### Higher SSI Payments May Increase Rolls

Eligibility for Supplemental Sccurity Income (SSI) payments is new possible for persons who previously lost their eligibility and for persons who were found to be ineligible at the time they filed their claim.


This is a result of two recent increases in the SSI payment level. In July 1983 the basic federal payment level for an individual living alone was raised from \$284.30 month to \$304.30; and for a couple living in their own household,

\$426.40 to \$456.40 a month. This was followed by a second cost - of - living increase which went into effect January 1984, raising the individual's payment level to \$314 and the couples payment level to \$472 a month.

Persons who feel these higher payment levels may now make them eligible should telephone or visit their local Social Security office to apply. This is especially important because SSI applications are effective on the day they e filed. There is no retroactiviso delays result in lost benefit payments.

SEI payments are available to find or disabled individuals and people 65 years of age or older. To qualify, you must meet some source limits, be a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence, be 65 years of age or older or be found disabled or blind. nd not have more than \$334 a month in income for an indivi-'val or \$492 a month for a qualiwing couple. If you are working, the first \$65 a month you make as well as one-half of your earnings ver \$65 do not count in determinng your monthly income level for SI nurposes. But you must file a witten application to be eligible. In Abilene, you may obtain more information or file an application by calling (915) 698-1360 or by visiting the Social Security Office at 142 S. Pioneer.
