## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax If you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property - exemptions that may apply to you; - cancellation of agricultural appraisa - whether your property is taxable; which local governments should be taxing your property; or
you think the appraisal district has done someining eise that adversely affected you Informal Review: Call to schedule
appointment with an appraiser.

Review by the Appralsal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally your case heard by the appraisal review board.
The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews
problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice or protest) before the deadline, the ARB will sel your case for a hearing. You and place of the hearing The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at (insert address) Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.
Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you'renot satisfied with the decision you have the ighto appeal, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

The following information about the The following information about she levels may be interesting: - Of every 100 initial claims, 37
are approved. Of the 63 that are are approved. Of the 63 that are
denied, 30 are asked to be reconsidered. Five of the 30 reconsidered claims are approved. Of the 25 that are denied, 18 are asked to be heard
before an administrative law judge. Of before an administrative law judge. Of
these 18 hearings, 11 are approved. these 18 hearings, 11 are approved.
