#### Methodist Young People Bring DP Couple To Farm Near Here

Leon Kakulia and his wife Helen of Salzburg, Austria, arrived in Cisco, Thursday noon, February 15 and went immediately to their new home near Rising Star. They came under the sponsorship of the Methodist Young people of the Cisco district who provided their transportation from New York City and secured the home and job on the farm of Ray Agnew at Rising Star, according to the Rev. Leslie Seymour, district superintendent.

Leon, a native Ukranian and Helen, a Czechoslovakian, were victims of political persecution and fled their native land to take up temporary residence in Austria. From there the Methodist Church through special offerings taken during their week of Dedication brought them to America and the Cisco District youth assumed responsibility for them at the port of entry. In their new home they will have full op-

portunity to become naturalized American citizens and to make a place for themselves in this land of freedom.

A delegation of youth and adult leaders of the district met the Kakulias when they arrived at the station in Cisco Thursday and gave them warm welcome. The youth of the district have planned a banquet to be given in Eastland in March at which time the new family will be present as honor guests. The youth by their own personal efforts raised the necessary funds for this project which, according to the Rev. Mr. Seymour, means more than a dozen sermons on brotherhood or world peace.

#### Drouth Weakened Monday Night As Rain Covers Area

One of the longest drouths in memory of oldest citizens received a sickening lick to the jaw Monday night as rains covered the Cross Plains area, bringing welcomed relief to farmers and ranch-

In Cross Plains the precipitation gauged only a quarter of an inch. however, north of town it was reported much heavier. The moisture came on the heels of a recent snow, which came early last week, it had been more than 130 days since Cross Plains had received a measurable amount of moisture.

While the drouth is by no means broken, there is now some possibility of spring oat crops maturing. The moisture is believed sufficient to sprout seed which has been in the ground more than three months. Too, prospects were considerably brightened for grazing stock feeding.

Monday night's rainfall was not sufficient to replenish supplies of stock water to any appreciable extent, however, this problem had not become generally acute.

here from Limestone county, in East Texas, in 1900. The elder Foster was so impressed with the possibilities of this section that he wrote numerous letters to kinsmen in East Texas, seeking to locate them in this country.

Hereunder are excerpts taken from his letters written about the turn of the century.

"I am well pleased with my place here. I bought a cotton crop for \$40 and expect to make four big bales, if I can get it gathered. I will make about \$100 on it. Pickers get 80 cents per hundred. You would like this country very much".

"I wish you people had the wood that is in my front yard. It would do you all Winter. If anyone asks you how I'm satisfied out here, tell them I sure like this country and don't ever expect to make to make old Limestone my home

"Tell Pa if he comes out here to bring a wagon and good team. They are after me for wood on every side and the gin man offers \$3.50 per cord. I can get it cut for 75 cents per cord".

"David wants to come back to Limestone and buy a harp and see grandma and grandpa. He says he will let them blow his harp".

"Got cotton picked and made six bales, netting \$135.60. I bought my plows Monday. I got three heel sweeps, two shovels, a steel beam blackland turning plow, a two horse Georgia stock, one double tree, two single trees and lap rings for \$17."

"My smokehouse I am putting up will cost me about \$8 wouldn't take \$25 for

"If you move to this country bring some good mules; you can get a big price for them in a land trade. You can make a payment on a good place, with a team and wagon, often getting as much as \$250 or \$300 for the rig".

"I recently sold my brown filly for \$20 in cash. You said that you could not get over \$20 for a Jersey milk cow. I have been offered \$25 for mine here but won't take that".

The old letters, now yellowed with age, are becoming difficult to read, but all through them are to be found descriptions of this section of the state written in glowing terms. The country was young and the people seemed mighty proud of it.



#### Leave Water Out Of Tractor Tires For Best Results

College Station—Air filled tracor tires operate more efficiently and economically in sand and loam than tires filled either partially or fully with water. This was the conclusion of a report made by the Division of Farm Machinery, U.S. Department of Agriculture and a tire manufacturing company, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineers of Texas A&M College

He says three identical tires were tested under 12 drawbar loads on the two types of soils. All tires carried equal weight, but the method of applying weight differed.

#### Milk Cows Should Yield 200 Pounds **Butterfat Yearly**

College Station, Feb. 1-Regardless of the price of dairy products, profit from a milk cow is closely related to her level of production. The truth in this statement is verified by the yearly analysis of Dairy Herd Improvement Association records.

A study of Texas DHIA records for 1949 shows that, if a cow is to pay for her keep, she must produce approximately 200 pounds of butterfat per year. As the level of production increases above 200 pounds the profit per pound of butterfat increases.

A. M. Meekma, assistant dairy husbandman for the Texas A&M Extension Service, says that this greater profit at higher levels of production is due to the wider spread between feed costs and the value of the product. Feed costs ment of Agriculture Division of increase as production increases,

Although some of the lower producers may not possess the ability to produce at a high level, Meekma says that many dairy cows probably could have done better if they had received better feeding and management.

Each cow has a limit beyond which she cannot efficiently produce, and Meekma reminds dairymen that DHIA records can be used as the basis for removing the inefficient producers from the





#### Slaughterers Here Must Have License To Butcher Beeves

Cross Plains slaughterers and outchers have been advised that if they are not federally inspected they will need to obtain certificates from the Office of Price Stabilization to continue in busi-

John Boyle, meat specialist of the regional Price Stabilization Office at Dallas, explained that distribution order No. 1, affecting slaughter of livestock and distribution of meat requires these slaughterers to obtain OPS certificates if they expect to continue slaughtering after April 1.

Slaughterers classed as No. 2 and No. 2a in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana should write now to the Regional Office of Price Stabilization, 3306 Main Street, Dallas, for their applica-

tion forms, Boyle said.
Forms must be obtained, filled out and filed with the Dallas Office of Price Stabilization. Only those slaughterers who file completed forms by March 15 can hope to obtain their certificate before the deadline due to time required to issue certificates, he stated.

Boyle pointed out that this request affects only two classes of slaughterers—Class 2, commercial slaughterers not federally inspected, and Class 2a, individuals who have such commercial slaughterers perform their slaughtering.

On the other hand, federally inspected slaughterers and persons engaging federally inspected slaughterers to do their work for them, should write Office of Price Stabilization at Washington for their applications for their certifi-



### **Veterans?** Box

Q-Can you tell me what type of evidence I should submit to VA benefits? My husband, a World War I veteran, died recently, but not of service-connected causes.

A-You should submit proof of your husband's death; complete information as to your annual income, and proof of your marriage to your late husband. If either you or your husband had been married previously, you also should submit proof that the earlier marriages were legally dissolved.

Q-I started school under the GI Bill a month ago. I just learned that my school, through oversight, had not yet returned my certificate of eligibility to VA. Meanwhile, I never received subsistence and my tuition hasn't been paid. If the school sends the certificate to VA now, will I get back subsistence and will the school send the certificate to VA now, will I get back sussistence and will the school get back tuition?

A-So long as the school sends the certificate back to VA within 90 days of the date of receipt, VA will consider that date of receipt as the date of your entrance into training. Subsistence and tuition payments will begin as of that

Q-Is there any limit to the amount of money I can borrow from a private lender under the GI Bill?

A-No. The GI Bill limit is on the amount of VA's guaranty of the loan, and not on the amount of the loan itself.

Q-I am a World War I veteran and I have a \$10,000 U.S. Government Life Insurance policy. I am thinking of turning \$5,000 of it in for cash. If I do so, and later change my mind, will I be able to reinstate the cashed-in \$5,000?

A-No. Under the law, U. S. Government Life Insurance surrendered for cash may not be reinstated. However, before you take any steps to surrender your policy, you should write to the Office of Insurance, Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C., and ask what courses of action are open to you under your insurance contract that would preserve your valuable reinstatement rights.
