"Fond Memories"

When asked to write about my memories of school days in Cross Plains, so many good things and happy times flooded my mind that I could almost fill the newspaper! Instead, I've tried to recall some events that really stand out in my memory.

My fondest recollection of elementary school was entering the 4th and 5th grades. That's because the classrooms were upstairs in the old high school building, and we felt somewhat important up there.

The view out the windows was great, but if you dropped your pencil, look out! The floors were slanted and it would roll to the back of the room.

It was here that the shocking news of President Kennedy's assassination in 1963 came to us. My teacher, Marie Stambaugh, admirably handled the situation, calming her class of bewildered 9 year-olds by having us stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance. For most of us, that was hard to do with a lump in your throat and tears in your eyes.

Clara Nell Spencer was my 6th grade teacher, and it was her first year in Cross Plains Elementary. She made learning fun with special projects, wall murals, etc. I'll never forget the time she let four boys talk her into letting them make a volcano for a science project. When the day came to exhibit their masterpiece, the volcano's "eruption" sent a cloud of smoke and "rotten egg" odor through the building.

Everyone came to see what happended, and Clara Nell thought her career in Cross Plains was short-lived. Even the superintendent laughed and thought the volcano was a great idea. Maybe because his own son was one of its creators!

My junior and high school days were busy, like most students are today. Lacking the natural ability to be an athlete, I became the next best thing -- an avid Buffalo supporter, which I remain to this day. Athletic highlights of my school years were the Buffaloes sharing the District Co-Championship in football in 1969 with Goldthwaite, and the thrill of the trip to Austin to see the Buffettes play for the 1967 Class A State Basketball title. Our girls team made it to the state tourna-

ment the year before, also. The activity I loved best was being a member of the Buffalo Marching Band. I was too young to be in Wayne McDonald's Sweepstakes bands, but we did keep up the tradition of being a Division I marching band through pride, determination, discipline and plain hard work.

We lowly beginners feared and revered our senior and junior upperclassmen's authority, because we never knew when they might subject us to the ultimate humiliation -- the AWKWARD SQUAD!

The band performed precision military style routines, featuring "step-two" diamond formations, until Lee Bulls came along and taught us the fine art of making "pinwheels" in our shows.

I will always remember the horrible sight of arriving at school that morning to see billowing, acrid smoke still pouring from the building, which was completely gutted by the blaze.

But order reigned out of chaos as so many people cooperated to finish out the school year. It's typical of the caring attitude found in Cross Plains.

Yes, I am grateful for the years I spent in the Cross Plains schools and to the many fine teachers who influenced my life. I'm proud to be a graduate of Cross Plains High School and look forward to Homecoming 1991. SEE YOU THERE!

"The Tuba Player"

One day in July 1938, my father came home at noon and walked down to the field where I was plowing. "Wallace, you can take the horses to the barn, feed'em and turn'em out to pasture. You're going into town with me this afternoon.

Well, going into town in the middle of the week was almost unheard of when I was a kid. That treat was generally reserved for Saturday after-

"What for?" "They are starting a high school band in Cross Plains and I told the band director you would play the tuba." "What's a tuba?" "It's a bass horn. I used to play it in the municipal band," he said.

In town we went to an empty store on Main Street and entered to a cacophony of strange noises. There sat about 25 schoolmates, most of whom I had not seen since school let out in the

Tom Arrwood was moving a trombone slide in and out. So was Kathryn Anderson and Margaret Browning. Lyna Lee Smith was blowing a French horn and Donnel Clark fingered the valve of a baritone horn.

Off to one side, making stranger sounds on clarinets, were Jack Tunnell, Larry McDonough, Jaunita Burks and a few others. Dickie Hunington was tapping on the rim of a snare drum and Jimmie Taylor was swinging a bass drum stick.

Trumpets and cornets blared from another corner, and Erlene Sillix was ringing random notes on what I later found was a xylophone. At the time, I probably did not know the names of most of the instruments.

I was introduced to Mr. Dale Mc-Cook, the first bandmaster hired by the School Board to get this new enterprize underway. McCook pointed to the biggest instrument in the room, standing upside down in the corner.

"That's your tuba, I'll show you how to blow it in a few minutes." "So, that's a tuba!"

Dale McCook showed us all how to blow it, ring it, beat it, or do whatever was needed to make noise on our particular instrument. Most of us had little, if any, music training. I certainly had had none.

But, by the end of the first day we were all blowing middle "C" on the downbeat.

By the time school started, we were playing a tune, march "Normal," as I remember it, page 2 in the basic band book. We played that one number several times at the first football game of the season.

And, we learned to march under the baton of Johnye Frances Baldwin; probably wore out our welcome at the first few football games, playing and marching to "Normal" over and over.

Before long, we learned other marches: "Washington Post," "Semper Fidelis," "Under the Double Eagle," and "His Honor." We also worked up a couple of overtures and by the next spring gave our first concert in the high school auditorium.

It was a new world, this world of music. The band traveled to football games, marched at half-times, played for basketball games, gave concerts, and participated in regional band con-

We marched in parades, made trips with the Chamber of Commerce to boost the 4th of July Picnic and played at every opportunity. During the school year we practiced every day at noon.

A Band Boosters Club was formed

among parents, teachers and others interested in the band. They bought uniforms, music, and instruments. They also provided transportation and "chaperones" for out-of-town events. It became a matter of community pride to see the band prosper and grow.

And prosper it did. Years later it grew into a first class band with national recognition. It has been a 54 year success story.

As I look back, what happened that day in 1938 was not just personal, me getting introduced to the tuba.

What really happened was that a new element was introduced into our culture. As high school students were learning music they were also experiencing a new way of communication with a larger world of people and ideas. At the same time, townspeople were learning new skills in community-building and taking new pride in self-generated progress.

So. on October 12, 1991, when you see the Cross Plains High School Band march down Main Street leading the Homecoming parade, you will know, and take pride in the fact, that the roots of the present grow deep in the past.

"Remember Playing Hooky?"

I attended school in Cross Plains from 1926 to 1935. It still feels like home to me. I cherish many good memories while living there.

We had a lot of fun, but times were hard. My father, Oscar Lacky, was night watchman in the community for several years. Once he sent a young woman home for not wearing stockings on the sidewalk. Man how times have changed!

One fond memory, which I hope I recall correctly, occured on April 1. 1935. I was a Senior and our class had decided to play hooky on this particular prankish day. The Juniors wanted to go too, and then the Sophomores and Freshmen got into the act, also. The Seniors wanted the Freshmen to go so they could wait on them, being under classmen, and we could haze them a little, too.

It turned out that only about 30 students attended school that day. The teachers, with the advice of Mr. Nat Williams, went out to find the kids. We had left word that we were going somewhere else and they didn't locate

About daylight, Jay Mayes and I hung a pair red "bloomers," that Ernestine Sipes got from her mother, on the school flag pole. I climbed up and tied them on, then cut and tied the ropes. Jay tossed up a can of axel grease and I greased the pole on the way down. The wind was really blowing and as we looked back they were

flapping in the breeze.

There was no school that day and all the teachers were looking for us. We had a great time, but we knew the next day we would be in for it.

Mr. Williams took us to the study hall one at a time. He told me to bend over and hold my ankles. That paddle came down on a DESK beside me with such a loud bang. I must have come ; foot off the floor. He repeated thi process four more times, and told m to take a seat. It turned out that he gav all the Seniors the same treatment.

We paid for it, though. No Seni trip to Carlsbad Caverns, no Junio Senior Banquet, and 50 demerits. W it worth it? Maybe yes, maybe no, has been 56 years since that day.



New Law Will Make **Government Jobs** More Accessible Statewide

"Texas job seekers now have an opportunity to apply for state government jobs without having to travel to Austin," said TEC Commisioner Mary Scott Nabors. "The recently passed House Bill 2556 will give Texans a chance to compete for state government jobs by registering at any of TEC's 130 computer-linked offices.

When House Bill 2556 was passed in the Texas legislature earlier this summer, state leaders saw it as a way to expand state government job opportunities for Texans across the state. The new law went into effect June 16 and requires all state agencies within the executive and judicial branches of government to list with the Texas Employment Commission (TEC) all job openings which are open to outside applicants. The only state agencies not affected by the law are agencies that serve as arms of the Legislature such as special committees or advisory boards.

Nabers said in the past most state agency jobs were posted at the Governor's Job Bank in Austin, and few individuals had the opportunity to apply for them. TEC is delighted to have the new statewide job listings but is concerned that many job seekers may still be unaware of state government job opportunities available in their hometowns.

"State leaders wanted to increase the options for out of work Texans and, at the same time, make searching for qualified job applicants much easier for state agencies," Nabers said. "I believe we can achieve both of these goals.

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular commissioner's court meeting Monday, September 23, voted to advertise for bids to purchase four vehicles for the county sheriff's department.

The action was taken by commissioners after meeting with Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner concerning costly automobile expense in the sheriff's department.

Currently, the county sheriff and five sheriff's officers are given a vehicle allowance and paid by the mile for using their personal vehicles.

County Judge Bill Johnson proposed the idea of the county purchasing four vehicles for the department to be used by the deputies and sheriff in their duties and to no longer pay the employees a vehicle allowance and for mileage.

Commissioners voted unanimously to advertise for bids to purchase four vehicles for the sheriff's department. Four deputies would share the use of three vehicles, while Sheriff Skinner would be provided with the fourth vehicle.

Other agenda items brought before commissioner's court included:

-Commissioner's set Friday, September 27 as the day for a public hearing on the proposed 1991-92 fiscal year county budget. Commissioners also discussed raising the county tax rate.

The increase is need to help pay for several mandated items such as the voting and commissioner precinct redistricting and a proposed 5% pay increase for all county employees. County employees have not received a pay raise since 1988.

Judge Johnson said that tax revenues will be down this year due to the loss of the bank franchise tax as well as other factors. He added the budget he presented to commissioners was basically the same as last year's. The 1991 budget is based on a proposed county tax rate of .2616 cents per \$100 value, a .0784 cents per \$100 value Farm to Market Road tax rate. Last year's tax rates were .2590 cents on the county tax and .0779 cents county road tax. The proposed budget calls for expenditures of \$1,410,156.15.

-Commissioners voted to set the voting election workers rate of pay at \$5 per house for all upcoming elections.

-Commissioners voted to cast 1,000 votes for Wauneta Estes as the county's nominee to the Callahan County Appraisal District's board of directors. Commissioners also voted to cast the remaining 377 votes to the City of Baird for its nominee to the board. All seven taxing entities in the Callahan County Appraisal District can cast votes for nominees to the directorship. The num-

ber of votes each taxing entity receives is based on the percentage of tax levy for that entity. Callahan County can cast 1,377 votes, while Clyde CISD has 1,143 votes, Baird ISD has 1,118 votes, Cross Plains ISD has 880, the City of Clyde with 344 votes, the City of Baird with 136 votes and the City of Putnam with four votes. There are five appraisal district board members. Each taxing entity can nominate a person to the board of directors and the five with the most votes win election to the board. Casting of 1,000 votes to a person will ensure a nominee a position to the board.

-Commissioners voted to adopt resolution H.B. 850 pertaining to the regulation of private ditches for the benefit of the county with all rules and regulations of H.B. 850 to be observed and adhered to. The resolution gives the county the right to remove blockage of a ditch on land owned by an individual if the ditch connects with a drainage ditch constructed or maintained by the

-Commissioners had a discussion concerning the procedure for payment of court appointed attorneys. Commissioners voted that the county enact a policy whereby the county would only pay for a court appointed attorney if the judge in the case held an indigent hearing and determined that the requester was indeed indigent and unable to afford an attorney. Commissioners also voted to include in the motion that the latest court appointed attorney's bill of \$1,400 be denied. The county has paid out over \$17,000 this year in court appointed attorney fees.

-Commissioners voted to approve the written description of the new voting precinct boundaries for Callahan County. The county will go from eight voting precincts to seven precincts when the new redistricting has been

#### SEXUAL HARASSMENT HARASSES EVERYONE INVOLVED

Dear Commissioner Nabers,

One of my employees has started dating his secretary. I am afraid that this is going to cause trouble in the office and that she might claim sexual harassment. On the other hand, I do not want to pry into someone else's personal life. What should I do?

N.R. **Bay City** 

Dear N.R.,

Office romances pose a real problem for employers. In one study, 27 percent of the sexual harassment complaints brought against less than half of the Fortune 500 companies arose out of office romances.

Relationships between employees can cause severe morale problems, not just for the couple, but for the other employees as well. These relationships typically cause a drop in productivity and a disrupted workplace.

One of the hallmarks of sexual harassment is that the advances made are "unwelcome." Therefore, it may be a good idea for you to speak with both employees separately to ensure that the relationship is welcome. Be careful to listen to the nonverbal communication as well as the verbal communication. It is not uncommon for an employee to "voluntarily" engage in an unwelcome romance for fear of losing his or her job.

While it may be uncomfortable to appear to be prying into someone else's private life, you have a duty as the employer to investigate any possible claims of sexual harassment. At the same time, you should document these efforts in the event a claim is later filed.

I am the only female in an all male office. We all work together in an open area. The men I work with have centerfolds hanging on the wall, and every Monday morning they discuss their "conquests" from the weekend.

I find this behavior very uncomfortable to be around, but I am afraid to say anything to my boss because he might fire me. How can I get these guys to stop it?

Dear H.H.,

Sexual harassment comes in many forms. Aside from unwelcome sexual advances, it can also include conduct which unreasonably interferes with an individual's work performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive workplace. You have a right to do your job in an atmosphere free of sexual innuendo.

While it may be difficult to discuss this situation with your boss, you should attempt to do so. **Mary Scott Nabers**



It depends on the sponsor. Amusement services are not taxable if they are run by a non-profit organization. The haunted house or hayride ad-

mission would be taxable if a commercial enterprise sponsored the

#### Don't get tricked on taxes for treats

Candy is subject to state sales tax. That means you'll have to pay tax on chocolate bars, peanut butter cups and hard candies that you give out as Halloween treats. This includes all candy, whether sold in bulk or individually packaged.

Candy sold by the PTA at school fairs or by the church at church bazaars is not taxable. For example, sales tax should not be charged on pralines, peanut brittle, black licorice, candy corn or candied apples.

And speaking of candied apples, the tax situation gets a little sticky. Caramel is taxable. But the apples aren't.

#### Add sales tax to seasonal items

Know that you'll have to add tax to seasonal items selling this-time of year. Plastic jack o'lanterns, printed trick-or-treat bags and fake skeletons are all taxable. Also included are fake blood, makeup and fangs.

#### Count on tax on costumes

Tax will be added to the purchase of Halloween costumes. Likewise, costume rentals are subject to the sales tax. For example, you'll be paying tax on capes, wigs, shoes and bodysuits you rent.

#### A word about pumpkin purchases

Pumpkin stands do a lot of business in the fall. No sales tax is due when purchasing pumpkins, whether at the side of the road or at the grocery



#### Nominate Candidates On The ASC Community Committee Ballot

"Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 28 to be on the ASC COMMUNITY committee ballot," says Scott Odom, County Executive Director.

The ASC COMMUNITY committee election will be conducted from November 22 to December 2 by mail ballot. The 3 ASC communities in Callahan County are: (LAA 1 - Clyde, Eula & Oplin area, LAA 2 - Putnam, Baird, and down the middle of the county to the south county line, LAA 3 - Cross Plains vicinity) LAA 1 is up for election this year.

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, Odom said. Callahan County farmers have the opportunity to nominate people they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers have received petition forms by mail and are now submitting them to the county ASCS office.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions, Odom said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm votes in the ASC community, and must be received in the county ASCS office by the October 29 deadline.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

"Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC committee. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC committee is essential in the administration of farm programs," Odom said.

Odom further explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap, or national origin.



#### **New Social Security** 800 Number

The Social Security Administration (SSA) changed its toll free telephone number as of October 1, 1991. Glyn Hammons. Social Security manager in Abilene stated. The new number is 1-800-SSA-1213.

The SSA number change resulted from Congressional legislation that requires Federal Government agencies to convert to a new telecommunications system called "FTS 2000."

Since the new system is managed by a different service carrier than the agencies had used in the past, SSA had to change its toll free number.

Hammons said that since its nationwide implementation 2 years ago, the 800 number service has become a popular option for people who have Social Security business. Callers find that their requests can be handled easily, conveniently, and expeditiously by phone. In many instances, their business can be completed at the time of the initial call. Recent studies show that more than two-thirds of the 800-number callers prefer using the telephone over having to visit the of-

SSA also offers a telephone response unit that uses an automatic script to speed the processing of certain routine requests. Using a pushbutton telephone, you can: request an application for a Social Security number: obtain a request form for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement; request written verification of the amount of your Social Security benefit or Supplemental Security Income payment; order publications; and listen to general information about the Social Security programs.

With the assistance of a teleservice representative at the 800 number, you can change a mailing address, make an appointment to apply for benefits. report a missing check, or simply ask a question.

Service on the 800 number is available weekdays from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. But, the best time to call is early in the morning or late in the afternoon, Wednesday through Friday after the first week of the month.




