

## Franke, McKeehan Resign Place On City Council

Two members of the Cross Plains City Council have resigned their seats on the board. They are Raymond Franke, veteran councilman, and Ted McKeehan, who had more than a year to run on his first full term after being appointed to the directorate to fill an unexpired term. Franke's tenure was due to expire next April after having served several terms.

No reason for the resignation were given except from brief notes of resignation written by the two who left the council.

Remaining members of the city's directorate are Mayor Frank Robertson and Aldermen Ray Purvis and J. P. McCord. There is no definite plan at present for filling the vacancies, according to the mayor. A quorum remains to handle city business.

Franke's statement follows: "I want to thank the citizens

of Cross Plains for their confidence and support during the time I have served on the City Council. I am proud to have been a part of what we have accomplished. We have the greatest little town in the whole country.

"As the ball player said, when the rules are changed in the middle of the game and you are outnumbered, it is time to quit."

The statement was signed Raymond Franke.

McKeehan wrote the following: "To my good friends and the people who supported me while in the City Council, I wish to express my sincere appreciation. I am proud of the things we accomplished during my time in office, and I am also very proud of our little city.

"But under present conditions I am afraid my service to you would be less than you would expect of me."

"Thanks again for your confidence in me."

The statement was signed Ted McKeehan.

# Bisons Win First; Best Rochelle 56-0

Cross Plains Buffaloes blasted into the win column for the first time this season last Friday by belting the visiting Rochelle Hornets 56-0 in a District 8-A East Zone football contest.

It was the first victory for the Herd making the season record read 1-5 and the 8-A mark 1-2. Rochelle is winless thus far.

The Herd turned in its best offensive night of the campaign with a 402-yard total offense, 317 rushing and 85 passing. Rochelle was limited to 92 total yards.

Commenting on effort of the Herd, Head Coach Ron Lenkford said, "Our whole offense did a super job." He also said the line did an outstanding job of blocking, giving time to throw, and it was the reason for the impressive rushing total. The interior line-

men for the Buffs are David Gieger at center, Tommy Ames and Darby Nichols at guard, and Shane Bubenik, Lee Meador and Torry Hettinger at tackle.

Buffaloes scored in every quarter in registering triumph number one. Tailback Lance Clawson got the first touchdown on a 36-yard run up the middle. Fullback Arthur Agnew made season his-

tory as he cracked over for the two-point conversion, the first time a conversion try had been successful to that point this season.

A few minutes later in the first quarter Clawson rang up six more points, scoring on a 10-yard sweep. Bufi Tom Sibley then kicked the extra point, the first time that had been done by the Herd this season.

Bisons counted 22 points in the second quarter. First tally came on a 49-yard reverse by Split End John Fred McWilliams. He then scored the two-point conversion

The Cross Plains Chapter of the Future Farmers of America will be holding a rabies vaccination clinic at the Vocational Agriculture building on the school campus. The clinic will run from 1:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Dr. Ray Martin will be the attending veterinarian, according to Roy Richey and Ray Conner, local agriculture instructors. "The clinic is held not only to cut down the number of domestic animals with rabies, but also as a community service," said Richey. He continued, "The cost this year will be \$5 per animal."

### County Pastures Worst Since '50

Rangelands and pastures in Callahan County are in the worst shape since the drought of the '50's, according to Greg Gergross, Callahan County Extension Agent.

In many cases, especially where wood lice or termites were present in the late summer, the ground is completely bare. It may take several years for bare areas to reseed themselves because of the lack of any litter or other materials on the ground to hold water, Gergross noted.

In some areas, it may be feasible to go in and prepare some type of seedbed and reseed these areas. Seeding of Kleingrass, Side-oats Gramma, KR Bluestem, Old World Bluestem, Plains Bristlegrass, Green Sprangletop and other adapted species would require adequate seedbed preparation for any change of successful establishment. Tree grubbing or dozing in late winter and scattering grass seed in these areas would probably result in re-establishment of these grasses if the weather cooperates.

Using chisel plows, discs and other equipment mainly designed for farming may not be advisable on rangeland. Brush stumps, rocks and rock layers may damage equipment unless equipped with spring releases or other mechanisms to reduce breakage.

Even if we have favorable growing weather next year, it may take another year or two for rangeland and pastures to be back to normal. In summary, don't be too hasty to go out and buy additional cattle until the rangeland or pastures will produce adequate forage for them, the agent continued.

Lamb validation and tagging has been set for Sunday, Nov. 4, at 2 p.m. at the Cross Plains Vo-Ag building in Cross Plains and at Millmoons Southdowns, located three miles south of Eula on FM-603. Feeders may go to either place to tag their lambs.

All market lambs to be shown in the county show or any of the major shows must be validated in order to be eligible to show. Cost of the tagging will be \$1 each.

If more information is needed on the lamb tagging, please contact the County Extension Office in Baird or one of the local Vo-Ag teachers.

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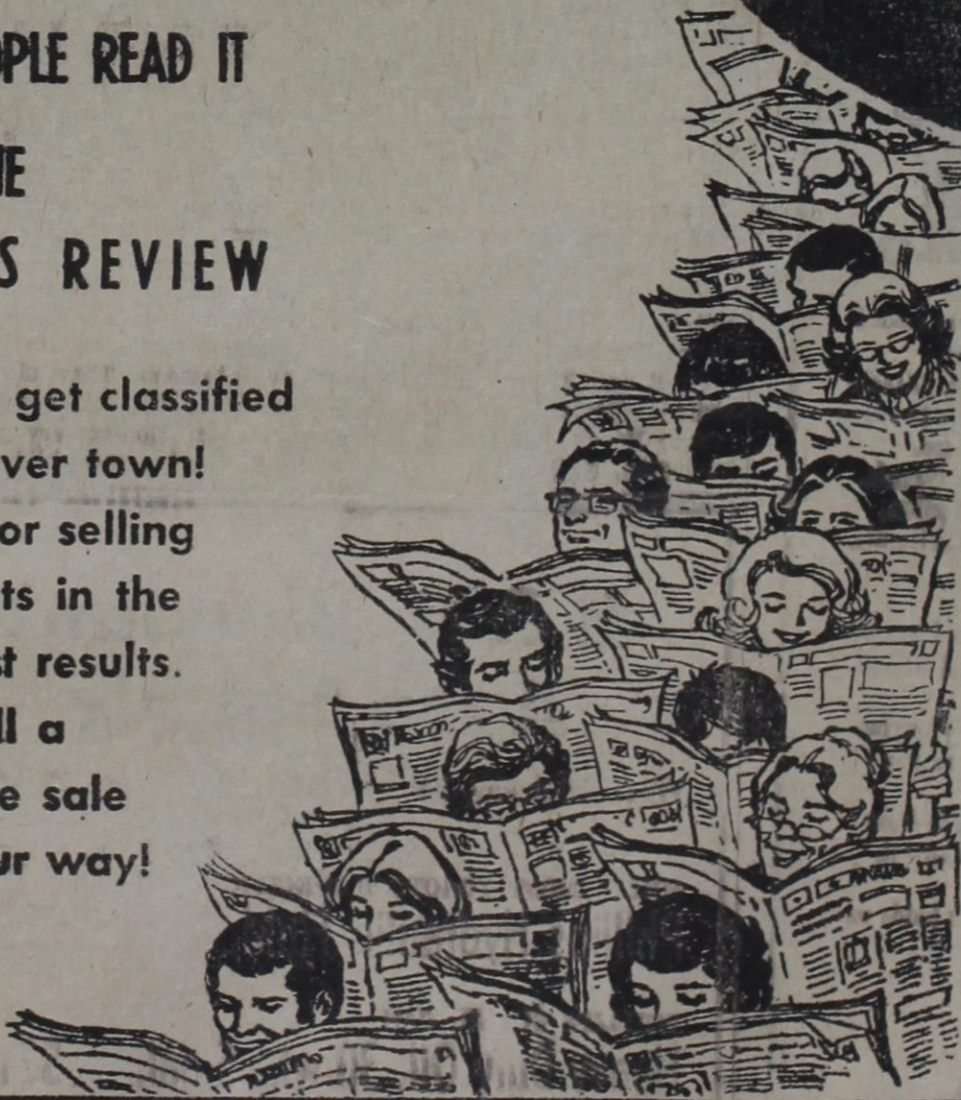
