

Dust Storms And Frost Hit As Spring Arrives

Although no rain fell during the past week, the weather picture has not been dull in this section of Texas.

Tuesday of last week a dust storm of major proportions struck, turning Saint Patrick's Day green to a dirty brown. It brought darkness prematurely as high wind whipped local dirt into the air to mingle with that brought here from elsewhere.

The last day of winter, Thursday, dawned cold, and some frost and ice were reported. Tender young plants were nipped in several places around the countryside, but it is believed that most of the fruit trees escaped damage. It is believed, at least, that not all the fruit crop was damaged by the frost. Temperatures were reported about the freezing mark, although some residents reported below freezing readings.

A windy week was capped Saturday, first full day of spring, by the return of the dust and dirt, a repeat performance of Tuesday's weather, or worse. Extremely high winds howled late into the night and early Sunday morning, although the dust had given away to clouds at daybreak Sunday.

Only major damage reported was to a dairy barn shed at the Randy Foster place where a large section of the sheet iron roof was ripped from the structure late Saturday night.

Agricultural prospects still loom bright, however with rainfall above normal at 7.75 inches in 1981. Greenbugs continue to destroy small grain although

most producers are chemically fighting the pests, and winds are crusting gardens and fields. Most gardens, pastures and grain crops are showing rapid growth with the nights warming.

USDA Threat To Abolish Peanut Program Talked

According to Ross Wilson, Secretary of the National Peanut Growers Group, it appears that an all out effort will be made by the Reagan Administration to make major changes in the peanut program. He said that Agriculture Secretary John Block has informed Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Georgia State Agriculture Commissioner Tommy Irvin that USDA will seek to abolish the peanut acreage allotment system.

Such a change in peanut legislation would enable anyone who so desires to produce peanuts. Poundage quotas would also be phased out under the USDA proposal by reducing present farm quotas 10 per cent per year during the period 1982-1985. The administration proposal also calls for the current quota support rate to be maintained throughout the life of the bill. The end result of the administration proposal, Wilson said, would be elimination of the traditional peanut program.

Wilson said indications, that USDA planned such legislative changes were picked up by growers attending House Agriculture Committee Hearings in Washington on March 18. He said meetings by growers with Under Secretary Seeley Lodwick on March 19 confirmed that the department was considering elimination of the allotment provision. Further, he said a meeting on the same day between Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Agriculture Secretary Block confirmed the intent of USDA to proceed with such a plan.

Growers are shocked by the administration plan for drastic program changes since Secretary Block had assured growers in a meeting in Washington on February 6 that the administration would not do anything to

destroy the present peanut program. Further, growers feel that they had a commitment from Reagan Campaign leaders prior to the November 4, 1980, presidential election.

National Peanut Growers Group officials say that a dismantling of the peanut acreage allotment system together with further substantial cuts in farm poundage quotas would mean the end of the peanut program in any meaningful form. By 1985 former allotment holders and non allotment holders would produce and market peanuts on the same basis. Therefore, peanut production would probably shift from many sections traditionally planted to peanuts to sections with greater production potential. However, due to high risks involved in peanut production and high production costs it is believed that peanut supplies would be erratic resulting in increased prices to consumers. In

A March 31 deadline has been set for area farmers planning to participate in the Federal Crop Insurance program sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

According to FCIC district director Ardell Kalmbach, the deadline will apply to cotton and grain sorghum producers in Bosque, Coryell, Ellis, Hamilton, Hill, Johnson, McLennan, Navarro, Robertson and Travis counties. Also, the grain sorghum producers in Callahan, Erath and Hamilton counties.

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is a voluntary program designed to protect a producer's annual crop investment. Coverage is provided against such risks as hail, drought, insects and disease.

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PUBLIC NOTICE OF TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS

The Cross Plains Independent School District tax office is currently applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 725-6312.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Cross Plains Independent School District Campus located directly behind the elementary building.

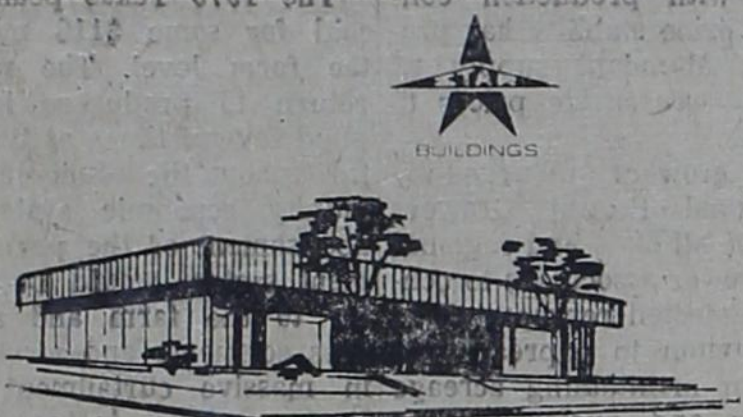

SSI Payments Total \$7.5 Billion In '80

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments of over \$352 million were paid to some 262,000 needy aged, blind, and disabled people in Texas last fiscal year, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

Some 4.2 million people are now receiving SSI. In fiscal 1980 payments totaled about \$7.5 billion, including \$5.7 billion in federal funds and \$1.8 billion in state funds.

The SSI program is a federally-administered program that provides a basic cash income to people in financial need who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled. Currently, SSI provides up to \$238 for one person and \$357 for an eligible couple in monthly benefits.

"Everyone that qualifies for SSI will not receive that amount," Hammons said. "Some may get less because they have other income, while some may get more if they live in a state that adds money to the federal payment."

SSI is not the same as Social Security, even though the program is administered by the Social Security Administration. Money for SSI checks comes from general funds of the U. S. Treasury, while Social Security benefits are paid from payroll taxes.

Dear Editor: We now know that the little coterie of pro-Communists that guided our government's Latin America policies throughout the Carter Administration knowingly set the stage for the assassination of Anastasio Somoza in his Paraguayan exile. The exile and all the steps that led to the final act were planned from the benning by men who knew precisely what they were doing.

Somoza, the life-long devoted friend of the United States, presented an immovable obstacle to the Castro-Torrijos-Sandinista master plan of a Communist takeover of Central America. He had to be obliterated.

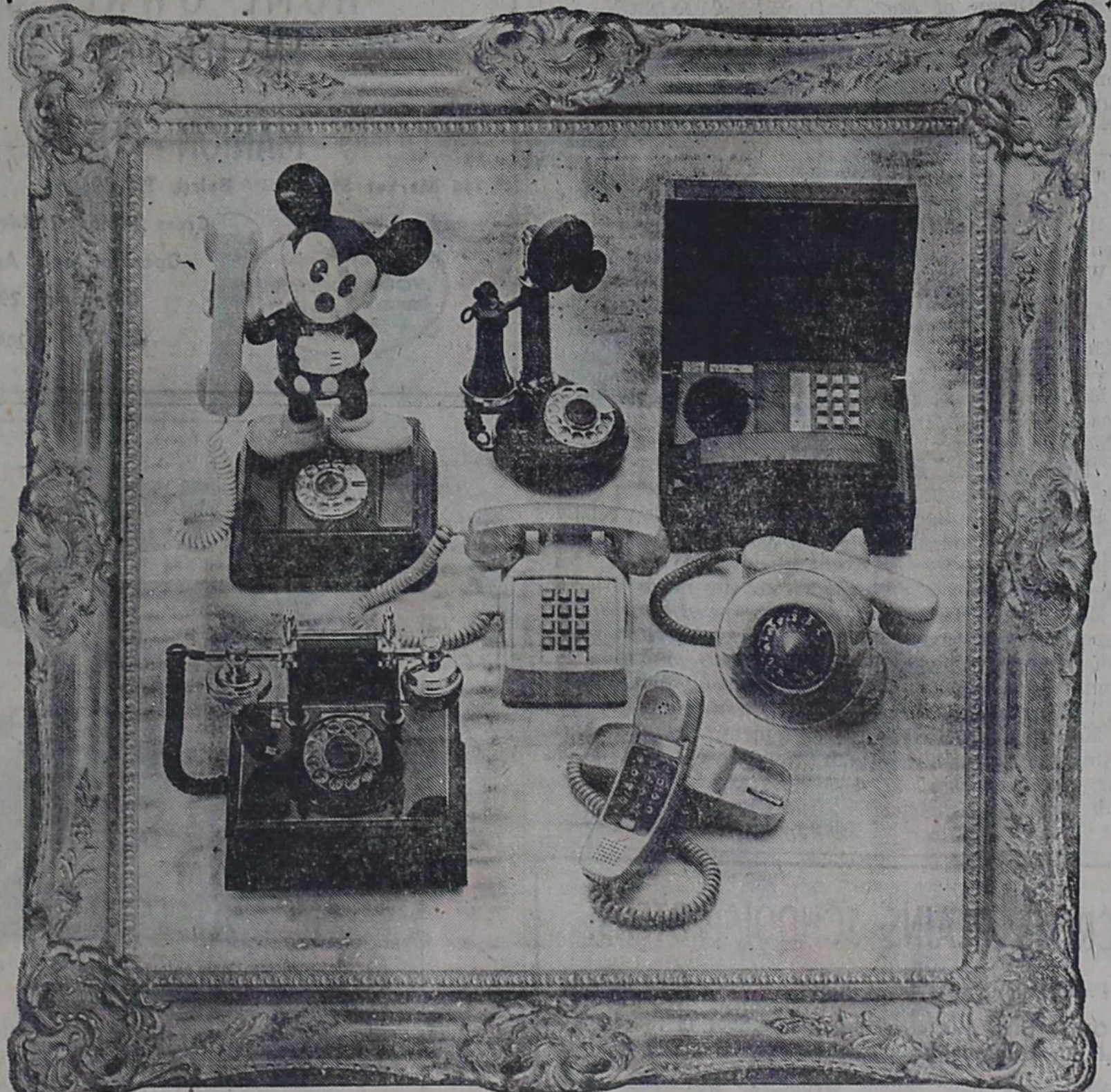
Fortunately for the sake of history, Somoza, in exile, spent the last bitter months of his life chronicling, with the writer Jack Cox, the actual happenings in Nicaragua during his Presidency. His book, "Nicaragua Betrayed", published by Western Islands (Belmont, MA 02178) only weeks before his assassination, demolishes the myth that the Nicaraguan people were behind the Sandinistas and against Somoza. The exact opposite was true. The command for Somoza's exile, which actually turned out to be his death warrant, came directly from President Carter.

Somoza's book is a nightmarish account of the repeated interferences of Washington in his Nicaragua rule after he first rejected abdication. A succession of outside bodies — the O.A.S. Observer Team and numerous other intruders with equally fine-sounding names — descended like vultures upon the hapless country. To weaken Somoza, Washington temporarily cut off not only U. S. military aid to Nicaragua but also its former quota of loans from international bodies, which were necessary for Nicaraguan survival.

In the face of such harassment, Somoza announced that he would surrender the Presidency at the expiration of his term in 1981. But even this was not enough. The command came from Washington that he must go immediately. In the end, Somoza lost and Communism won. Washington celebrated the victory by handing out 75 million dollars to the incoming Communist regime.

Pay Taxes Due, But Not In Cash - IRS

Cash should never be sent through the mail to pay federal income taxes, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the cash payment should be lost, stolen, or destroyed, the taxpayer would have no record of payment.

Using a check or money order is much safer for two reasons, the IRS adds. First, either is hard to steal, and secondly, the cancelled check or money order receipt will serve as a record of payment.

Taxpayers should also be sure to write their Social Security number, the tax period and the form for which the payment is being made on the check or money order. In the event the payment is separated from the tax return, proper credit can still be given to the taxpayer's account.

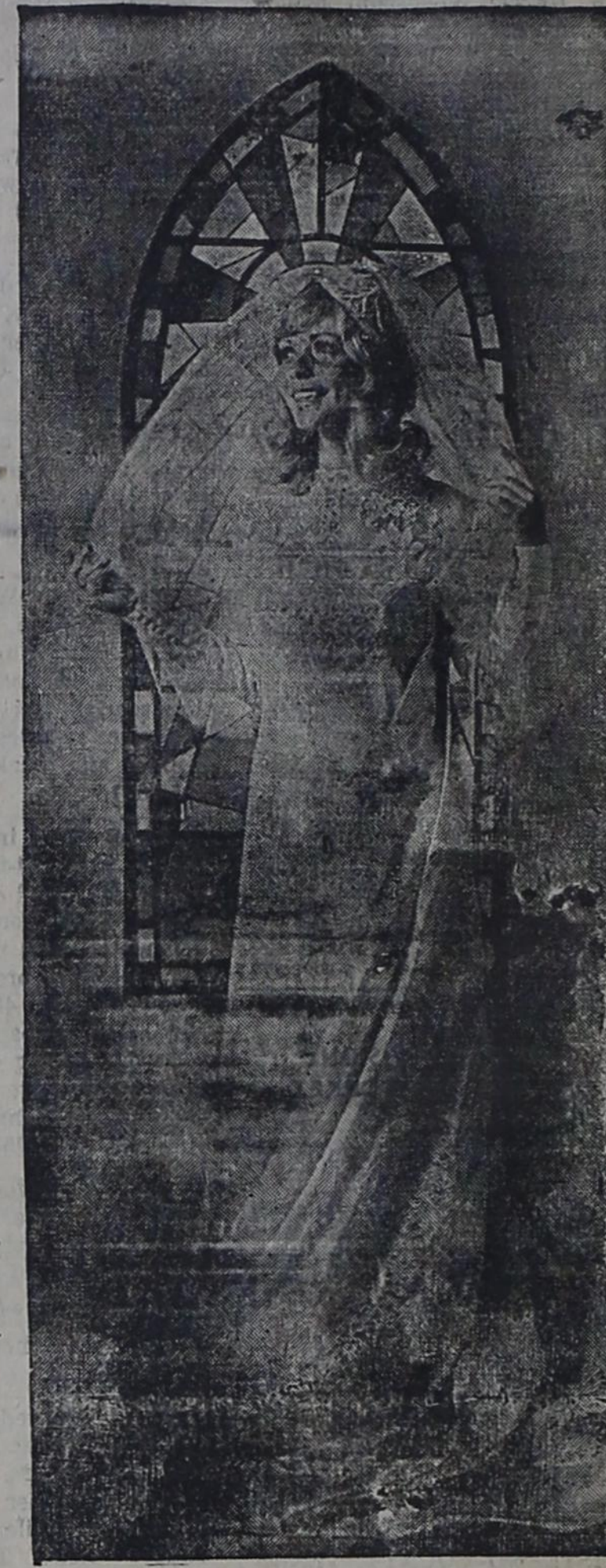

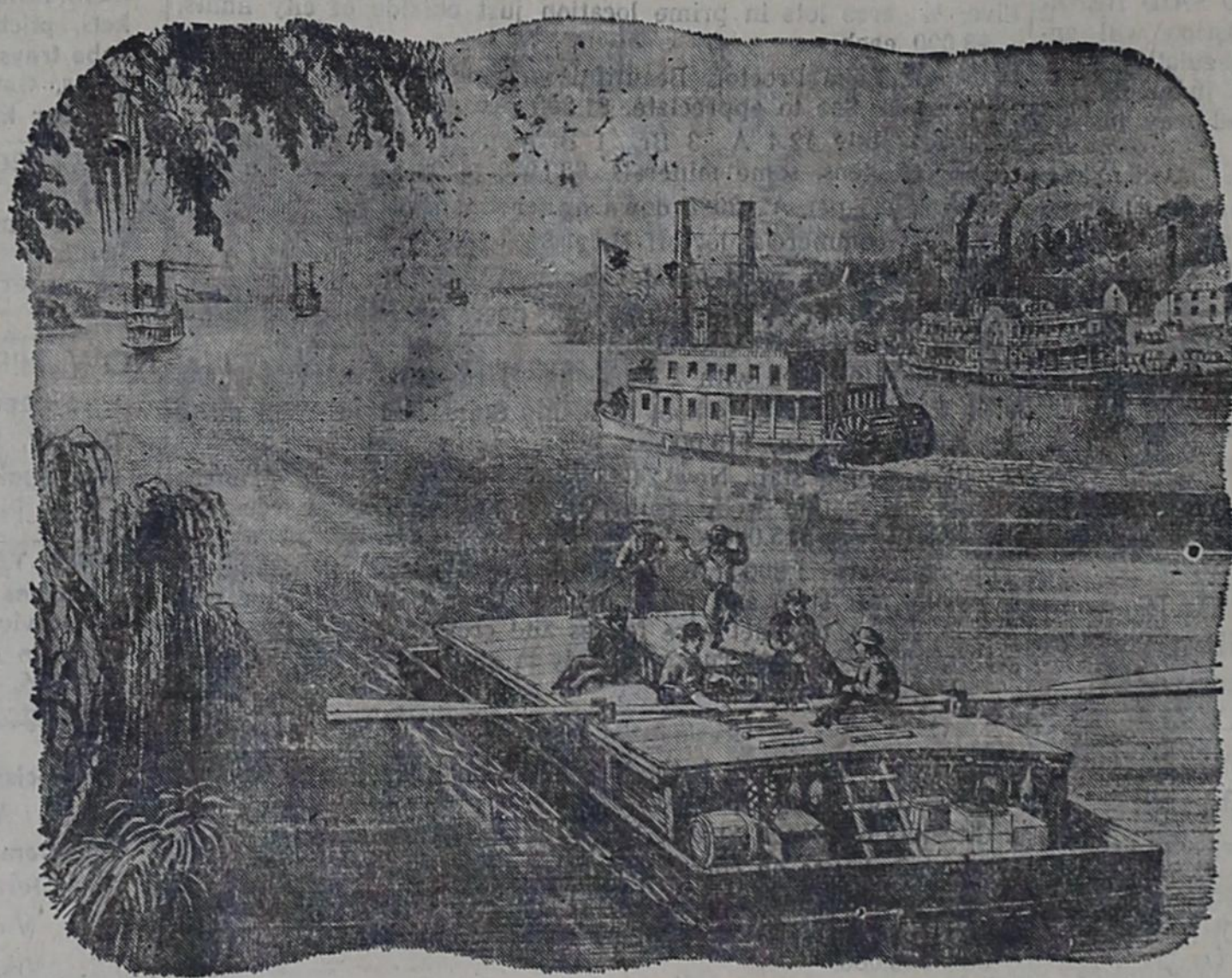

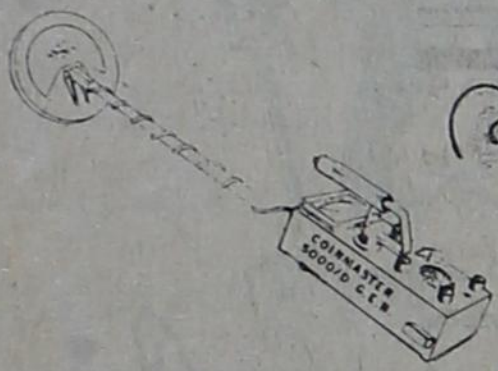
