While big package hay systems allow two round bales per cow (large roll balers and loose hay to compensate for additional constacks) help reduce labor and sumption realized when large equipment costs on many farms, packages are fed free-choice. they require special storage and Feed large packages in a rack feeding, says Greg Gerngross of to prevent trampling losses. Clements has now received the endorsements of four former Dem ocratic attorneys general and the widow of a fifth.

Democrats Waggoner Carr, Will Wilson, John Ben Shepperd and Gerald Mann have all thrown their support to Clements. In addition, Mrs. Margaret Martin, the widow of former attorney general Crawford Martin, also endorsed Clem-

The endorsements came on the heels of House Speaker Bill Clayton's "near endorsement" of Clements last week.

Automobile Insurance

The insurance industry this week inveiled its recommended increases in automobile insurance rates and asked the State Board of Insurance for nearly twice as much as recommended by the board's staff.

The Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office recommended an average statewide increase of 33.2 per cent for auto rates. That hike would generate an additional \$587 million for insurance companies. The SBI staff has recommended

only 17.3 per cent, or about \$306 million in additional revenues each

Te industry recommendation apparently would place the greater portion of the burden of higher rates on car owners in small cities and rural areas, with proposed rates for those areas higher than the staff proposal. Rates proposed for the large urban areas are less than those recommended by the board staff.

However, the industry recommendations were an average increase for each rating territory, while the staff figures were broken down for a particular type of



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
