SSI Resources Law Changes Are Told

There has been an importan change in the law concerning the resource rules for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

Before passage of Public Law 96-611 there was no legal restriction against a person transferring ownership, or giving away, a resource to become eligible for SSI payments.

The change in the law requires that the market value of any resource disposed of without appropriate payment be counted for 24 months followinbg the

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




