

Super Effort Is Forthcoming In Kiwanis Clean-Up Drive

A super effort is being put forth by the Cross Plains Kiwanis Club to rid Cross Plains of unsightly trash, old vehicles, cast-off appliances and other debris during a one-day clean-up campaign Saturday, June 12.

The clean-up drive is being promoted by the Cross Plains Kiwanis Club. Cross Plains Garden Club has pledged its support to the undertaking.

O. B. Edmondson, clean-up drive chairman and Mayor of Cross Plains, said last week, "We are hoping to have a lot of participa-

tion in the drive, giving our city a thorough cleaning." He added, "We'll pick up almost anything which is not normally picked up by the city trash collector if it is placed where we can get to it or if we are notified no special equipment can be arranged for."

It was explained that for pick-up of large or heavier articles such as fallen trees or large limbs, abandoned or wrecked vehicles and appliances no longer used, City Hall should be called and arrangements made for removal of the item well in advance

of the clean-up date, June 12. "We'll pick up nearly anything, but hope that residents will understand why we will not collect household garbage such as the trash service handles," Edmondson noted.

It was re-stated that the clean-up will begin at 10 a.m. on June 12 in four sections of the city simultaneously. The township will be divided into four sections, and a group will be named, along with a captain, to pick up the trash in each respective section. "That way we can hopefully make a closer inspection of the area, make each street in the individual subdivisions and not miss any debris which is supposed to be removed."

Section captains selected at the Tuesday morning meeting of the Kiwanis Club were revealed as Joe Hanke, Jr., Eddie Petty, Mike Kelley and Rolan Jones. These men will select portions of the city they wish to cover, and will choose co-workers later, according to word from Edmondson.

There will be absolutely no charge for the trash removal, according to local Kiwanis Club officers, by the same token sponsors ask that the debris be placed at spots as convenient as possible to get to and that special arrangements are made ahead of time for extra large or heavy articles.

Demo Runoff Vote Set For Saturday

Democratic Party's Second (run-off) Primary Election will be held across Texas Saturday, June 5.

An exceptionally light voter turnout is expected at the polls which will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in Cross Plains as well as elsewhere all over Texas. Voting will be done at the Cross Plains City Hall locally, that is for residents of Callahan County Voting

Precinct 3. The foreseen small number of votes expected is attributed to no hot statewide race and an absence of local races.

Only four contests will appear on the Callahan County ballot. Two are for statewide offices and two are for places on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Alton E. Hornsby, Democratic Chairman of this precinct, noted that any qualified voter who did not vote in another party's primary last May is eligible to vote in the runoff primary. He asked that pollsters have registration cards readily available when voting Saturday to make the balloting easier and cause fewer delays.

Democratic nomination for the Attorney General's office and for the office of Land Commissioner are both up for bids. Jim Mattox and John Hannah face each other in the Attorney General's race, and Garry Mauro and Pete Snelson are opponents in the Commissioner of General Land Office contest.

Charles F. "Chuck" Campbell, Jr. and John E. Humphreys are facing each other in the race for the Democratic nomination for Judge Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1.

Asking the Democratic Party's blessing for the same position, judge on the Court of Criminal Appeals, in Place 2 are Chuck Miller and Bill Black.

There are no county runoff races. There were no countywide contested races in the first primary. Three justice of the peace positions were challenged in the county in the first balloting.

Voting will be held in the same place for Saturday's runoff as was the initial balloting in the eight

precincts across Callahan County. They are listed as Baird Precinct 1, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 2, Lions Club Building; Cross Plains Precinct 3, City Hall; Putnam Precinct 4, Community Center; Eula Precinct 5, old school auditorium; Denton Valley Precinct 6, First Baptist Church; Opalin Precinct 7, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 8, at high school cafeteria.

6.85 Inches Of Rain Gauged Last Month

May was by far the wettest month thus far in 1982 with an inch more being recorded during the month than was measured during the first four months of the year.

One local gauge measured 6.85 inches during May, and up until that time it had gauged 5.85 inches. Aggregate stood at 12.79 inches at noon Tuesday.

May began with 1.15 inches on the first day followed by another 2.10 inches on the fifth. A two-day 1.50 total on May 12-13 added to the total of .30 gauged here in two showers May 17-18.

Monday of last week .65 of an inch fell followed by 1.00 on Tuesday and .15 more on Wednesday.

The agricultural outlook is bright for pastures and crops planted, but some hot dry weather is needed to plant peanuts, some hay crops and cotton and for the grain harvest.

Breakdown of monthly rainfall is as follows: January 1.55, February 1.60, March 1.70, April 1.00 and May 6.85 inches.

Land Heritage Program Seeks Qualified Tracts

"This year we're hoping to surpass the 1,500 mark in the total number of Texas properties registered in our Family Land Heritage Program," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

"And we certainly hope individuals interested in history or agriculture in Callahan County will help us by bringing in as many qualified applicants into the program as possible."

"Mrs. John Berry, Callahan County Historical Commission chairperson, and Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen, will be working with us on the program," Brown said.

Since 1974, the program has honored 1,443 Texas properties.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is entering its 8th year in sponsoring the program which honors "those families that have persevered for a century or more in the cultivation and production of food and fiber," Brown said. "Undoubtedly, these families, with their unflinching determination have been the backbone of Texas agriculture."

The registration period will extend from May 15 to August 15.

Those who qualify are honored in state ceremonies and receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry. The publication has a brief history of each farm or ranch and includes old photographs of the families and homes.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Gov. Bill Clements once again is getting exactly what he wants from the Texas Legislature.

Only four days after the start of the special session he called for the repeal of the state ad valorem tax, Clements already had achieved that victory.

Both the House and Senate voted overwhelmingly to adopt a proposed amendment to repeal the property tax. The amendment will be submitted to the voters when they go to the polls Nov. 2.

House Speaker Bill Clayton ramrodded the property tax repeal through the House with little opposition, but the measure was delayed temporarily in the Senate by a group of Democrats that wanted to save at least a portion of the tax to create a dedicated fund to finance construction at 17 state universities that do not participate in the Permanent University Fund.

Those schools received construction funds from the property tax prior to a 1979 legislative action reducing the assessment rate so low that the tax was virtually eliminated.

The supporters of the dedicated fund proposal eventually gave up their opposition when it became apparent that they could not muster the necessary votes to deny the tax repeal the two-thirds majority required for passage.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin, one of the governor's most vocal critics, called the repeal an "empty gesture" since the tax hasn't been collected in three years.

Clements, however, has contended that Texans might be called on to pay nearly \$1 billion in back taxes if a lawsuit challenging the 1979 action is successful.

The governor has said lawmakers can address a permanent funding solution for the non-PUF colleges in 1983, and legislation to appropriate \$130 million in interim funding is pending in the House.

However, Doggett says the chances of passing a dedicated fund in the next legislative session are slim because Clements, "for all practical purposes," opposes such action.

Prison Funding

And tax repeal isn't the only issue that is getting quick action.

The Senate already has approved legislation to provide \$50 million to help speed up construction of additional prison units to relieve overcrowding in state prisons and passed three proposed constitutional amendments to raise interest rates the state can pay on water bonds, exempt farm tools from ad valorem taxes and correct an error in an earlier amendment setting a limit on welfare expenses.

Those actions came only two days after the governor opened the call of the special session to those issues, and the House is poised to take similar action soon.

The prison bill, however, is expected to go to conference committee, because the House Appropriations Committee has recommended some \$24 million more than approved by the Senate.

With action proceeding rapidly, the special session should be extremely short.

The Devil's Hand

Gov. Clements has been the object of many caustic remarks by Port Arthur Sen. Carl Parker, but probably none that resulted in more snickers on the Senate floor than the Gulf Coast Democrat's barb suggesting the governor is exerting a "satanic" influence over the state's lawmakers.

On the opening day of the special session, the Rev. Gerald Mann, the Senate chaplain known for his one-line invocations, offered the following prayer:

"May this special session be adjourned at least 19 minutes before the devil knows it has convened. Amen."

"The devil called it," Parker shouted in reply.

Sherman Endorsement

Former college president Max Sherman, the man who ran third in the Democratic primary race for attorney general, has endorsed fellow Democrat John Hannah for that post.

Hannah, a former U. S. attorney from Tyler, is battling Dallas Congressman Jim Mattox in the June 5 Democratic runoff.

Sherman said he is supporting Hannah because of the kind of campaign he has run and his reputation among lawyers.

Sherman described Hannah's

campaign as "positive and dignified."

Mattox has accused Hannah of misleading voters to believe he is a law school graduate when he actually obtained his law license under a state law that allows legislators to take the state bar examination without completing law school.

The winner of the Hannah-Mattox runoff will face Sen. Bill Meier, R-Eules, in the general election.

Drunk Drivers

1983 is shaping up as the year that the Legislature will get tough on drunk drivers.

Several anti-liquor groups and at least one senator have already called for tougher penalties for motorists found guilty of driving while intoxicated, and now Gov. Clements has joined that bandwagon.

Clements has pledged to target drunk drivers in the 1983 legislative session in much the same way he went after drug dealers and other criminals in 1981.

Clements says such legislation will be "at the very forefront of my 1983 anti-crime package." However, he still must defeat Democrat Mark White in November if he is to be around to submit that proposal.

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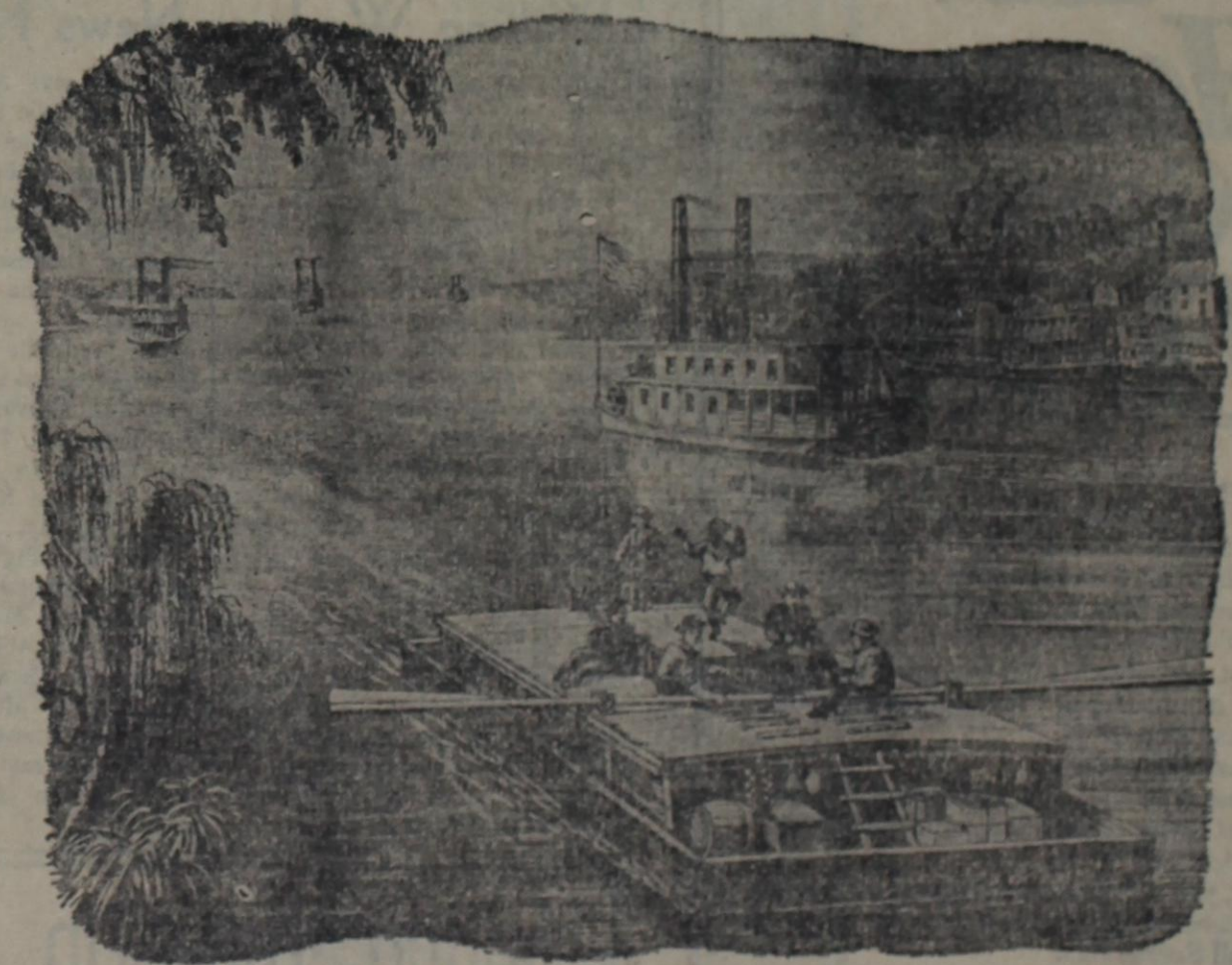
