Trade at Home — Save Money

An inch of rain was recorded in Cross Plains last week in showers which fell Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The moisture was welcomed as measurable precipitation has not been recorded here since .40 of an inch fell here on March 26. The .85 of an inch which fell in the early morning hours last Thursday brightened the outlook for yards and gardens in the city and pastures and grain crops throughout the countryside. Other light rain showers on Friday and Saturday amounted to .10 and .05 respectively, an aggregate of one inch. A trace of rain fell here early Tuesday morning.

Rain totals reported from the area were Cottonwood from .75 to one inch, Cross Cut 1.50 inches and Pioneer 1.00 to 1.25 inches.

Total rainfall for 1982 in Cross Plains now stands at 5.85 inches.

Garden Club Tipster Says Caladiums 'Most Colorful'

Caladiums are the most colorful of all foliage plants. They are natives of South America, and give a touch of tropical elegance to your home, garden or patio.

Plant directly outdoors after danger of frost has passed or in doors in pots, planters and hanging baskets. For an early start bulbs can be planted in pots and transplanted outdoors when there is no danger of frost. If you have them in containers, you can move them to give color where it is needed.

These tropical plants love hot, soaring 100-degree summer months. They thrive best in shaded areas. The colorful leaves not only add color to the landscape, but can be cut to create beautiful arrangements. Larger leaves will require the use of wire and floral tape, and will last for approximately two weeks in water.

Caladium bulbs are very easy to grow. Plant in any well drained location in partial shade (Some varieties will grow better in full sun.). Partial shade will give the

best color. It is best to plant the bulb up-side down about two inches deep. A light application of any type fertilizer near the base of each plant once a month will produce the most brilliant colors. Fertilizer high in nitrogen can be placed in bottom of the hole when planting — never let fertilizer touch the bulb, cover with thin layer of soil. Water frequently to keep soil moist, but never soggy. Soil must be warm and moist for bulbs to germinate rapidly.

To store for winter, bulbs should be dug before cold weather and placed in flats in a location with good ventilation and temperature of 70 to 80 degrees.

Fancy leaved Caladiums come in many varieties of three basic colors, pink, red and white. There are over 100 varieties, but commercial production is limited to about 40 of most widely grown. When purchasing bulbs, size and quality determine how many leaves will be produced.

Democratic, Republican Primaries Set Saturday

Democratic and Republican Primaries are scheduled in Texas and Callahan County Saturday, May 1. Only the Democratic Party plans an election in Cross Plains, however.

Turnout in both instances is figured to be moderate in Callahan County with few local races to peak interest.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Democrats will vote at eight boxes through the county, but Republicans will vote only at Clyde

at the Dairy Queen. Precinct voting boxes for Democrats were revealed by County Clerk Darlene Walker as Baird Precinct 1, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 2, Lions Club Building; Cross Plains Precinct 3, City Hall; Putnam Precinct 4, Community Center; Eula Precinct 5, old school auditorium; Denton Valley Precinct 6, First Baptist Church; Oplin Precinct 7, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 8, at high school cafeteria.

Most local interest for the Democrats will be races for peace justice positions. Incumbent L. P. Mitchell faces former peace justice Eddie Heard in Cross Plains precinct, Justice Precinct 6. In Justice Precinct 5 incumbent Lee Savell is challenged by Deputy Jess Henley and voters in Clyde, Denton Valley, Eula and Oplin will decide that nominee. At Putnam, Justice Precinct 3, Ida Mae Waddell, incumbent, faces a challenge from I. G. Mobley.

There is no countywide contest race.

A sample ballot appears on page 7 of today's Review. It is in English only, and carries all precincts.

A plus for getting Democratic voters out are lively races for several offices such as governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, agriculture commissioner and several places on supreme and lower

courts.

Republicans have no county candidates, but do feature several contests for statewide offices including senator, governor, comptroller and land commissioner.

Also included on the GOP ballot is a referendum section which features five proposals. Asked to vote for or against, the proposals are as follow:

- passing a law in the next session of the Texas legislature permitting the parimutuel wagering on horse races by local option?
- mandatory jail time for repeat

- drunk driving offenders?
- initiative and referendum as a way for the public to vote directly on issues and make law in elections rather than depending solely on state legislative action?
- passage of a law that would ban the private ownership of handguns?
- the Texas Legislature abolishing the Texas Sunday Closing Laws, commonly referred to as Blue Laws?
- There will be no "election party" at the Review this year due to absence of local races.

Friday Is Final Day For Tax Exemptions

All property taxpayers are reminded that Friday, April 30, is the last day to apply for tax exemptions and to render property.

Albert Lovell, chief appraiser for the Callahan County Appraisal District at Baird, reminds that exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically, and applications must be filed by April 20 this year. He noted, "Taxpayers can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect rights as a taxpayer by rendering property and applying by the April 30 deadline."

Most political districts with tax-leaving powers offer homestead exemptions and other tax reduction incentives, especially for the elderly. Agricultural valuation is available in all subdivisions to those who qualify. Disabled and disabled veterans are also offered extra reductions in most districts.

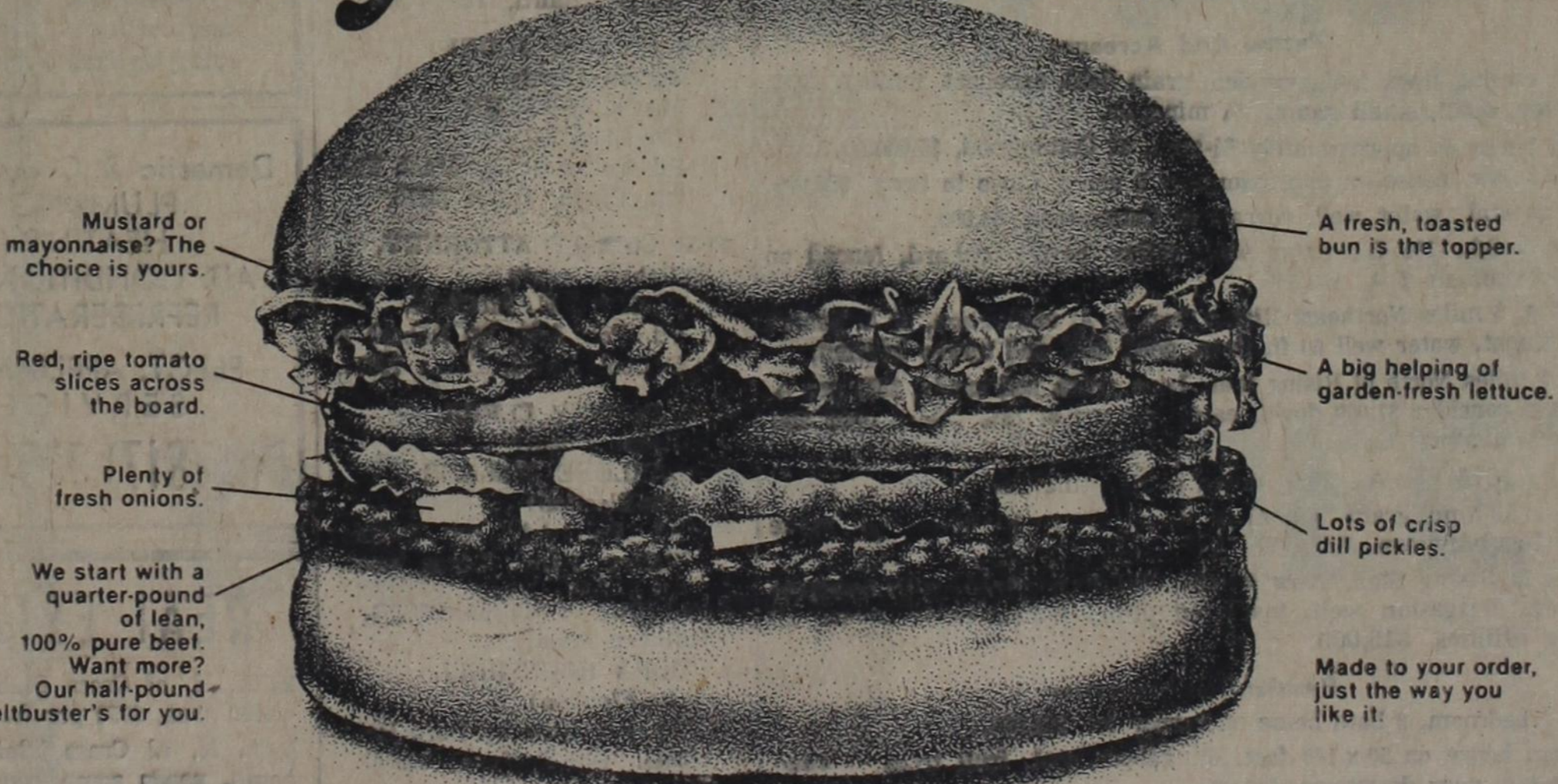

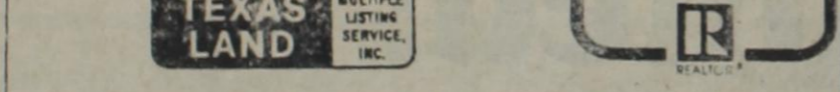
