Helms-Backed Peanut Bill Passes Senate Committee

Editor's Note: Following is an article from the National Peanut Grower's Group at Gorman concerning the peanut bill for 1981. The article follows.

"According to Ross Wilson, secretary, National Peanut Growers Group, the Senate committee on agriculture, nutrition and forestry on April 3 passed a peanut bill sponsored by Senator Jesse Helms, committee chairman. The bill was passed following the defeat of an amendment offered by Senator Richard Lugar of Indiana aimed at abolishing peanut acreage allotments and poundage quotas. Senator Lugar announced plans in a press conference on April 28 to introduce his proposal in 1981 farm bill deliberations. Lugar described the allotment system as archaic, out of kilter with today's farm programs and totally indefensible. He said the average allotment rental rate of \$115 artificially inflates the retail price of peanut production by 20 per cent. Lugar's amendment was sharply challenged by Senator Howell Heflin of Alabama who strongly defended the allotment and quota system as an integral part necessary in marketing peanuts which he said are perishable and more closely resemble milk than soybeans, cotton or wheat. Heflin

observed that the leasing of peanut allotments is no different from leasing crop land for corn or soybeans in Indiana. In fact, he said 50 per cent of all crops are grown on leased land.

"In passing the Helms' bill the Senate committee also rejected the Administration peanut bill which also would have abolished allotments in 1982 and phased out poundage quotas.

"The Helms' bill as passed by the committee calls for a quota support rate of \$650 per ton and a minimum national poundage quota of 1,300,000 tons to be adjusted as domestic edible use increases. Unlike the House bill there is no automatic quota support adjustment clause. Committee staff officials indicated some "trimming" of bills passed by the committee prior to approval of the omnibus farm bill for consideration by the Senate. Commodity sections of the proposed farm bill as passed by the Senate committee are generally calling for expenditures in excess of the Administration's budget estimates. Without some modifications in the various commodity sections to lower costs Washington observers point toward possible defeat of the bill or a Presidential veto.

"Washington observers estimate that the farm bill may reach the Senate floor by mid-June."

Allotment Variance Error Small In '81 Crop Peanuts

County Executive Director Melanie Covington at the ASCS office in the courthouse at Baird has advised that in the past all peanut farms with an effective allotment greater than zero were measured and given an opportunity to adjust back to the applicable allotment. In 1981 15 per cent of the peanut farms will be selected at random and measured. If excessive errors are found this sample will be increased.

Peanut farms that are found to be overplanted by more than the administrative variance will not be able to plow up and a marketing quota penalty will be due.

The A. V. is the larger of 0.1 acres or two per cent of the allotment, so as you can see the room for error is small," the director says.

"Measurement service is available, either early measurement or pre-measurement, if you are not certain of the crop acreage. Inaccurate crop reporting can cause loss of program benefits and price support eligibility in

the case of peanuts," she said. The fee for measurement service is nominal when compared to quota penalties and/or loss of program benefits, the official continued.

A producer must plant at least .6290 of the effective allotment to be eligible for undermarketings in 1982. At least 47.18 per cent of the effective allotment must be planted to be able to transfer quota pounds at harvest time.

"June 14 is the last date to transfer peanut allotment and quota, and July 15 is the final date to certify peanut acreage to this office," the director said.

SSI Resources Law Changes Are Told

There has been an important change in the law concerning the resource rules for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program.

Before passage of Public Law 96-611 there was no legal restriction against a person transferring ownership, or giving away, a resource to become eligible for SSI payments.

The change in the law requires that the market value of any resource disposed of without appropriate payment be counted for 24 months following the transfer.

SSI is designed for the aged and disabled needy. There are needs tests for both income and resources.

The rules for resources can exclude the value of the home, personal effects, and an automobile. After the exclusions, an individual is allowed \$1,500 in resources; a couple is allowed \$2,250. Those above these limits are ineligible for SSI.

Before the change in the law the otherwise eligible might find themselves disqualified for SSI because they owned a resource such as a parcel of land. Ineligibility was overcome by giving the resource away or selling it at a greatly reduced price. These transactions, most often involved the applicant's child or another close relative. Now, the market value of the resource will continue to be counted for 24 months following the kind of disposal.

It is very important for people potentially eligible for SSI to understand this change in the law. Disposal of a resource to gain entitlement to SSI could result in the loss of the resource, ineligibility for SSI, and, as a result, extreme financial hardship.

The Social Security Administration advises any person who is considering the transfer in ownership of any resource in an attempt to qualify for SSI to call the Social Security office for a complete explanation and understanding of this law before doing so. Our phone number for those in Abilene is 695-1240. Those living outside of Abilene should dial toll free 1-800-392-1603.

State Crop, Stock Reports Due Soon

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the service's field staff.

The crop and livestock information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews is kept confidential, and it is the basis for setting crop acreages and midyear livestock inventories to be published in June for the State of Texas. These crop and livestock reports help farmers and ranchers in working out production and marketing plans and keep them informed on the current agricultural situation.

Even though response is voluntary, each farmer or rancher who is contacted is urged to cooperate, helping to make the crop and livestock reports to be published as accurate and reliable as possible.

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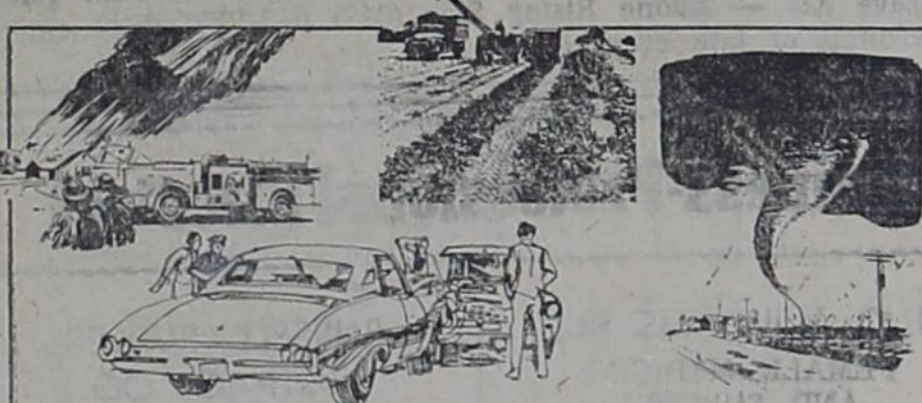

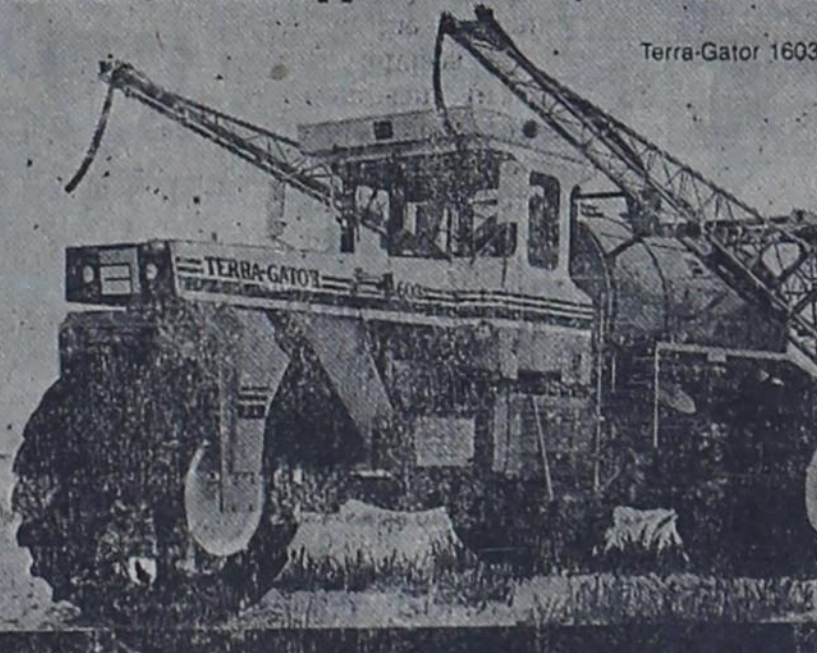
