

Callahan County Democrats Win Every Race in General Election

The most extensive Republican political campaign in the history of Callahan County failed this week as voters went to the polls Tuesday and gave the Democrats a clean sweep of victories.

The victory sweep not only gave all Democratic state office seekers majorities, but in two county office races Democrats won handsily over their Republican contenders.

In races directly affecting Callahan County residents, L. C. Cash, incumbent county school superintendent, won by a better than two to one count over Republican Harold Garrett of Cross Plains. Garrett campaigned on an issue of abolishing the office which he sought.

Over in precinct 4 which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood and Atwell, Democratic candidate Duke Mitchell won over Republican candidate Bryan Bennett. Other offices in Callahan County were uncontested and democratic nominees went in with large votes.

Baird and all but one of the other 14 voting boxes gave the Democratic nominee for Governor, John Connally, a plurality of votes. The county went for Mr. Connally 1,296 to 800 for his Republican opponent Jack Cox of Breckenridge. Mr. Connally won the governorship of the state by a large majority of votes. The 22 District which is presided over by State Democratic Executive Committeeman Randall C. Jackson of Baird, gave the Democratic candidate about a 4,000 vote majority, and only Stephens County, home of Jack Cox, went for the Republican.

Baird gave Mr. Connally a 370-121 majority and joined Texas

voters in giving Democratic candidates a wide majority.

Baird voting went as follows: Governor — Connally 370, Cox, 121; lieutenant governor — Smith 416, Hayes, 88; attorney general — Carr, 435, Kennerley, 73; Congressman at large — Pool, 420, Barry, 89; railroad commissioner unexpired term — Ben Ramsey, 435, Hanson, 71; comptroller — Calvert, 410, Mrs. Smith, 64; treasurer — James, 461, Land Commissioner — Sadler, 434, Fay, 72; Agriculture commissioner — White, 428, Hubbard, 77.

Esco Walters, Omar Burleson, Mrs. George Swinney, Tom Creighton, Nelson Quinn, Wayne Gibbins, Byron Richardson, Beatrice Deal, Hazel Reynolds were unopposed and were placed in office by large majorities.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Ples Marion of Big Spring, Lawrence Burrows of Odessa and Guy Marshall of Big Spring, Lawrence Burrow of Clara Ferguson of Eula and Miss Claudia Burrow; 11 grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren.

Clyde Bulldogs Edge Baird Bears 7-6 In Homecoming Game Saturday Night

An otherwise successful Baird homecoming was marred Saturday night when the Clyde Bulldogs slipped up on the Baird Bears and nosed them out by a one point 7-6 margin.

An overflow crowd of between 2,500 and 3,000 partisan fans were at the Bear's Den to watch the underdog Clyde eleven score a first period touchdown and hold on for the rest of the game to keep the Bears in check.

The Bulldogs struck midway in the first quarter when Halfback Alton Brannan went through a hole in the Baird line and scampered 65 yards to score. His initial blast took him past the linebacker and from there on in he was by himself. End Johnny McCleskey provided the winning point when his kick went through the uprights to put the Clyde team ahead 7-0.

After the score, the Clyde team held on with a tight grip, and the Bears were never able to get their attack going. It was not until the final quarter was half over that the Bears put together a nice run by Tenell Scott and a 14 yard pass from Cotton Barnes to Johnny Higgins for 6 points. Scott consumed 65 yards of the 79 yard drive for the score on a nice scamper around end. He was caught from behind and dropped on the 14 yard line. From that point Barnes passed to Higgins for the score. Baird attempted the two points after in an effort to pull their chestnuts out of the fire, but a pass attempt from Barnes to End Jud Gilliland was too tall. Baird's heretofore powerful ground game was used sparingly during the contest. They chose

instead to try the air waves with fleet running Cotton Barnes on the throwing end. He got off 33 passes and completed 14 and had two interceptions.

The Bears had two scoring opportunities in the first half both coming on miscues by the Bulldogs. The first was on a fumble recovered on the Clyde 30. Four incomplete passes in a row gave the Bulldogs the ball again. The second scoring chance came on a recovery at about the eight. Nothing worked for the Bears and in four plays they wound up with net loss of 10 yards. The ball went over on a fourth down attempt at the 18.

Statistically it was about as close as the score. Baird made 10 first downs to Clyde's 9, and on total offense Baird made 256 yards as opposed to 232 for the visitors. A total of 65 of Baird's yards were nullified by penalties while Clyde lost 20. Of Baird's total yardage, 118 were made on the ground. Of that number Scott's 65 yard run accounted for more than half. Passing accounted for 138 yards for the Bears. The entire team played hard, possibly too hard, but were not able to get their attack to jell.

Defensively they looked good. The one run by Brannan was Clyde's main show. The Bears held them in check for most of the remainder of the game. Likewise, Clyde's defensive effort was good. Each team was able to move between the 30 yard lines, but from there on in the going got rough.

The win put Clyde in a tie with Baird for second place and put the potent Albany Lions in

the top spot in the district. The Bears go to Albany Friday night for the important game that may well decide the district race. If Albany wins over the Bears they should go into bi-district play with little trouble. Baird could throw the chase into a three way tie by winning the game and force the bi-district representative to be decided by a coin toss. Clyde has Cross Plains and Eastland remaining on their schedule while Albany has Baird and Cross Plains. After the Albany game, the Bears take on hapless Ranger.

Clyde Park Board Finds Suitable Tract for Proposed City Park

A public meeting for residents of Clyde, planned for the discussion of plans for financing and construction of a city park for the community, has been called for Tuesday night, November 13, at the school cafeteria at 7:30 p.m.

A three man parks board was named at a previous meeting and charged with the responsibility of making a survey of the

needs and to work out details of the proposed program. Named to the board were Arnold Connell, Douglas Bonine and Knox Waggoner.

During the summer of 1962, Board members reported, there were some 200 boys active in the Clyde summer baseball program. This number includes the Pee Wee, Little League, and Teenage League. "The Value of this program cannot, by any means, be measured," they said. "The program is designed to give our children and young people a supervised recreation outlet during the summer months. It also provides pleasure and enjoyment for the parents as they become interested spectators. One of the greatest attributes of the program is that it helps to develop qualities of leadership and sportsmanship as well as bodies and minds of our children.

"However, as is true in the case of many good things, this program for our young people must come to an end unless we, the parents, unite our efforts to prevent this tragedy. We realize that the baseball field that has been used in the past is no longer available for this purpose. The field is the property of the Clyde Public School and because of recent growth is needed by the school.

"At the close of the past summer's baseball season, a group

of interested men met with the city council and discussed the problem and named a three man Park's Board for the purpose of locating a suitable, yet reasonable, location for a city park. After looking at available property, a 40 acre tract appeared to be more reasonable at \$10,500.00, (\$262.50 per acre.) All other available land is priced at or near \$1,000.00 per acre," spokesman for the board said.

The Park's Board, has reached a tentative agreement with the land owner whereby the land could be paid for very reasonably. The terms that have been agreed upon, pending the approval of the citizens of Clyde, are for a down payment of \$1,500.00 due October, 1963, and the annual payment would be \$600 plus 6 per cent interest. No interest would be charged the first year.

It is felt that, due to the rapid growth of the city of Clyde and the increasing need for recreation facilities for adults as well as young people, such a city park is very vital to the welfare to the people.

A second meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday night, November 13, everyone is urged to attend the Tuesday meeting.

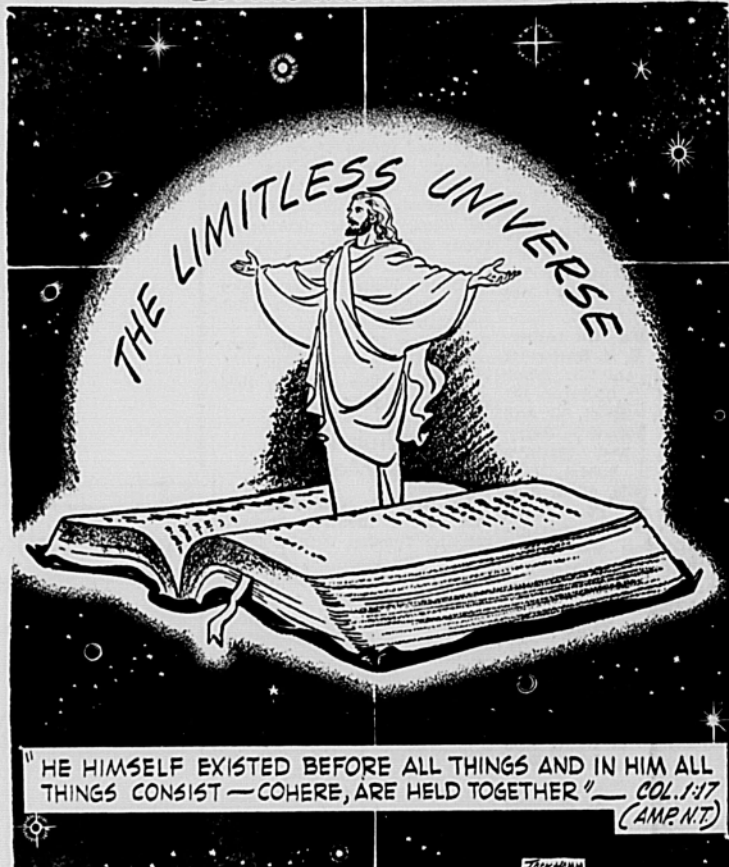

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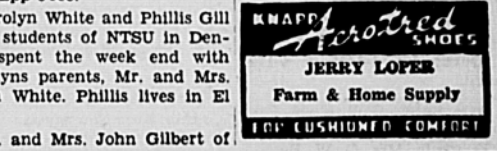

librarian of the demonstration unit serving Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor counties through an agreement with Texas State Library, reported a "noticeable increase in the demands for books concerning our pioneer days and our heritage," she added, "it is pleasant to note that young people are showing a keen interest in knowing about the early days in America."

Historians will readily recognize that early day Ranger, the physician and the big family would have to be associated with the tri-counties of Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor.

Callahan county, organized in 1877 from the 1,858 acreage of Bexar, Travis and Bosque counties, was named for James Hughes Callahan, an early day Texas Ranger and soldier who participated in many battles.

Shackelford county, organized three years earlier, in 1874 from the 1,858 boundaries of Bosque county, was named in honor of Dr. John (Jack) Shackelford, who personally furnished the clothing and arms for more than 75 Red Rovers who fought many Texas battles.

And strangely enough, both Callahan and Shackelford were in the Battle of Goliad (known today as the Goliad Massacre) and both were spared because of their particular talents needed by the Mexican Army. Callahan was reported to have been Shackelford was spared for his medical skill. Later Dr. Shackelford wrote one of the best accounts of the Goliad event.

Taylor county, organized in 1878 from the 1,958 land in Bexar and Travis counties, was named for a number of families whose surname was Taylor, who were part of the famed Robertson Colony. This colony of more than 800 families was second in

size only to Stephen F. Austin's largest colony.

"Indeed news editors of the various media that serve the Tri-County Bookmobile area may stop here and suppress a desire to 'blue-pencil' some of the above," Dr. Winfrey remarked, "but it is a fact that the Tri-County Bookmobile serving the citizens of Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor counties is supplying a library need and more than 4,000 books and recordings were checked out last month," he concluded. It was also noted that 45 reference transactions were handled by the Bookmobile staff.

Romantic days of the pioneers, or today's race for the first lunar landing, are all covered in information found in the jointly sponsored mobile information center. Citizens were reminded that the service is free for the asking.

Callahan patrons borrowed 907 books or records; Shackelford, 459 and Taylor 2,875. During the month 101 new patrons signed the brief registration form to become borrowers.

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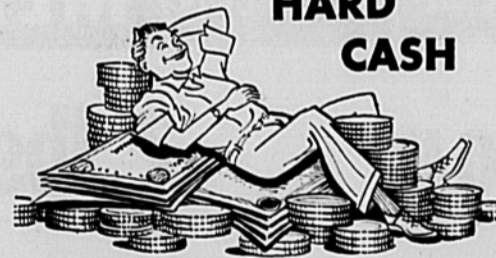
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
