Bisons Pound Rochelle 42-0 In Breaking Loss String At 9

Cross Plains Buffaloes snapped a nine-game losing streak last Friday by decisioning the Rochelle Hornets 12-0 in a District 8-A contest.

Buffaloes took their time posting the initial tally using the first 7:15 of the game to cross the double stripe and lead 6-0, but then rapid-fire scored 28 more points in the next 6 minutes and 10 seconds to lead 34-0 at intermission.

Bisons got just 8 points after intermission, although reserves played a major portion of that time.

The victory Friday was the first a Herd had recorded since a 12-7 triumph over Robert Lee on September 25, 1981 in a non-loop battle. The victory in 1981 had also ended a nine-game victory drought.

Buffaloes took the opening kickoff and methodically moved the ball upfield using seven minutes and 15 seconds to score. The sustained march, hampered by three penalties, climaxed with a five-yard pass from Quarterback Dennis Koenig to End John Fred McWilliams. Conversion attempt failed, but Cross Plains had the lead for the first time in a ball game this season.

The score jumped to 12-0 favoring the Herd quickly as Rochelle fumbled the kickoff and an unidentified Buff recovered. Halfback Mike Martin circled right end 57 yards for the touchdown with 2:03 left in the first quarter. Halfback Tommy Johnston got the two point but an infraction nullified the score and he was stopped short the second try.

Rochelle again fumbled the kickoff, and Cornerback Tom Sibley recovered for the Herd. With only 8 seconds gone in the second quarter Halfback Tony Apple ran 20 yards around end for the touchdown. Fullback Ricky Brown knifed over his left side for the two-point conversion for a 20-0 score.

After the Hornets fumbled again, on the kickoff, Koenig passed to End Mike Newman for five yards and another touchdown with 11:24 showing on the clock in first half. Martin slashed over the left side for two points and a 28-0 score.

Fumble again plagued the visitors. Halfback Johnston rambled 47 yards for the fifth Buffalo touchdown. Pass on the two-point conversion fell incomplete.

Bisons added just eight points in the second half. That came late in the third canto when Apple broke loose for a 52-yard tally. Brown sliced off right side for the two points and the final 42-0 score.

In the statistics battle the Herd enjoyed the edge with 17 first downs to 7 and 283 yards rushing to 63 for Rochelle. Bisons had 23 yards passing on three completions in nine trips, while the Hornets had 9 yards on two of eight completions.

Individually Apple was leading rusher with 96 yards, Martin logged 73, and Johnston netted 50.

Cross Plains has an open date this Friday before resuming District 8-A competition October 8 at Gorman, a team rated as co-favorite with Goldthwaite in pre-season polls.

2nd Proposed Amendment Concerns Needy In State

Editor's Note: Following is the second of a six-part series concerning proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, giving arguments for and against its adoption at the general election November 2. This information was provided through the courtesy of State Representative Joe C. Hanna of Breckenridge, who represents Callahan County. The study was done by the Texas Legislative Council.

Amendment No. 2: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one per cent of the state budget."

Arguments for:

1. If the federal government reduces or stops AFDC funding, the level of allowable state aid to the needy would be cut or completely stopped because of the current constitutional restriction. The proposed amendment should be adopted to ensure that the AFDC program can operate at levels sufficient to meet the needs of the poor.
2. In spite of meager payments to welfare recipients, inflation, changes in the federal welfare system, and increases in the number of recipients have caused the

current ceiling on assistance grants to become inadequate. The proposed constitutional amendment provides flexibility in determining that ceiling and thus eliminates the need to frequently amend the constitution to increase the spending limit.

Arguments against:

1. Welfare spending should be reduced. Instead of reductions, this amendment would contribute to spending increased by raising the ceiling on assistance grants. Emphasis should be placed on assuring that welfare money is spent only on those in need rather than increasing the amount spent.
2. The ceiling on assistance grants set in the proposed amendment for the years after the 1982-1983 biennium is too uncertain. The term "state budget" is not defined by the proposed amendment and this results in some ambiguity. The wording grants the legislature the authority to determine what constitutes one per cent of the state budget without providing necessary guidance. All funds appropriated by the legislature can be considered in determining the state budget, and this could include millions of dollars received in federal funds. If a variable ceiling is to be adopted, the wording of the amendment should set out that ceiling clearly and definitively.

Local Girl's Eyes, Other Organs Offer 'New Life'

Editor's Note: Following is a story written by Marilyn Hauk about "new life" given others by donation of eyes and kidneys of 7-year-old Paula Kinyon of Cross Plains by her mother, Phonda Kinyon, upon the local second grader's death. The story appeared in the September 27 morning edition of the Abilene Reporter-News for which Miss Hauk is a staff writer.

In late summer, Paula Kinyon bicycled to a relative's home here under the blazing West Texas sun after completing a day of classes at Cross Plains Elementary School. It was Aug. 24, the second day of classes for the 7-year-old second grade student.

The same day, 8-week-old Latoya Gates lay in darkness in her Wichita Falls home, unable to see the sunshine streaming through a window. Her grandfather and legal guardian, Clyde Thomas Wiggins, gazed at his granddaughter and wondered if the infant would grow up without knowing the beauty of a sunset.

In Fort Worth, 61-year-old Elwood Gregg, a native and long-time resident of Graham, spent the day with a patch over his right eye, pondering the news his physician had given him the day before — without an operation requiring human eye tissue, the retired dry-wall finisher would lose his sight in the patched eye. Just two months earlier, Gregg said, he thought the problems he was having with his eye were similar to problems he had in 1969 that required simple surgery.

The second grader, the infant and Gregg never would meet, but in four days, their lives would become entwined through a tragic accident that claimed the life of the Cross Plains girl. The Gates infant would see for the first time, and Gregg's eyesight would be saved because Rhonda Kinyon, Paula's mother, authorized donation of the girl's eyes to the Lions Eye Bank at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Paula never reached her relative's home, where she was to have spent the afternoon playing with other children, said her aunt, Vnez Newman of Cross Plains. The girl's bicycle traveled off a sidewalk and into a moving car, leaving the girl with a concussion and internal injuries, officials said.

Even though Paula was in a semi-coma from the time of her accident until she died four days later, her initial outlook for improvement was good, Mrs. Newman said. But the day after the girl's accident, swelling developed in her brain. The day before she died, Aug. 28, her brain registered no signs of activity.

Mrs. Kinyon said a doctor inquired about donating Paula's eyes to the eye bank when the results of the brain scan came back. "I was already thinking about it," Mrs. Kinyon said, explaining her grandfather had received a transplanted cornea.

Once her daughter's body no longer could sustain life on its own, Mrs. Kinyon said, she viewed it as an empty shell no longer of value to Paula. In addition to authorizing donation of her daughter's eyes, she also granted permission for her daughter's kidneys to be removed "so maybe two people could live."

Several weeks after Paula's death, Mrs. Kinyon said, she received a letter from the Southwest Organ Bank of Dallas with the news that a 21-year-old unidentified woman had been freed from dialysis by receiving one of the girl's kidneys.

From the time the girl died at 5:20 a.m. Aug. 28, a race was on to contact eye banks in outlying zones, line up recipients, transport the organs and complete surgery, said Irvin Hiler, secretary of the Abilene Lions Eye Bank and member of the Abilene Lions Club.

Louise Ballinger, director of the Lions Eye Bank in Fort Worth where the girl's eyes were transported, said the eyeballs must be removed, or enucleated, within three to six hours after death and the tissue must be transplanted within 48 hours.

Time is of such essence, Mrs. Ballinger explained, that ham radio operators throughout the state have developed the "net," a specific radio frequency used from 6:30 to 7 each evening by ham radio volunteers to converse about needs and supplies of eye banks statewide. By checking each evening, she explained, the tissues can be used before the 48-hour deadline.

When Paula's eyes were donated, Mrs. Ballinger said, the net

S. S. Numbers Can Be Obtained Quicker

New procedures recently put into operation allow Social Security numbers to be issued in two to three weeks after a person has applied and provided the required evidence and information, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Even with these new procedures, a person must provide evidence of his or her age, citizenship or immigrant status, and identity before a number can be issued. Only original documents or copies certified by the agency which issued them can be used. A person 18 or older applying for a Social Security number for the first time must apply in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a public, hospital or a religious record of birth recorded before age 5.

If these documents do not exist, one or more of the items in the following list can be used to establish age as well as identity:

Driver's license, state identity card, voter's registration, school record, divorce decree, work badge or building pass, labor union or fraternal organization record, draft card or military ID, military discharge papers, U. S. passport, U. S. citizen's ID card, newspaper birth announcement, adoption record, court order for name change, church record, welfare record, medical record, insurance policy, Boy Scout or Girl Scout record, or other document showing identifying data such as physical description, photograph, or signature.

People who are not U. S. citizens should provide the appropriate Immigration and Naturalization Service form as well as their foreign birth certificate.

More information about applying for Social Security numbers can be obtained at the Abilene Social Security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

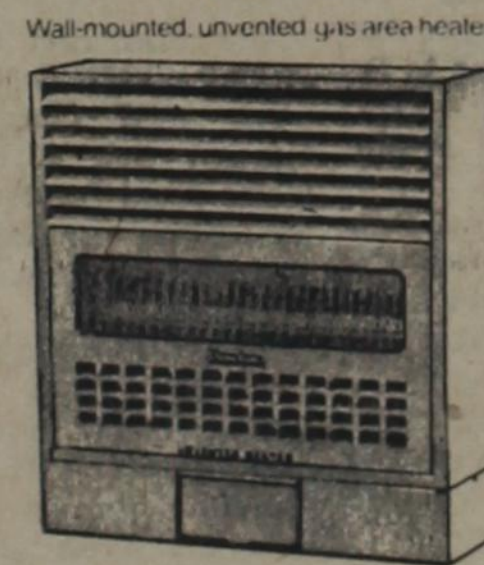

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

Texas Secretary of State David Dean did not have a good week. On one day, his well-intended efforts to purge felons from Texas voting lists led him into a threatened libel lawsuit.

Then later, his ruling that the name of a deceased state senator must remain on the Nov. 2 ballot was challenged vehemently by the Texas Democratic Party.

The double uproar was faithfully covered by the media, and, on the bright side for him, Dean's name identification was probably greatly increased across the state.

Survivor that he is, Dean will probably capitalize the incidents into votes whenever he decides to run for office himself, as he is expected to some day.

But for now, politically speaking, Dean finds himself caught in two cracks.

Felons List

Texas law prohibits convicted felons from voting, and as the state's chief election officer, Dean wanted to make sure the law was enforced.

He asked the Department of Public Safety for a list of convicted felons soon after a voter fraud investigation in South Texas turned up evidence that ex-convicts had voted illegally.

When DPS sent over a list, Dean compared it with his voter lists. He sent the names found on both lists to all local election officials for purging.

The trouble erupted for Dean when it was discovered that an Austin investor running for state representative was mistakenly included in the felons list which Dean had sent to Travis County officials. It might have all been resolved quietly if not for the fact that Dean is a Republican and the candidate, Jerry Angerman, is a Democrat running against a GOP incumbent.

What Dean apparently did not know is that the DPS list included both felonies and misdemeanors and had picked up on an old speeding citation for Angerman.

Angerman became an angry man, and held a press conference denouncing what he implied were Dean's efforts to sabotage his campaign. Other local Democrats joined in against Dean, labeling him from incompetent to "Nazi."

Angerman said he would file a libel lawsuit against Dean.

The DPS chief, meanwhile, said his staff had made it clear to Dean's office that the list contained both felonies and misdemeanors which could not be separated by the computer.

Deceased On Ballot?

Dean's troubles increased after State Sen. John Wilson, D-La-Grange, lost his courageous battle against cancer last week end.

The race was on to replace Wilson on the ballot, until Dean ruled that the senator had died just hours after the 45-day deadline prohibiting a replacement. The deadline was supposedly up on Saturday, and Wilson succumbed on Sunday.

Dean ruled that the Democrats could not find a replacement, and that only the names of the deceased Democrat and his Republican opponent could appear on the ballot.

Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle went full speed ahead anyway and the District 18 executive committee has named State Rep. John Sharp, D-Victoria, as the senatorial candidate.

The Democrats charged Dean was just trying to sneak in another Republican senator and bypass a fair election. They argue the law provides that, if the deadline falls on a week end or holiday, then the deadline is extended to the next working day: in this case Monday, the day after Wilson's death.

The dispute will probably wind up soon in the Texas Supreme Court.

Tribute to Wilson

If uncertainty now surrounds the seat which Sen. John Wilson occupied, it was not present when Wilson held it. He was widely respected for his prowess as a legislator.

Wilson, 43, knew for more than two years that he would die from inoperable lung cancer. He never smoked a day in his life.

Friends and political foes alike respected his skill and dedication, which became stronger as death came nearer. On Sept. 7 he was

sworn in as Senate president pro tem, helped from his wheelchair while his colleagues stood close to tears.

At his funeral, his eulogist read a message which Wilson, an avid hunter, had given a week earlier to deliver:

"I have had a good life, and I'm going to a better one. Just think of me as leaving a little ahead of the rest of you. Maybe I'll set up some duck blinds to be ready when you get there."

wasn't used because she had talked to Hiler, who already knew there was a need in Fort Worth. Eye tissue is used within the district it is donated if needed, Mrs. Ballinger said, and shipped to other parts of the state at Lions Club members' expense if necessary.

Hiler arranged for the eyes to be flown to the Fort Worth eye bank, and personnel there contacted Dr. Fred Feaster, an ophthalmologist who works closely with the eye banks.

In this case, both the Gates infant and Gregg were patients of Feaster, and he contacted both families. Mrs. Ballinger said if a physician can't reach a potential recipient within a reasonable amount of time, eye bank personnel must move to the next person on the waiting list so the tissue doesn't ruin.

The day after Paula's death, both Gregg and the infant underwent surgery at All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth. Faye Williams, Feaster's receptionist, said the infant had a cataract removed and cornea transplant while repairs were made to perforations in the outer layers of Gregg's eye.

In the infant's case, Mrs. Williams said, only the left eye was operable, and the cornea transplant will provide the only sight she ever will have.

Since the operations, Gregg said, he has experienced no further problems with his eye. And Wiggins said his granddaughter now follows objects with her eye.

"It's just like new life," Wiggins said of his granddaughter's operation. "I was so glad for her to have the sight — I just rejoiced."

Gregg's wife, Julia, said the experience had given her and her husband a new outlook on donating organs.

"Our feeling before was we've had enough surgery in life and
