media. His work includes landscapes, animals and he specializes in western art. Mr. Boren is a very talented artist, and we are honored that he found time to judge our show.

## More Rain Falls To Help Break Drouth

More drouth breaking rain showers fell over the Cross Plains area during the past week. After last week's 3.50 inches in the city, and considerably more in surrounding areas, another 1.66 inches was gauged in showers which fell here Wednesday and again on Thursday-Friday. The week-long rainy spell poured 5.10 inches on the township.

That 5.10 aggregate added to 1.85 inches measured in six or more showers in the first 14 days of October ran the month's total to 6.95 inches to Tuesday at noon.

Added to the 18.85 inches which had been reported here the first nine months of 1984, a grand total of 25.80 inches had fallen in the city through Tuesday noon.

Most all stock tanks are full or almost so now, and small grain crops are growing rapidly. The peanut harvest has been hurt, but was regarded as poor at best.

Host Goldthwaite Eagles blanked Cross Plains Buffaloes 38-0 in a District 8-A football contest last Friday.

The loss left the Herd with a single win in eight outings on the season and lowered the conference mark to 1-4. Goldthwaite stayed deadlocked for second place in the loop with Evant, game back of Gorman who has yet to lose in loop play.

Head Coach Ron Lankford said

that the Herd's kicking game caused trouble. Eagles blocked an attempted punt in the second quarter for the hosts' second touchdown, and later Eagles caught the Buff punter behind the line before getting the kick off. That led to a 30-yard field goal just before halftime and a 17-0 advantage.

Cross Plains moved the ball for short distances, but could not sustain a drive at any time during the contest. "It was a bad night," Coach Lankford stated, "a bad night all around." The Eagles collected 320 yards total offense, compared to 119 for the Buffaloes. Cross Plains did not even threaten to score during the game.

Cross Plains will host arch rival Rising Star in a District 8-A clash Friday night beginning at 7:30 p.m. It will be the final home stand for the Herd.

Special features are on tap for the contest. A Parents Night Introduction of players and parents will be held at 7:20 p.m., before opening kickoff. At halftime the Football Sweetheart will be presented.

## Big Voter Turnout Looms For Election

Citizens of the nation will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 6, to elect candidates ranging from the President of the United States to precinct level.

An extra large turnout of electors may go to the polls if interest and the large numbers voting absentee mean anything. As of Monday Darlene Walker, Callahan County Clerk, and her staff at Baird had mailed out 159 absentee ballots, and another 137 had voted by personal appearance with three more days to go, through Friday. In 1980 only a total of 221 votes were cast absentee, while 296 had already marked ballots through Monday this year.

In addition to the many offices up for grabs, decisions must be made on eight proposed changes to the State Constitution in Texas.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at eight places in Callahan County. Following by voting precinct are the locations and election judges of each: Baird, Precinct 1, Community Center, Jon and Betty Hardwick; Clyde, Precinct 2, Lions Club Building, Leo Dixon; Cross Plains, Precinct 3, City Hall, Katie Kilgore;

Putnam, Precinct 4, Community Center, Meta Isenhour; Eula, Precinct 5, School Auditorium, Reo Jolly; Denton Valley, Precinct 6, Baptist Church, Ann Bross; Oplin, Precinct 7, Com-

## WTU Bills Slightly Less Than Average Over State

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 Kwh in September 1983 and 701 Kwh in October 1983. The survey included 19 utilities, among which were 10 investor-owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 Kwh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 Kwh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome for a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

## Callahan FB Opposes TDA Proposed Pesticide Guides

The Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau is taking steps to oppose pesticide regulations which are being proposed by the Texas Department of Agriculture, says Glenn Leech of Abilene, president, Existing state and federal regulations are adequate for protection of farm workers, farm operators, applicators, and others.

The county farm leader said the proposals are unnecessary, unreasonable and, in many cases, unworkable. The proposed regulations, which deal with the application of pesticides, would make it difficult for farmers to use this valuable tool to make a

profit, he said. The proposed standards were printed in the "Texas Register" October 23rd. Interested parties have 30 days from that date to make official comment.

The Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau has sent a letter to the TDA in opposition to the proposals.

The regulations would establish rules for:

- (1) Notifying persons who might be affected by pesticide.
- (2) Posting notices and knowing specific details of chemical safety information.

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**PLUG BACK, RE-COMPLETE WELL AT CROSS CUT SET**

Comanche Resources Inc. of Odessa will plug back to 1,100 feet and recomplete at No. 8 L. D. Gunn, two miles southeast of Cross Cut in the regular field.

Location is on a 162-acre lease, 1,167 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of G. W. Pickett Survey 158.

The well was completed March 30 by the same firm in the Dale (Cadda) Field from perforations at 1,932-40 feet. Old total depth is 1,982 feet

**GAS WELL IS COMPLETED NORTH OF CROSS PLAINS**

Tri-County Drilling Inc. of Dallas No. 4 Hewes has been completed as a Marble Falls gas well seven miles north of Cross Plains. Well site is 467 feet from the south and west lines of Subdivision 9, Lavaca CSL Survey 6.

Absolute open flow was 205,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 3,554-58 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 4,294 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,298 feet.

## State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — Turnout for the Nov. 6 general election will probably be high as indicated by the large number of absentee votes already cast around the state.

Almost lost amid the campaign rhetoric from heated candidates are eight proposed constitutional amendments and some pros and cons which have been argued for each as follows:

**PROPOSITION 1:** Rights of state chartered banks would be extended to have the same rights and privileges as the national-chartered banks domiciled here in Texas.

Supporters of the amendment argue that while Texas now has roughly a 50-50 ratio of state banks and national banks, the Congress is expected to allow intrastate branching by national banks. This amendment is needed to avoid a severe competitive disadvantage for state banks.

An argument against the amendment proposes the Legislature should repeal the constitutional ban on branch banking and regulate by statute, which could be repealed if Congress acts.

**PROPOSITION 2:** Funding for state universities would be secured with a new dedicated appropriation of \$100 million a year for college construction. It also increases bonding authority for UT and A&M systems.

Proponents argue this amendment will end the dual-class system for college construction funding which enriches Permanent University Fund schools while making beggars of the rest.

Opponents argue that state revenues are too scarce to create a new massive, dedicated fund.

**PROPOSITION 3:** Grants the Legislature authority to provide financial aid to dependents of police, fire and other public officers killed in hazardous duty. Currently, only the spouse and dependent children receive such aid. Proponents say that elderly dependents of single officers should be eligible for aid if the officer was their sole means of support.

Others argue that fiscal guidelines for this amendment are not clear and voters have no idea how much the beneficiaries will receive.

**PROPOSITION 4:** Allow the abolishment of county treasurers in both Bexar and Collin counties, if voters approve. The county clerks would assume the duties of the treasurer.

Supporters say taxpayers could be saved from paying two salaries.

Opponents say county clerks already have enough to do and the division of duties is best.

**PROPOSITION 5:** Changes the manner in which a vacancy in the lieutenant governor's office is filled to allow the Texas Senate to select a senator to perform the duties. Under present law, the vacancy goes to the president pro tem of the Senate.

Proponents say that the post shouldn't be filled simply because of Senate tradition, or because senators wanted to honor the person who became president pro tem.

Opponents argue that since the lieutenant governor is elected statewide, it is too narrow to let the 34 senators choose the successor. If we are going to change the law, we should provide for a better means of selection.

**PROPOSITION 6:** Would allow public funds to be used to pay mutual insurance companies premiums on "nonassessable" life, health, and accident policies and annuity contracts.

Since mutual insurance companies are owned by their policyholders and have no capital stock, a 1942 Texas Supreme Court ruling held that public entities could not have such an insurance policy because they would become stockholders.

Proponents say that since mutual insurance companies have practically abandoned the use of assessments to raise capital, these companies should be allowed to compete for local governments' insurance policies. This amendment carries no apparent opposition.

**PROPOSITION 7:** Amends guidelines for the State Commission on Judicial Conduct which currently has 11 members: two court of appeals justices, two district judges, two lawyers, four nonlawyers and one justice of the peace. This proposal substitutes one appeals justice and one district judge with one municipal judge and one county court at law judge.

In cases of judicial misconduct, a judge could be disciplined instead of removed, and the record would not automatically be open to the public, but subject to authorization of the Legislature.

**PROPOSITION 8:** Increases the amount of per diem that legislators can legally receive to an amount equal to the maximum that can be deducted from federal taxes.

Lawmakers currently receive per diem of \$30, but could conceivably raise it to \$75, if this proposal passes.

(3) Providing oral warnings to persons who might enter a treated field.

(4) Determining illegal applications and clarifying drift liability.

(5) Establishing re-entry intervals into treated fields.

(6) Establishing a TAD technical advisory committee.

The county farm leader said farmers who must use agricultural chemicals should not be fooled by conditional exemptions for some crops. He said the rules relate only to posting warnings and re-entry intervals—and then only if workers are not "required to make substantial contact with plants, foliage, soil, or other sources of pesticide residue."

The farm leader said that farmers and ranchers have more reason than most people to be careful with farm chemicals. "We live on the land, and of course, we don't want to hurt the environment or those who work for us," he said.

He said that by complying with existing state and federal regulations, farmers are providing adequate protection. He said the Texas Department of Agriculture has not made a convincing case for the proposed stringent regulations.

Mondale and Geraldine A. Ferraro, and the race for U. S. Senate between Democrat Lloyd Doggett and Republican Phil Gramm. They seek the place held by Senator John Tower who is retiring.

The decision method covering the eight proposed changes to the constitution will be for and against. Abbreviated statement of the proposition as will appear on the ballot follows.

No. 1 The Constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks.

No. 2 The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund.

No. 3 The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty.

No. 4 The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties.

No. 5 The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor.

No. 6 The constitutional amendment to permit use of funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas.

No. 7 The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and detain masters and magistrates of the courts.

No. 8 The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator.

## FmHA Starts Reviews Of Loan Restructuring

Reviews have begun of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan accounts to see which farmers in Callahan County need and will qualify for a one-time set aside of part of their loan, Jack Phillips, County Supervisor, said. FmHA has been authorized to set aside up to 25 percent — to a maximum of \$200,000 — of the debt owed the agency for farmers who are experiencing severe financial difficulty, if the set aside will help achieve a positive cash flow for the borrower.

"We will begin scheduling appointments for our borrowers to review their accounts, determine if they need special assistance and see if we can make that assistance available," Phillips said. "Not every borrower will qualify for the set aside, but there might be some other way to help, such as consolidation or rescheduling of existing loans. We will look at all alternatives."

Phillips said all accounts will be reviewed. There are some exceptions, such as accounts in bankruptcy or foreclosure or those determined able to graduate to other sources of credit.

## 1985 Farm Program Signup In Progress

We began accepting applications for the 1985 farm programs on October 15th according to Scotty Odum, ASCS County Executive Director. Secretary of Agriculture John Block recently announced acreage reduction programs for corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, and cotton. The wheat program was announced in June.

In a continued effort to avoid overproduction and low prices, the farm programs call for a 30 percent reduction in wheat and upland cotton, and a 10 percent reduction in feed grain.

Odum said that as a part of that reduction, program participants will receive payments for diverting 10 percent of their wheat and upland cotton acres. "At signup, farmers may request one-half of the land diversion payments, and one-half of the projected 1985 deficiency payments for upland cotton, feed grains and wheat." He said farmers who accept the payments and fail to comply with program provisions must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest.

To protect land removed from crop production, farmers will be required to place it in an acreage conservation reserve (ACR). ACR land must have been devoted to a row crop or small grains in two of the last three years.

The ASCS official acreage reduction program contracts are binding and liquidated damages will be assessed for failure to comply with program requirements.

For additional program details, farmers may contact the county ASCS Office at the Courthouse in Baird between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.
