AREA WHEAT CROP RATED BETTER THAN EXPECTED

Harvest of the current small grain crop is rapidly moving into full swing, and as the activity picks up the market seems to decline.

An estimate of possibly as much as 40 per cent of the crop had been harvested Tuesday with another week to 10 days of good weather required to complete the job.

In Cross Plains number one wheat was bringing \$3.35 per bushel.

Of the wheat harvested both yield and grades have been better than expected.

High humidity and morning cloudiness has slowed combining, but there is still green wheat in fields, one observer stated.

LL Cats Tighten Grip On Lead Before Rains Fall

Cats stretched their lead in the Cross Plains Little League Baseball program to two full games in a rain shortened week of play June 1 and 3.

The front runners recorded a 23-7 verdict over the Blue Jays Tuesday of last week, and saddled the second place Kilowatts with a 10-0 whitewash in Thursday's only game completed before the rains came. In other action on June 1, the Kilowatts out-scored the Buffs 25-18.

Dan Johnston, president of the Kiwanis Club, and Edmondson joined in urging all local residents to participate in the clean-up effort. Johnston said, "We want to give the city a thorough cleaning, noting that it will take help of the citizens to do that." Edmondson repeated his statement that the Kiwanians will "pick up almost anything with the exception of normal household trash usually handled by the city trash service. One request was made by the

Kiwanians, of those who wish to take advantage of the free service. That is to have the trash in place by 10 a.m. Saturday. "We hope to have the job done by about dinner," Edmondson said, "and we hope not to have to retrace any routes." All debris to be picked up should be piled at a convenient pick up point either along a city street or well-traveled alley. "Alleys not normally used will not be checked," the chairman stated.

Cross Plains Garden Club is lending its support to the clean-up, and that organization is planning to prepare dinner for the Kiwanis members who will be working in Saturday morning's clean-up.

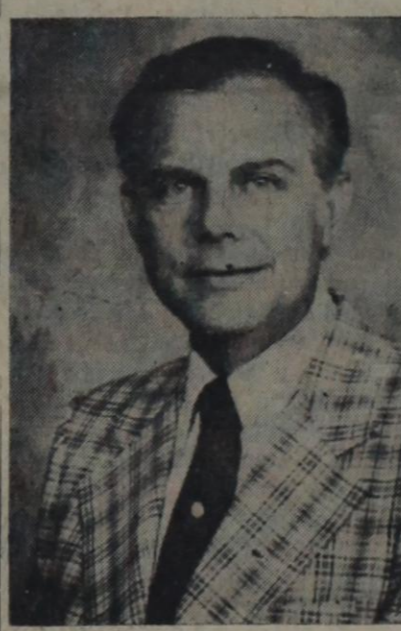

Only 291 County Demos Vote In Runoff Primary

Pitifully few Democrats bothered to cast ballots in the runoff primary last Saturday in Cross Plains and Callahan County. The same was true, however, across the entire state.

Lack of races for major state offices kept some folks away, and absence of other runoffs locally additionally hurt the turnout.

Only 291 votes were cast in Callahan County, and just 55 persons in Cross Plains voting precinct

bothered to go to the polls. Voting by precincts across the county were reported as Baird 44, Clyde (precinct 2), 68, Cross Plains 55, Putnam 19, Eula 23, Oplin 18, Denton Valley 11, Clyde (precinct 8) 49 and absentee 4.

Apparently county and local voters did not agree completely

with the remainder of the state. Total agreement came in the race for Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1, where Charles F. Campbell, Jr. defeated John E. Humphreys. He carried Cross Plains 27-25 and the county 157-114.

Jim Mattox won the Attorney General nomination, but lost this county to John Hannah 168-119, while being favored in this city 31-21.

Gary Mauro is the nominee for Land Commissioner, but he lost Callahan 180 to 107 to Pete Snelson and Cross Plains 36-18.

County voters and local voters favored Bill Black 181-72 and 32-21 respectively over Chuck Miller for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, but Miller won across the state.

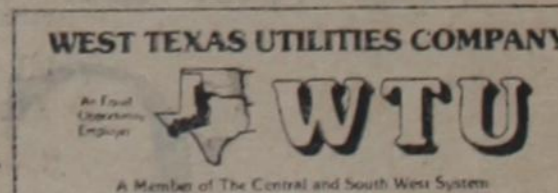
