer's office.

Harding was facing little opposition to his re-election prior to disclosure of that investigation, but ended up facing three Democratic and one Republican challengers.

Despite the allegation, Harding gained the endorsements of several newspapers and political groups.

Political Streaker

You may have thought "streaking" had gone out of style long ago, but at least one Austin politico has found it to be a unique way of campaigning.

During a political rally for Democratic land commissioner candidate Pete Snelson, a man clad only in tennis shoes, a Richard Nixon mask and a bumper sticker across his posterior streaked through a crowd of about 400 people at Austin's Fiesta Gardens.

The culprit was apprehended by a Travis County sheriff's deputy, but Snelson campaign workers decided not to press charges.

The bumper sticker worn on the man's derriere proclaimed the name of one of Snelson's major campaign opponents — Garry Mauro.
