He too, will probably soon return to the battle area. A son of Mrs. L. M. Purvis has been flying combat missions in close support of United Nations ground forces in Korea.

Friends are somewhat concerned about the welfare of Arvin Brashear. His parents here last heard from him in a letter written December second. At that time he was serving as a radar operator with the First Marine Division, and was in the vicinity of the hydro-electric plants on the Manchurian border

The little ol' home town newspaper feels pretty light in your hand each week but during 1950 it took 8,626 pounds of newsprint to produce the 52 issues. Five and three quarter pounds of paper went to each of the approximately 1,500 people who buy the Review.

Average size of the paper each week last year was eight and one-eighth pages. Seven issues were of six page size, 38 were eight pages, five were 10 pages each, and there was one 12 and one 14 page edition.

Area Gripped In Severe Drouth As 1/ New Year Begins

With no rainfall here since October 20, when a light shower fell, Cross Plains began the new year Monday amid one of the most protracted drouths in recent years. The total precipitation for 1950 amounted to only 20.03 inches, whereas 28 inches is considered normal for this section.

Most of the 1950 moisture fell in the first part of the year, and S. F. Bond, local weather observer. points out that the ground has not had a real good wetting since July. Rainfall by months during the past year was as follows: January 1.07, February .27, March .12, April 2.13, May 6.82, June 3.60, July 3.02, August 1.26, September 1.38, and October .36. No precipitations were recorded in either November or

The 1949 rainfall in Cross Plains was 33.75 inches.
