

"May this special session be adjourned at least 10 minutes before the devil knows it has convened. Amen "



First wheat of the season bought in Cross Plains was sold by A. H. | freshments by Becky Self and Beverly Purdue. Ringhoffer to Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, Inc. Monday, Memorial Day.

It was grown on the Ringhoffer home place three miles southeast of Cross Plains, and was marketed by A. H. Ringhoffer of Baird. The 24,000 pounds sold was of the Vona variety, and according to the buyer, who paid \$3.60 per bushel for the new-crop wheat, tested 62 pounds with 12.4 per cent moisture.

"It was good wheat," said James Lawrence.

The buyer said no estimate was made on the yield per acre, and indicated local producers believe individual crops this year can range from good to poor.

Another local buyer was expecting to buy a load of wheat on Tuesday afternoon.

Many producers say that some wheat will be out this week, if the weather permits, but harvest will move into full swing in a week or longer, depending on the




