Timley Application Important For S.S.

People in the Big Country area who plan to apply for Social Security retirement or survivor benefits before they reach 65 should remember to apply no later than the month they want benefits to begin, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

This is because, with a few exceptions, a person who wants to receive reduced benefits before 6 cannot receive them for months hefore the month he or she ap plies. Retired workers and their wives or husbands can start get ting benefits as early as 62 and widows and widowers as early as 60.

A worker and his wife or husband can receive benefits only for months in which they are eligible throughout the entire month. This means that unless a person reaches 62 on the first or second day of the month, he or she cannot receive a benefit for that month. A person who applies after

reaching 65 can receive benefits for up to six months before the month of application, but not before the month he or she became

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
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
