This Fourth of July, surprise your family and guest with a Firecracker on a Bun. It is sure to light up your picnic. The recipe follows.

- 3/4 cup Wish Bone Russian dressing
 - 1 pound ground beef
 - 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
 - 4 slices American Cheese, melted
 - 8 frankfurters
 - 3 slices bacon
 - 2 toasted frankfurter rolls
- In medium bowl, thoroughly combine 3/4 cup Russian dressing, ground beef and bread crumbs. On waxed paper, shape beef mixture into 8 rectangles (about 5" x 4"); top with cheese, place frankfurter in center and wrap with beef mixture, sealing edge tightly. Wrap with bacon and secure each end with toothpick.
- Grill or broil, turning and basting frequently with remaining Russian dressing, about 20 minutes or until done. Serve on frankfurter rolls and garnish, if desired with green onions, crisp raw vegetable sticks and potato chips. You may insert a fringed green onion in one end of the frankfurter to make a fuse. Makes 8 "Firecrackers."

Most Downtown Stores To Take July 4th As Holiday

Majority of the Cross Plains business community will be closed all day Wednesday, July 4, in observance of Independence Day.

All but one of the downtown businesses contacted were to be closed for the holiday, while the reverse was in evidence on highways leading into the city. Most of those stores will be open, expecting transient trade during the 24-hour period when it is anticipated traffic will be heavier than normal.

A quick check by the Review on Monday revealed that only Sav-On Foods will be open downtown while all three grocery or convenience stores on highways coming into Cross Plains will be open including Lakeway Grocery, Buy-Rite Superette and Town & Country Food Stores.

Joining the convenience stores open for business on July 4th will be Richeson's Dairy Queen, Cliff's Exxon Station, Dillard Texaco Station, J. W. Fore Mobil Station, Greider Gulf Station and Stroud Shamrock Station.

Three other major businesses along Highway 36 which will close will be Southern Savings, Johnston Truck & Supply and Skeet Walker Truck & Trailer Sales & Service.

Among those concerns which will be closed downtown are Bryan's Variety, which will actually be closed June 29-July 4; Ray's Barber Shop, which is to be closed all that week, and U. S. Post Office, which will have no mail in or out or service of any kind that day.

Others included in the list of retail outlets, service businesses, and offices of utilities, are the following: Pettiet Automotive, Citizens State Bank, Higginbotham's, Cross Plains Review, McNeel Insurance Agency, Polly's Beauty Bar, Mayes Flower Shop, Lane's Variety, Neal Drug, Cross Plains Locker Plant, Sylvia's Hair Shack, Johnson's Dry Goods, Bishop Automotive Service, Cross Plains Discount, Cross Plains City Office, Cross Plains Auto Supply, Dal-Mar Energy Inc., Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co., Western Auto Store, Odom's Cafe, Law-

rence Farm & Ranch Supply, Sandy's Hair Affair, West Texas Utilities Co. and Cross Plains School offices.

First Baptist Church will move its regular Wednesday night services, scheduled for July Fourth, to Tuesday night, July 3. Bible study and prayer service begins at 7:30 p.m.

There is no special event planned in Cross Plains, but several surrounding communities have special events scheduled such as the Cowboy Reunion rodeo and associated activities at Stamford.

The Earl Chamber of Commerce will have a fireworks display July 3, at the city park. Food and game booths will also be part of the celebration, which will include the dedication of the Early City Park.

An "Eastland Jaycees July 4 Extravaganza" is planned at the city park.

The swimming pool will open at noon for free swimming. A concession stand will offer hot dogs and soft drinks. Oscar's Bar-B-Que of Cisco will sell barbecue dinners. Booths with arts, crafts and trade exhibits will also be featured.

Area bands are invited to provide musical entertainment during the afternoon.

The Jaycee fireworks display will begin about 9 p.m. There may be other activities in other near by cities and towns, which was not immediately learned of by the Review.

A fireworks display sponsored by a beverage distributor will be at Lake Brownwood.

The Chamber of Commerce and the Noon Lions Club of Cisco are sponsoring a full day of activities at the city park.

Events will begin at 9:45 a.m. with a flag-raising ceremony by the Boy Scouts. A swimming and diving contest as well as various games are planned for the morning.

A carnival with various food booths will be operated from 11 a.m. and throughout the afternoon. Musical entertainment and more games are planned in the afternoon. A fireworks display will begin at dark.

Veterans Officer Reminds Of Marker, Burial Help

Many families of veterans are not familiar with the fact that the federal government provides a headstone or grave marker for a veteran's grave when he is buried in a private cemetery. According to Putt Brandon, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, family members will choose and pay for a grave marker when one could be furnished free of charge by the Veterans Administration.

Even though last year the Veterans Administration provided more than 210,000 free grave markers for graves of veterans, many people still do not know that the VA does not pay for the installation of the marker at the grave site. The marker itself is provided free of any charge, and all shipping charges to its destination are paid by the government, but the cost of installing the marker at the grave site must be borne by the family member or members who authorized the burial. The charge for such installation is generally rather small, approximately \$50 or less.

The VA can also pay a burial allowance of \$300 if the veteran, at the time of his death, was in receipt of disability compensation or pension benefits. An additional \$150 can also be paid in most instances as a plot or grave space allowance. The burial allowance

and plot payment are applicable only if the veteran served during a period of wartime.

If a veteran's death is shown to have been caused by disabilities which were incurred during his or her military service, the VA can pay as much as \$1,100 toward the costs of the burial. Application for the burial allowance must be filed with the Veterans Administration regional office serving the area where the veteran is buried. In most cases, the funeral directors will file the claim with the VA, and deduct from the total bill the amount that is paid by the VA.

Additional information on the VA burial allowance and the grave marker may be obtained from your local Veterans County Service Officer.

Searing Sun Sends Water Use Soaring

Water use in Cross Plains is rising as the hot, scorching sun dries gardens and lawns, but workmen at the City of Cross Plains expect no shortage crisis soon barring major mechanical breakdown or electrical outage.

Temperatures were reported over 100 degrees several days last week and on Monday. Water works records showed that in two separate 24-hour periods last week 311,000 gallons of water were pumped from the city waterfield. In spite of the rising consumption, city employees said they noted that not all wells available to the city had as yet been brought on the line. Those are the wells believed to be the best in the new Cottonwood field.

One workman said that if the people will use common sense by watering in moderation and not, as the saying goes "water the pavement", we should have no problem. It was explained, however, that although there is a comfortable feeling about usage at present, a close watch is being maintained on the situation.

They did explain that an extensive electrical failure or a major mechanical breakdown could result in emergency measures having to be implemented to protect water reserves which must be maintained for fire protection.

Temperature readings of up to 110 degrees have been learned of by the Review many days last week, although most readings were in the 101 to 103 degree range. That searing heat is made a bit more bearable by southerly breezes. Combined, however, they are rapidly drying what moisture

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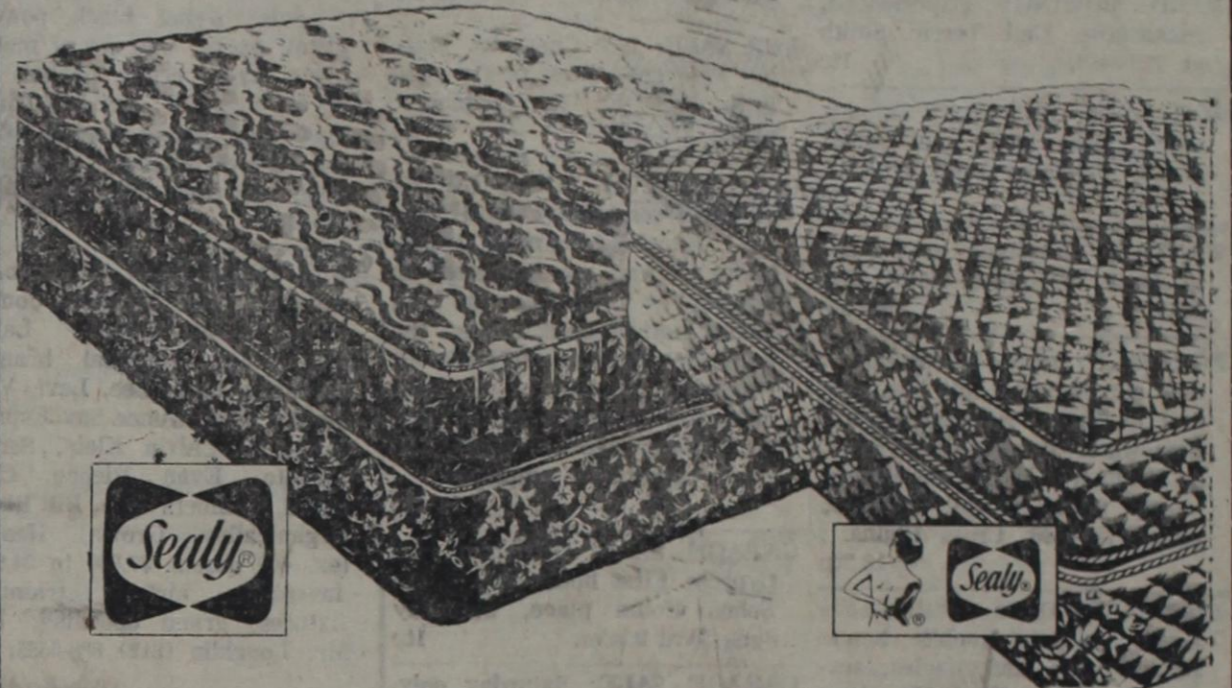
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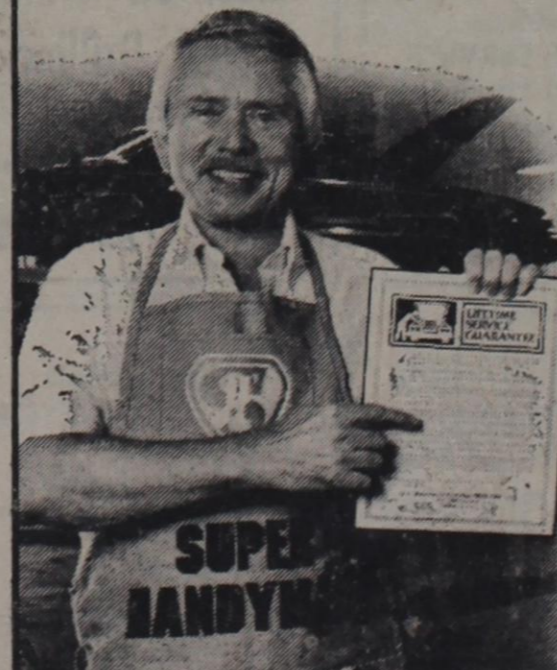

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Near the end of last week, one veteran reporter characterized this special session as "the most confusing mess anyone has seen in years." No one disagreed.

But two days later, the House rallied behind its leadership to pass the Texas public school reform bill, and the ball is rolling, indeed. Since this is a tax session, the House is calling the shots more than in ordinary sessions. The House will not act to approve a tax bill, until after the Senate has passed the school reform bill and the governor has signed it, its leaders have said.

The bill sent to the Senate last week included a temporary appointed State Board of Education, perhaps the most dramatic of this year's proposed reforms and probably the most politically sensitive. Other reforms approved were competency testing for all teachers, a salary schedule recognizing teacher longevity, a career ladder for teachers, and pre-kindergarten programs for four-year-olds with language or learning disabilities.

The pre-kindergarten portion was one item that had been struck down by a committee that had "gutted the bill," according to one legislator. Lewis Takes Over House Speaker Gib Lewis expressed his dismay at the gutting, but after the bill reached the floor for debate, House members were too split to reach a majority.

Even the agreed points seemed to be falling apart. Finally Lewis took over and began working for daylight. On the long day of passage, Lewis pushed through a compromise reform bill, gaveling the votes sections by section until final approval was reached 15 hours later. "Lewis is getting everything he wants," one labor leader was overheard saying. The Speaker was aided by at least two other factors: the legislators' desire to avoid dragging out the session, and his own power to make new committee assignments next January, when the Legislature convenes again in regular session.

Gib took an extra interest in the reform bill, and it's hard for a member to ignore his request for support when Gib has the power to make or break him on committee assignments just down the road," one senator said.

Teachers Lobby
The groups representing teachers gave their approval to the compromise at least outwardly, even though they opposed some of the control measures placed on the profession.

But when Lewis agreed to leave their salary schedule intact, they gave their support. That schedule gives raises for experience and provides for some merit raises.

Senate Action
Across the rotunda, senators were laboring over their version of the school reform bill, sticking fairly close to the proposals of the select committee.

But it had already rejected some of the reforms which the House approved. The biggest question remaining on the issue was whether the Senate would go along with the House bill, or whether it would act to significantly alter it.

With time running out on the 36-day legal limit of the session, the Senate appeared willing to maintain the House reforms in order to bring up the tax bill which will pay for the whole thing. Earlier, the Senate voted to

confirm 448 of the governor's appointees.

Farmworkers Insurance
Meanwhile, waiting in the wings is a bill providing for workers compensation insurance to migrant and seasonal farm laborers.

Governor Mark White has indicated he may open up the special agenda to include this issue, if enough time remains near the end of 30 days, and the bill's sponsor is not taking any chances. Last week the bill by Sen. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, passed out of committee and is now poised for floor action, should the agenda be opened.

Jim Mattox

A newspaper investigation revealed last week that Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox has hired nine staffers to aide special prosecutors, which is three times the number allowed by state law.

Six of the nine reportedly are carried in the budget of another division of Mattox office. Fund transfers between division is not authorized by state law.

The probe reported that Mattox hired 17 more staff than authorized by law. A Mattox spokesman disagreed with the interpretation of the statutes.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Whether it follows through or not, the Legislature has taken the first significant step of the special session to radically alter the Texas public education system.

House leaders indicated last week, they are close to a workable compromise on the issue to abolish the 27-member elected State Board of Education.

The plan in the works would replace that large board with a smaller, temporary panel of between nine and 12 members appointed by the Governor. After an initial term, that membership would become an elected body. The first term probably would be 4 years.

This version apparently has the support of House Speaker Gib Lewis and H. Ross Perot, the chairman of the select committee who fiercely advocates abolishing the elected state board.

Governor Mark White also supports the compromise, but his nemesis, Comptroller Bob Bullock was critical of the school finance part of the package as weighted against poorer school districts.

Bullock backs a school finance package which closes the funding gap between rich and poor school districts.

The compromise plan is expected to cost about \$2.5 billion over the next three years. Each teacher would get a pay raise of at least \$170 a month.

Billboard Campaign
One issue of discussion away from the bargaining table is a series of billboards across the state intended to politically embarrass the governor, paid for by the Republican Party.

The billboards quote an '82 campaign pledge of Gov. White in which he promised not to raise taxes if elected.

State Republican Party chairman George Strake said the billboards are a political education project to remind voters of White's promise.

Legislators are in Austin now because White called them there to raise an unprecedented \$4.8 billion in taxes, Strake said.

Party Conventions
Delegates from both parties held state conventions last week with Republicans meeting in Fort Worth and Democrats in Houston.

A newspaper poll of those delegates showed Democrats favored a call for a nuclear weapons freeze in their platform while the GOP rejected it. Democrats also wanted Congressional approval before the President could commit U. S. Combat troops in Central America, and Republicans rejected such approval.

The Democrats, by a wide margin, favored dismantling their presidential caucus system in favor of a direct primary. Such reform would take an act of the Legislature.

Jim Mattox
Texas Atty. Gen Jim Mattox drew attention last week after it was disclosed he hired the husband of a legislator who sits on the committee overseeing his budget.

Mattox hired Lane Denton, a former "Dirty 30" state representative from Waco, in December at \$32,000 a year to help run the new child-support enforcement office. Denton's wife, Betty, who replaced him in the Legislature, was appointed to the House Appropriations Committee in November. Both she and Mattox denied any conflict of interest.

Speaker Lewis said he did not think Denton's votes on the committee would be slanted towards Mattox, but that he could consider transferring her to another committee assignment to avoid the appearance of conflict.

Park Plan Protested
Several legislators have objected to Gov. White's proposal to scrub a fund which helps cities develop parks and use the money for education.

The fund is replenished by the cigarette tax, which White wants diverted to public education. However at least 18 senators want the park fund to avoid hampering local park programs in the state.

Anti-trust Suit
Mattox filed a \$4.7 million anti-trust suit last week against four saltwater disposal companies, a first in Texas history according to him.

It is the first lawsuit under Texas law to allege monopolization.

This case charges the companies with monopolizing the saltwater disposal business in Burleson County and surrounding oil fields, and of price-fixing conspiracy.

In another action, Mattox ruled that Judges cannot allow the bar association or any other entity to assign lawyers to indigent cases.

District Judges may not delegate to another person or entity the discretionary powers to appoint an attorney in a particular case.

Mattox made the ruling after 10 El Paso judges signed a joint order providing that lawyers in the county be assigned no more than two domestic indigent cases per year.

The county bar association would have handled such assignment.
