Hospital Operation Offer Made Says County Judge

Editor's Note: The following article concerning the Callahan General Hospital at Baird appeared in the Abilene Reporter-News Saturday morning, July 31. It reports that another management firm has hinted it is interested in the financially troubled hospital currently due to close September 15. Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen said he received a preliminary offer Friday regarding operation of the financially troubled county hospital from a Memphis-based company specializing in management of small medical facilities. Kniffen said he could not make details of the offer public until county commissioners meet with officials of United Hospitals. The meeting will be either at the next scheduled commissioners court meeting Aug. 9 or at a special meeting agreeable to commissioners and United Hospitals representatives, he said. Commissioners began searching for new hospital management earlier this year when Rural Hospital Management Inc., a subsidiary of Hendrick Medical Center, took steps to terminate its 10-year lease with the county hospital, Michael Water, Hendrick president, said the subsidiary had been losing money since taking over hospital operation in September 1981.

Kiwanians Complete Scout Cabin Roof

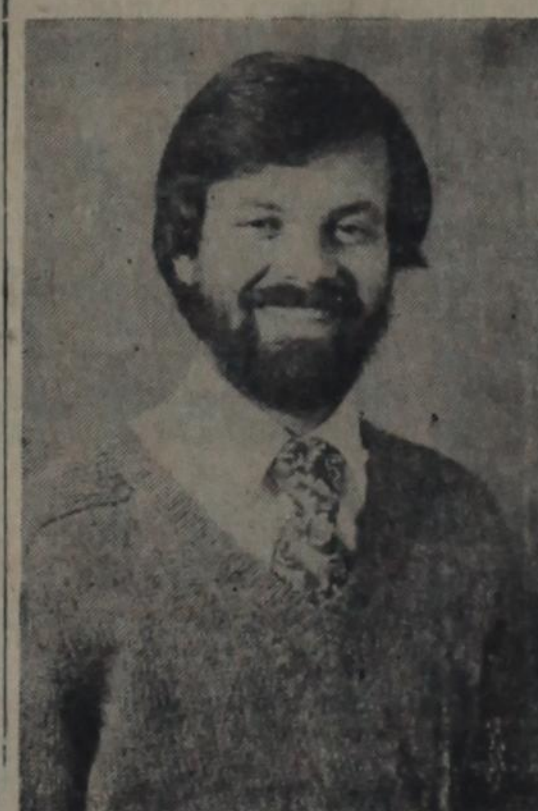

2-Day Junior Rodeo Begins Here Friday

Cross Plains Roping Club is sponsoring a two-performance junior rodeo Friday and Saturday nights in the arena on the banks of Turkey Creek at the western edge of the city. Heralding the rodeo will be a parade through downtown Cross Plains at 6 p.m. on Friday. The processional will form at 5:30 p.m. at the school on North Main Street and proceed southward on Main to Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, Inc. Parade entries which already include horses, motorcycles, cars, trucks and floats, will be accepted until parade time Friday.

Show time for each night of the rodeo is 8 p.m., and a dance is scheduled at the city park at 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. Band at the dance is to be Ann Dye and the Sundance Band of Abilene. It was noted that admission for the rodeo and dance would be separate, but prices had not been announced Tuesday morning. Entry forms for the rodeo and minor release forms may be obtained at Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply. It was noted that all minors must have a release form signed, and entries in the rodeo must be paid by 7:30 p.m. before each performance. It was explained that unpaid entries in any age group will be scratched. Entry fee in each event were released as \$20 for boys and girls ages 13-15, and \$5 for boys and girls per event in 12 and under age category. It was again emphasized that one pay will be made Saturday night after the show. All-around trophy buckles will be given in each of the three age groups for both boys and girls. There will be four events in each of the three age brackets, plus a goat scramble for children age 3 and under. The four events for competing girls in both 16-21 and 13-15 are identical. They are barrel racing, goat tying, break-away roping and pole bending.

Contest for girls 12 and under are barrel racing, pole bending, goat ringing and steer riding. Boys 16-21 will be competing in tie-down roping, bareback bronc riding, ribbon roping and bull riding. The four categories boys age 13-15 will vie in are tie-down roping, ribbon roping, breakaway roping and junior bull riding. Division of 12 and under boys will be competing in barrel racing, pole bending, goat riding and steer riding.

TV and Your Child

Tips From TSTA

Editor's Note: Following is the second of a four part series from the Texas State Teachers Association concerning television and its effects on the behavior in children and teenagers.

The Texas State Teachers Association urges parents to examine their children's television viewing habits. Here is Part III of a four-part series.

PRESCHOOLERS AND TV

Congratulations on being a parent. It is one of life's most rewarding experiences.

Part of being a parent is selecting the best for your new child. You want your youngster to grow up happy and healthy. Plan your youngster's time well. Your child needs fresh air, exercise, hugging, sleep, food, play time, thinking time and a little TV time.

If your preschooler is watching too much television, then it's

"prime time" for parental involvement!

Make certain your children watch TV for information and entertainment. Television should not be a babysitter.

Watch TV with your child — after you have carefully selected a good program.

Discuss what you watch on TV with your child. Point out colors, animals and common objects around the house. Ask questions! This teaches youngsters to look more closely at what they see. Ask your child, "Did you like the program we watched?" This helps your youngster to evaluate feelings and to think clearly.

Stretch your child's imagination. Ask how else a character could have acted, (e.g. "Could the baby duck have done something different in the cartoon?")

Keep toys and empty boxes around so your youngster learns to play creatively. Also, be sure there are some small, baby-size books available — cloth books are good. This will free your child from depending on TV for entertainment.

Be sure your child learns what is real and what is not real. This is a very difficult thing for a young child to do. Youngsters believe everything they see or hear on TV is real because they don't know anything else. There is a lot of make-believe on TV. Young people need to know the difference.

Help your child to learn to listen. Point out different sounds on TV — sounds such as: laughter, crying, musical tones, animal noises and traffic, etc. This helps your child learn to listen carefully.

Read to your child as soon as possible. Reading soothes children and helps prepare them for school days ahead. Reading every day is not too much, and most children love stories at bedtime.

Caution young children not to sit or play too close to the TV set. Be sure a light is on in the same room where the TV set is on. Improper lighting can be harmful to eyesight.

Education - Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?" The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much, others not enough.

I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers.

I believe in merit pay of teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics, relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and our future.

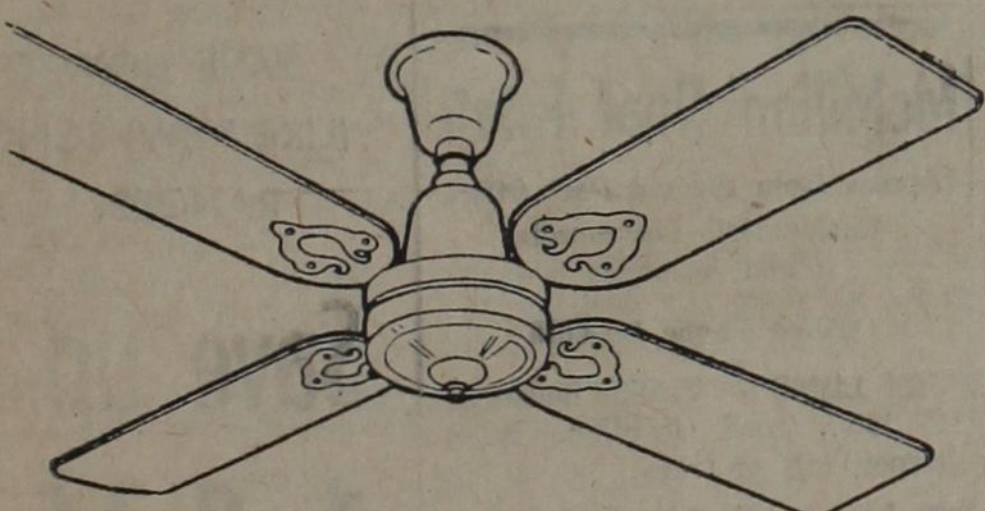

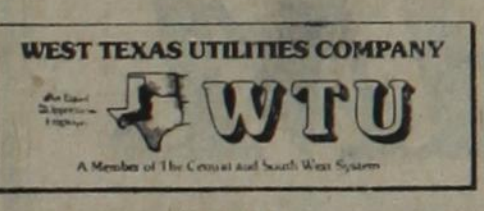

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

A strong Department of Energy and decontrol of all fuel prices are the cornerstones of Gov. Bill Clements' national energy policy, unveiled last week at the Southern Governors' Conference in Hilton Head Island, S. C.

Clements took it upon himself to draft the proposal stating that he was tired of waiting for six Republican and Democratic presidential administrations to come up with one.

Despite the fact that President Reagan has proposed to dismantle the DOE, Clements says a strong energy department is essential to "ensure priority attention" to making the nation energy independent.

The key to that independence is deregulation of energy prices, the Republican governor says, adding that "maximum reliance" should be placed on the private sector and free market system to develop energy reserves, set prices and distribute that energy.

Some Capitol observers, however, saw Clements proposal as a complete reversal of his previous belief that DOE should be abolished.

That reversal could be attributed to the fact — as pointed out by Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent — that DOE has acquired more officials who are pro-oil industry.

Attorney General Mark White, Clements' opponent in this year's gubernatorial campaign, refused to comment on the governor's plan other than to describe it as "too bland."

Textbook Fight

And while Clements was unveiling his energy proposal, a group calling itself People for the American Way, began their fight against censorship of textbooks in Texas' public schools.

People for the American Way, a national non-partisan group founded two years ago to "protect Americans' constitutional freedoms," announced the opening of a Texas office to monitor the state's textbook adoption process.

They immediately attacked Mel and Norma Gabler, the controversial Longview couple who have worked to remove textbooks — and even dictionaries — they don't like from classrooms.

The group labeled the efforts of the Gablers and others as attempts to "purge schools of all material that encourage thinking and discussion or is inconsistent with their narrow religious and political orthodoxy."

The State Textbook Committee, which is responsible for selecting the books used in public schools, is scheduled to hold hearings on new textbooks in August.

Those hearings promise to be lively, to say the least.

Budget Projections

Texas taxpayers got some good news last week when State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that lawmakers should have \$5 billion dollars more to spend in 1983 than was available in 1981 without any new taxes.

Bullock's projection also showed that the state will have a surplus of \$1.3 billion in fiscal 1982.

That means, if the Legislature went into session today, they would have those surplus funds to spend for projects this year without having to use any funds earmarked for fiscal 1983.

Although Bullock attributed the surplus to "good times we have had," he warned that the state is beginning to see "significant drops

in some major revenue sources." "The recession has come to Texas," Bullock said. "Our economy has begun to slow."

The comptroller warned that federal funds coming to the state also are expected to drop and that lawmakers should be careful to ensure that the surplus funds are used to "reap the greatest possible benefits for the state."

Inmate Limits

The Texas Department of Corrections has decided to lift the limits it places on accepting new prisoners from the state's largest counties, and says county officials deserve the credit for helping keep TDC's inmate populations down.

The quotas on how many new prisoners would be admitted were imposed in May shortly after TDC briefly closed its doors to new arrivals.

In announcing that the prison system would return to regular admission policies, TDC spokesmen said the commission had received "excellent cooperation" from the state parole board and county sheriffs.

BENNETT REUNION SLATED SUNDAY AT COTTONWOOD

The annual Bennett Reunion is scheduled to be held at the Cottonwood Community Center all day Sunday, August 8.

All members of the family and every friend of the family are invited to come and enjoy the visiting. One representative of the family said all members of the Cottonwood Ladies Quilting Club are invited to attend also.

The prison overcrowding situation also was eased by the opening of three metal buildings and two new cellblocks that will house 2,900 inmates.

Some prisoners still are living in tents, and prison officials say that situation probably will continue for quite some time.

Fire Ant Funds

Texas officials apparently are gearing up to fight the imported fire ant in a big way, with some \$44 million in funds to fight the pest requested recently.

In presenting the Department of Agriculture's proposed 1984-85 budget to the Legislative Budget Board, outgoing Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown asked for \$34 million to fight fire ants over the two-year period.

That figure represents half of Brown's budget request, which is nearly double the department's 1982-83 budget.

State Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, earlier had asked for \$10 million from the Legislature for fire ant research and eradication programs.

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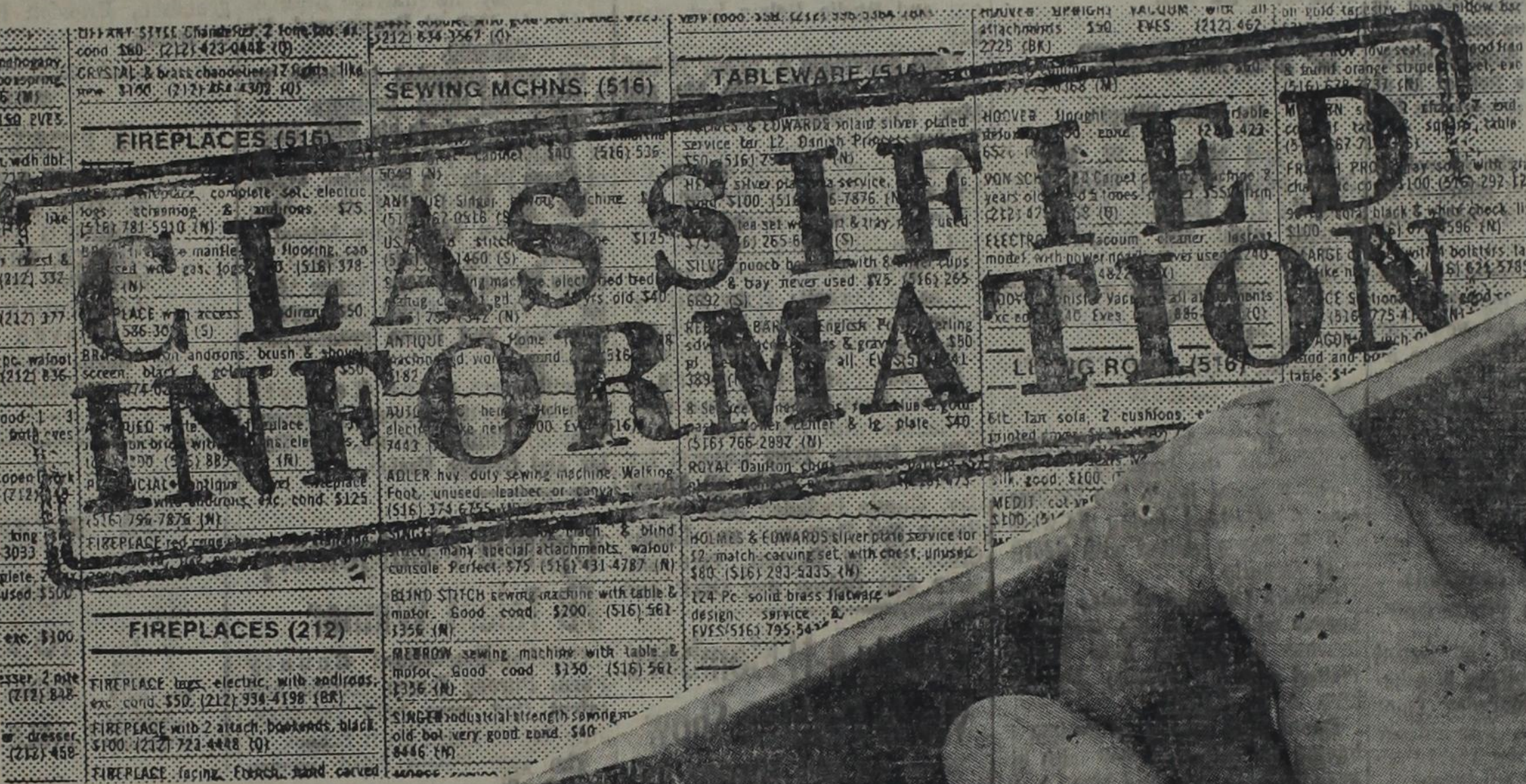

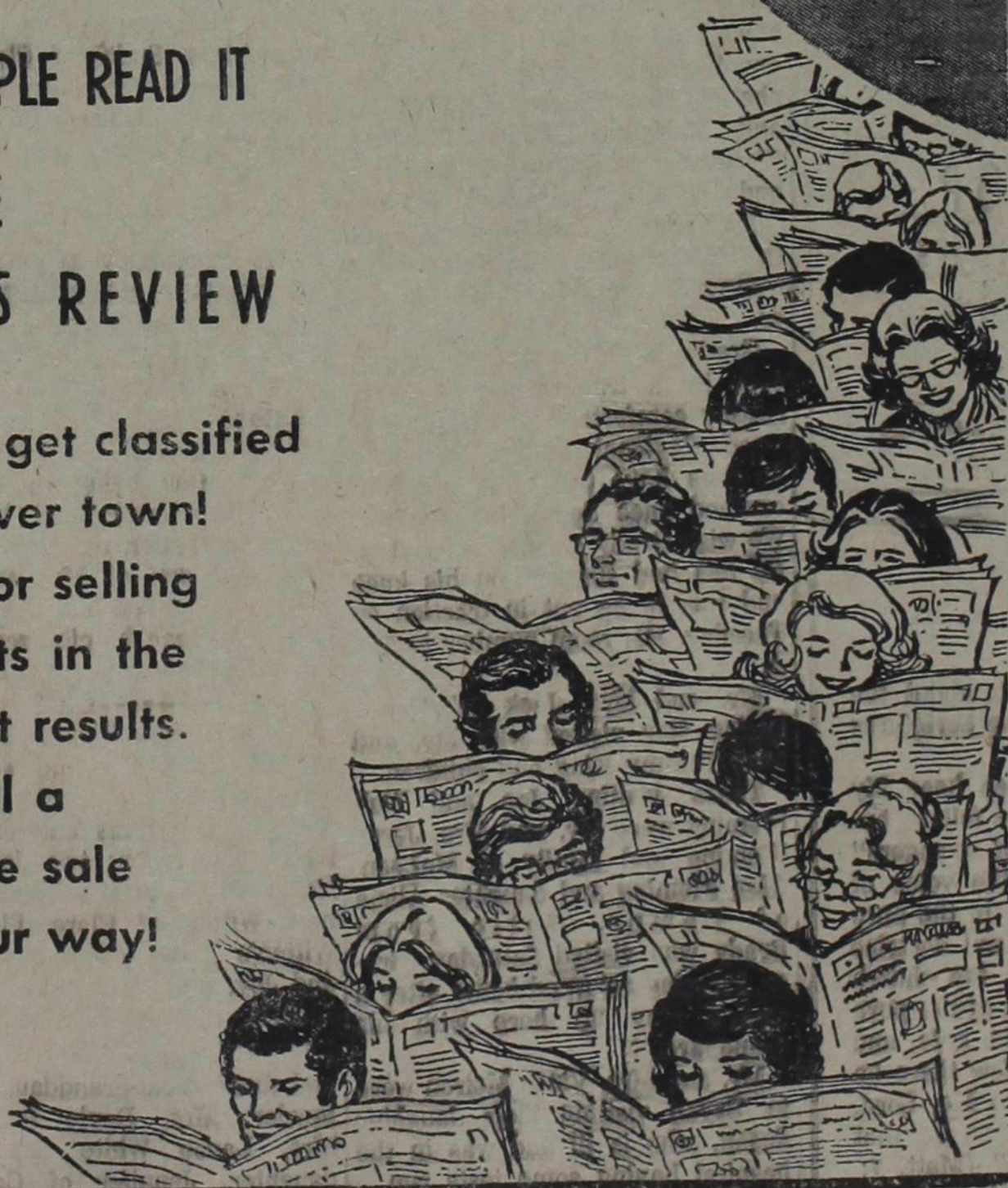
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Sipes Repeats Hospital Is A Baird Folks Project
