Carolyn's Corner

Following is a recipe for homemade ice cream I ran across in a newsletter sent to the Review.

HOMEMADE PEANUT BUTTER

FUDGE ICE CREAM

6 eggs
1 C. sugar
6 C. fresh whole milk
1 1/2 C. creamy peanut butter
1 (13 oz.) can evaporated milk
1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
2 C. chopped roasted peanuts
1 C. chocolate syrup
Fresh whole milk

Mix eggs, sugar and whole milk well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to thicken. Add peanut butter and mix well. Cool. Add evaporated milk, sweetened condensed milk and peanuts. Fold in chocolate syrup. Pour into freezer container and add whole milk to the fill line. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions.

Texans will see some Ruby Red grapefruit in the stores this year, and when they do they'd better grab them. "The only way someone could get hurt eating a Texas watermelon is if they got hit in a seed-spitting contest," Texas Department of Agriculture Assistant Commissioner for Marketing Susan DeMarco has said. "Texas has been marketing watermelon commercially for 50 years, with half of the 220,000-ton annual crop shipped out of state, largely to the Midwest. We know of no health problems ever associated with eating Texas melons," said DeMarco.

"Every year Texas harvests over 42,000 acres of watermelon. It's a \$34 million-a-year crop for our farmers. The recent pesticide contamination problems associated with California-grown melons have hurt consumer sales nationwide. To help ensure the marketability of Texas-grown watermelon, TDA will make special use of its Taste of Texas logo," DeMarco said. "Taste of Texas price cards will be available to Texas melon growers/shippers and produce buyers for use by retail stores in both Texas and in other states. The purpose of the price card is to help consumers identify Texas-grown melons.

"The red-white-and-blue Taste of Texas logo is a trademark of TDA that Texas food processors and retail stores now use in their individual marketing and sales strategies. By special use of the Taste of Texas logo, Texas melon growers and shippers can reassure consumers that when purchasing a Texas watermelon, they are buying the freshest, sweetest and safest melons grown in the United States."

In announcing the clinic, it was pointed out that if further follow-up examinations are needed, the individual will be referred to his private physician or other appropriate resources. Counseling and educational services are available.

The public is invited to attend, and there will be no charge for these services, it was explained.

\$17.6 Million New Total For Customer Savings

West Texas Utilities Co. has increased by \$3.9 million the amount of fuel cost savings it wants to refund to its customers, bringing the total to \$17.6 million.

This amount reflects the fuel cost savings achieved in June, and a lump sum refund of the remaining balance reconciled in the company's last rate case.

The June fuel savings totals \$1.6 million with interest. The figures for June are not available when the original request to refund \$13.7 million was filed with the Public Utility Commission on July 2.

The additional \$2.3 million represents a lump refund of

fuel cost savings balance, plus interest, realized prior August 1984. Under the commission's order in the company's last general rate case, refund of the total savings commenced in mid-November 1984 and is scheduled to be completed in November 1985.

The company estimates that the increased refund will add about \$9 to the \$32 refund already requested, for a typical residential customer.

A pre-conference hearing had been set for Tuesday, July 16, on WTU's refund request before the Public Utility Commission in Austin.

Council Awards \$86,995 Contract On City Park

City Council of Cross Plains awarded a \$86,995 contract for construction of a city park on 5.3 acres of land immediately north of the new Community Center building on Beech Street at East 9th Street.

The contract was awarded during a called session of the city governing panel Tuesday during the noon hour.

Construction will be done by George Lee Construction Co. of Abilene, who is to finish the project in 60 days. The bid letter was delayed at least twice to trim cost of the project to keep it in line with money available. Funds being used are those which remain from a federal grant

from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In addition to limited landscaping, primary structure called for is a covered pavilion with concrete floor and rest rooms. Other facilities include regular playground unit, picnic units (tables) and a multi-purpose

court for use as tennis, volleyball or basketball court.

Council members present for the called session were Mayor Frank Robertson, and aldermen Richard Wilson, Ray Purvis and Ernest Cortez. John Sharp and Tim Bishop were not present for the vote.

Drilling Bits

CORNETT OIL TELLS OF NEW GAS WELL

The Tull No. 1 well potential 128 barrels per day with 192 MCF of gas upon completion by Cornett Oil, Inc. of Rosenberg, Texas. The Callahan County well was tested after fracturing, flowing on the casing with 400 PSI and pumping the tubing against a 20/64 choke with 155 PSI tubing pressure. The shut in surface pressure was 1,145 PSI. Both wells were drilled using Union Carbide's new DVX mud system.

The two wells have proven two zones productive of the four found by Cornett's Mississippian discovery well of the Dorris Field. Cornett's interest is 30 percent, with private investors having the remainder of the 1,100 acre prospective.

Isom Energy and Resources of Big Lake has completed the No. 2 F.L. Merrill one mile east of Pioneer in the Barton (Lower Caddo) Field.

Site is 2,130 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of section 20,

Block 2 ETRR Survey.

Absolute open flow was 170,000 cubic feet of gas daily with gas-liquid, hydrocarbon ratio of 260,000-1 of 39 gravity. Production is from perforations at 2,401 to 2,523 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 500 gallons of water and 100 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 2,560 feet total depth.

Locations have been staked for two proposed 1,500-ft., wildcats.

Meekle Energy Co. Inc. of Cross Plains, No. 6-A Roy Jones will be drilled one-half-mile south of Cross Cut.

Location is in a 265-acre lease, spotting 150 feet from the south and east lines of W.W. Newton Survey.

Other wildcat in R and G Oil Co., Roze Oil Co. Division, from Farmington, N.M., No. 1 Goss.

It will be drilled on a 124-acre lease two miles south of Rising Star. Drillsite is 150 feet from the north and 1,550 feet from the west lines of Section 16,

"Do You Have The Evidence?"

PART ONE

Today great controversy swirls about the Baptism in the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in tongues. Most Christians will agree that "tongues" were in evidence during the Apostolic days, but have been taught that this ended when the last Apostle died; and that it isn't for us today. However, what do the Scriptures say?

From prophecies in the old Testament throughout the New Testament we see references to this spiritual experience. Joel 2:28, 29 says, "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions; and also upon the servants and upon the handmaids in those days will I pour out my Spirit." In Isaiah 28:11, it says, "For with stammering lips and another tongue will He speak to this people." We find many scriptures in the New Testament teaching us more about this. Acts 2:38, 39 confirms that this experience is for TODAY: "...ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. For the Promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." This doesn't sound like an offer with an expiration date on it. We shouldn't be surprised that people from every denominational background are being baptized in the Holy Ghost, because our Father said He was going to do it.

Many people have been taught that the "evidence of speaking with other tongues" has been done away with and is unnecessary today. Let us check this teaching out in the scriptures and see what God's Holy Word says about it. In Luke 24:49 the Lord told his disciples that He would send the promise of the Father upon them, but that they should tarry in the City of Jerusalem until they were endued with POWER from on high. In Acts 2:4 we see that when the day of Pentecost arrived, all 120 believers received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit with the evidence of speaking in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. This included not only the 12 Apostles but all the 120 people present, and set the original pattern for receiving the Holy Spirit.

We notice in Acts 9:17 where Paul was filled with the Holy Ghost. Did he speak in other tongues? He obviously did according to the remarks in I Cor. 14:18, "I thank God I speak with tongues more than ye all." Paul claimed that his experience should be a pattern for all who should there after believe in Christ. (I Tim. 1:16)

The first Gentiles to receive what the Jews had received was the house of Cornelius. Peter and some others were sent to preach to them, and when they believed on the Lord Jesus, then the gift of the Holy Ghost was poured out on them. How did the Jews know this? They were astonished, "For they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God." Afterwards they were baptised in water. (Acts 10:44-48)

Twenty-five years after Pentecost, Paul came to Ephesus and asked the Believers there if they had received the Holy Ghost since they had believed. They replied that they had not even heard such. After they were baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus, Paul laid his hands upon them, and the Holy Ghost came upon them; and they spoke with tongues, and prophesied." (Acts 19:2-6) This proves the experience was not just a "one time" happening on the Day of Pentecost.

In the eighth chapter of Acts, a great revival took place in Samaria, and many miracles were performed and many received the Holy Ghost. Simon the Sorcerer was so impressed that he offered money to Peter and John to receive the same power. This surely indicates that when Peter and John laid hands on the people to receive the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, there was some manifestation that he observed as proof that some dramatic change had taken place. Only a supernatural power, like speaking in tongues, could have motivated Simon to offer money for the unique ability to produce this result.

Among the gifts given to members of the Church (Body of Christ), Paul lists, "divers kinds of tongues". (I Cor. 12:10) Despite tradition to the contrary, we cannot find where God has withdrawn these gifts from the Church; although a spiritually lukewarm condition in the Church, as a whole, has caused the gifts to cease to function. Some base their traditional belief that God has withdrawn the gifts from the church on I Cor. 13:8, which says, "Whether there be tongues they shall cease". But the context to which this statement has reference, is not to the present time, but to the 'perfect age' — "But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away." (I Cor. 13:10) Everyone knows that perfect age is not yet come, and the gifts of the Spirit will continue to be manifest until the "day of our Lord Jesus Christ." Paul admonished the people at Corinth "to come behind in no gift!" (I Cor. 1:7, 8)

Those who dispute the validity of tongues like to use the scripture, I Cor. 12:29, 30. Paul says here, "Have all the gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues?" They should realize that throughout this chapter, Paul was talking about Spiritual Gifts. Careful reading, starting with verse eight, lists all the "gifts of the Spirit", which includes the gift of diverse tongues. This gift of tongues is what Paul referred to in verse 30. This particular gift of the Spirit is the ability to speak out in a tongue unlearned by that person (Acts 2:8). On the other hand, upon receiving the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, there is given a prayer tongue with which to communicate spiritual with God. (I Cor. 13:1, 14:2) Notice the difference in "diverse tongues" and "unknown tongues".

Another scripture which gives rise to the objections to tongues is I Cor. 14:19: "I had rather speak five words with my understanding than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue." Reading the whole 14th chapter put an entirely different impression on what Paul is saying. Obviously, the Church had become unbalanced in their services, and Paul was teaching them the proper use of tongues in the service. He was teaching that all things be done in decency and order. He didn't tell them not to speak in tongues in the service, but he said, "I would that ye all spake in tongues." (Verse 5) Also, "I thank my God I speak with tongues more than ye all" (v. 18) and, "Forbid not to speak with tongues." (v. 39)

May Sales Up But Below '84

Local sales tax payment made to Cross Plains this month was up considerably over that of a year ago, but the year's aggregate is still below that of 1984.

According to a report from Bob Bullock, State Comptroller, City of Cross Plains received \$4,566.10 in the latest payments released by his office. That was \$1,281.33 more than that made for the same period in 1984, that is contributions made in May and paid this year from the state are still below that received during the same time period a year ago. State figures reveal that city coffers have gotten \$32,800.52 through May this year, and in 1984 that total was \$34,337.19.

Clyde continues to far outdistance all other communities in Callahan County in terms of amounts of rebates and percentage of growth. Bullock reported a check of \$899.44 was issued for May, giving an aggregate of \$46,178.91 for 1985. The overall gain is 19.77 percent, over a total in 1984 at the same time of \$38,557.70. May receipts last year amounted to \$3,585.85.

Putnam also showed a gain of 14.22 percent on respective totals of \$7,799.30 and \$6,828.19, and monthly comparisons of \$1,090.94 and \$1,044.69.

Baird also continues to show sales tax rebate declines with a loss of 17.05 percent reflected in figures of \$16,695.62 and \$20,126.51. Last month's sales tax return showed a marked gain, however, with the May check totaling \$1,475.71 to last year's rebate of \$961.25.
