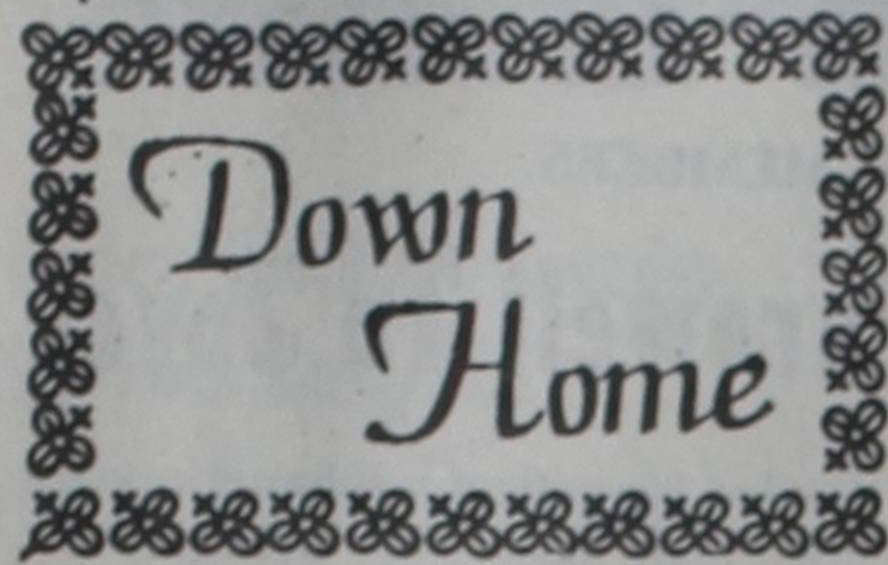

**RELEASE THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1953**  
Washington — "As It Looks From Here," Omar Burluson, Congressman, 17th Dist.

In a number of letters during my service in the Congress, people have quoted the 14th Verse of the 7th Chapter of II Chronicles.

A few days ago I had a letter from a friend in Cross Plains who is devoted to her church and to all good causes, who sent me the admonition contained in this Scripture. Her letter was written with deep insights as to the direst need of this anxious day in the life of America. She likely senses that the problems which cry to Heaven for solution are so central and crucial that they must be resolved or catastrophe awaits.

In these desperate days, from newspaper, magazine, radio and pulpit we are being admonished that the fundamental questions are what might be called moral, spiritual, religious. We have come to such a plight that the choice which must be made involves the blessing or the curse, life or death, for our Nation and our boasted Way of Life.

In this letter referred to was quoted this most monumental sentence. It was quoted in a prayer during the last Congress and is as overarching in hope as a glorious rainbow. But sounding in it is also a doleful solemnity suggesting those for whom the bells toll. "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from Heaven, and will forgive their sins and will heal their land."

In this awe-inspiring covenant, the two mighty monosyllables to write in letters of fire across the sky are "if" and "then" for they are rooted in the inexorable law of cause and effect.

"If" is one of the shortest and biggest words in the Bible. It is written across every promise of spiritual guidance and enrichment.

From Genesis to Revelations we are constantly assured that certain things will happen sure as the rising sun if — if — the conditions are fulfilled. "If with all your hearts ye truly seek Me, then ye shall surely find Me." That is not just a nice motto. It is a law of the unseen.

President Eisenhower in his recent address to the Congress said that we must be strong in arms and strong in productivity but above all, strong in our spiritual resources. These are the needs of this Nation, and of we, the people who inhabit it, I am glad that President Eisenhower is opening his Cabinet meetings with prayer. In the Cabinet Room where these meetings are held, the likenesses of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, Andrew Jackson, and Woodrow Wilson look down upon the group. The first three did much to give us a Republic; the latter two did much to preserve it. The problems facing President Eisenhower today are no less grave.

It would be encouraging to people all over these United States to know that on each Thursday morning at 8 o'clock, a group of Members of Congress come together in a Devotional to admit that the wisdom of man alone is wholly inadequate to meet the responsibilities of running this Government and pray for Divine Guidance. Christ's rule was that "If you do His will, you shall know."

Long before Eisenhower was President he said to a great company of religious leaders that "without a spiritual renaissance, America is doomed." The sharpest sword

## Children's Miracle Network Rock-A-Thon Saturday, May 25

The Cross Plains Dairy Queen will be sponsoring the Children's Miracle Network Rock-A-Thon Saturday, May 25. Volunteers rocking for pledges, competitions for children, and entertainment will make for a fun day.

The local business has been active in the fundraiser for several years, assisting Meek Children's Hospital in Abilene. This year the Richeson Dairy Queens in the Abilene District are striving to raise enough to purchase a monitor for the intensive care unit, which is being established in the pediatric wing. Other businesses and organizations are purchasing equipment to furnish the needed unit. A children's intensive care unit was not provided previously.

Meek Children's Hospital has specialized physicians, nurses, facilities, and equipment necessary for treating children. More than 2,000 babies are born each year at Hendrick. A trauma center, poison control, ambulatory surgery, and pediatric audiology services are provided.

In 1990 Hendrick Medical Center served children from more than 23 West Texas counties. Callahan patients totaled 118 for 281 days. (Eastland had a total of 75 patients for 212 days.)

The proceeds from the Cross Plains event will benefit the Meek Children's Hospital and will be applied to the cost of the \$20,000 monitor currently needed.

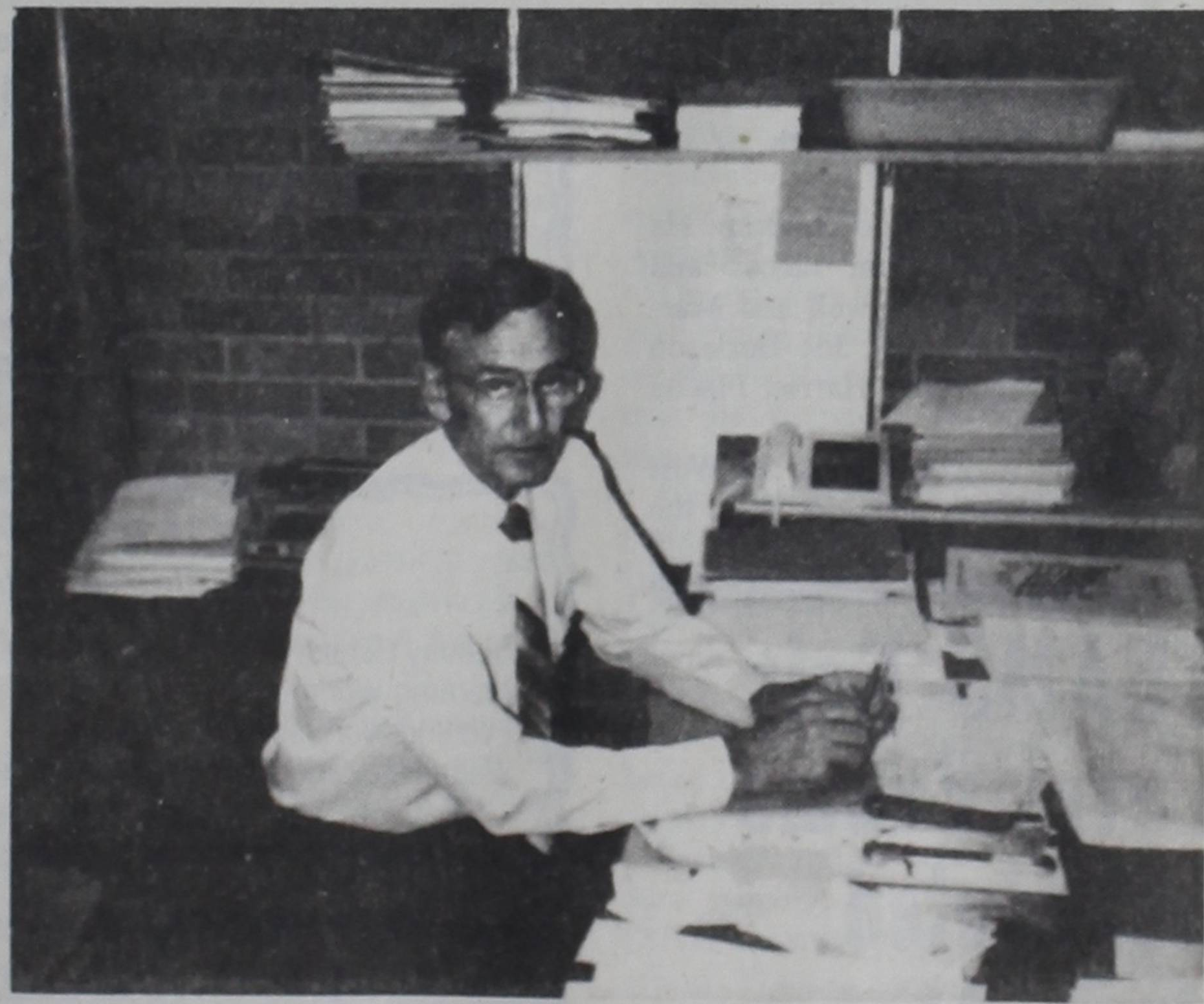

Class officers are Brenda Franke, President; Tracy Erwin, Vice-President; Michelle Richardson, Secretary; and Pam Glover, Treasurer.

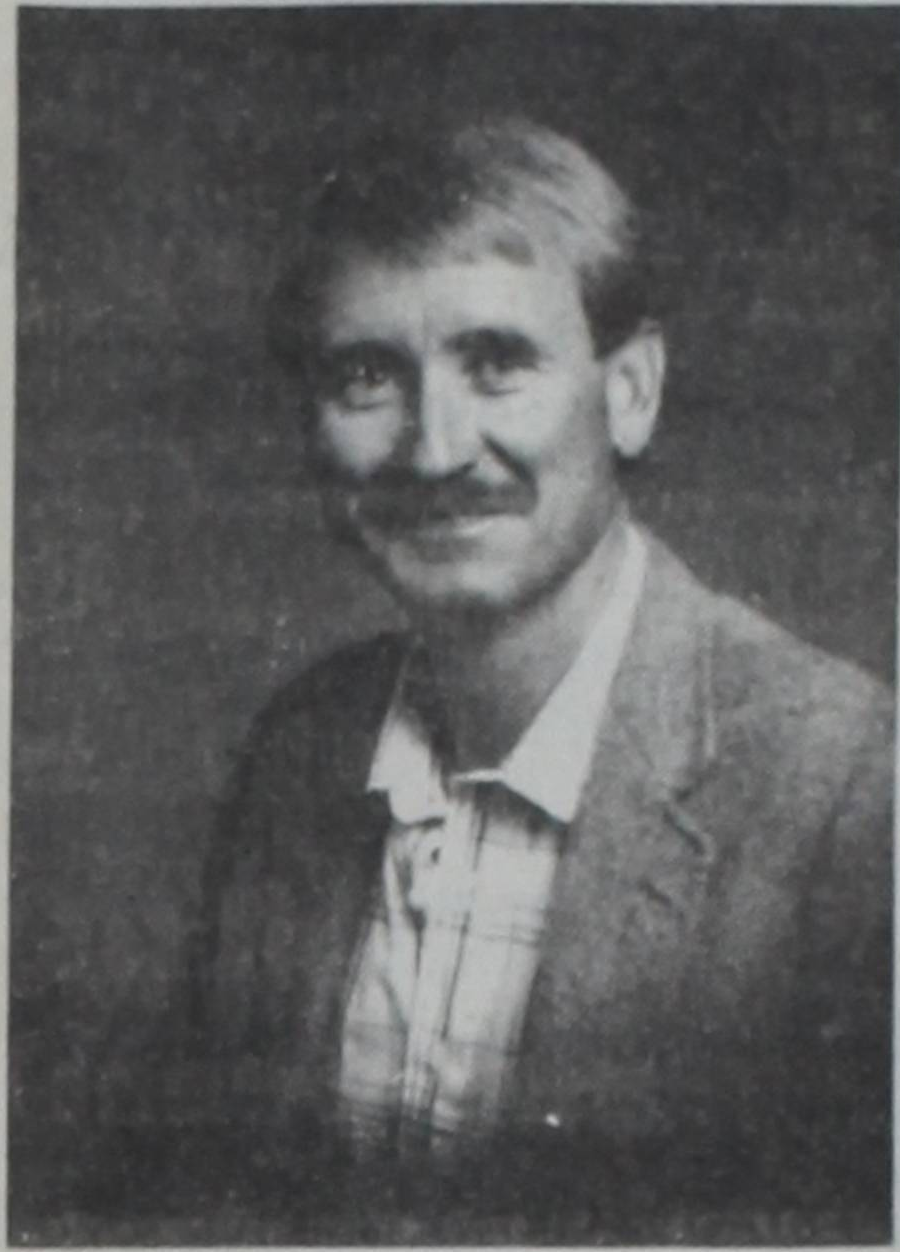

## Plane Crash Claims Noah Cowan Hutton, Jr.

Noah Cowan Hutton, Jr., age 46, was killed when his plane crashed at Cross County, Arkansas Wednesday, May 15. Services were held Monday at Anton.

An ag pilot, he had finished spraying a field when the accident occurred. When Hutton was delayed, a scout plane flew out to check and discovered his plane upside down in a timber area, as reported to the family.

In an unofficial report, a wing was missing from the plane and wreckage from the wing was found approximately 1/3 mile away. A full report of the incident has not yet been completed and is under investigation.

Hutton was a member of the National Aerial Applicators Association, the States of Texas and Arkansas Aerial Applicators Association, and the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association. He was also a member of the Cross Plains Co-Op, the V.F.W., and a member of the Anton Church of Christ.

He had lived at Anton, Texas since 1986. He was a graduate of Cross Plains High School.

He is survived by his wife, Tempie, and sons, Matt and J.R., and daughters, Melissa and Annie; his parents, Cowan and Laverne Hutton; a sister, Wanetta Parson; brothers, J.D. Hutton, Danny Hutton, and Lynn Hutton, all of Cross Plains; and his grandmothers, Ella Dean of Cross Plains and Iona Hutton of Lubbock.

ANSON — Omar Burleson, age 85, died Tuesday, May 14, at an Abilene hospital.

Dear Editor:

As one of your readers, I want to urge you in the strongest terms possible to increase your coverage of the fact that for every new dollar that Congress has raised this year in new taxes it has increased spending by \$1.78. As *Reader's Digest* reported, the budget and new taxes are a "sham."

Tragically, the American people and the news media bought the "this budget agreement will reduce the deficit" story hook, line and sinker. And now we are paying the price in higher taxes and higher deficits. I urge you to expand your coverage and report important facts such as:

1. Congress enacted the second largest tax increase in history;

2. Congress increased spending by \$111 billion;

3. Congress enlarged the deficit by \$100 billion to an all-time record of \$320 billion for FY 1991 alone;

4. Congress pushed the national debt to a new record and increased the annual interest payment on the debt to a staggering \$254 BILLION; and,

5. Congress destroyed the Gramm-Rudman Deficit Reduction Act and all other effective controls on future congressional wasteful spending.

As Citizens Against Government Waste has pointed out repeatedly, we have this skyrocketing deficit today not because of the recession but because Congress refuses to stop its reckless spending. Unless we get Congress' runaway taxes and wasteful deficit spending under control we will all be in very, very serious trouble very soon. I urge you to give more coverage to this all-important story. Thank you.

### Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

**Informal Review:** Call to schedule an appointment with an appraiser.

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board:** If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a *notice of protest*) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at (insert address)

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

**Review by the District Court:** After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

**More Information:** You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 854-1165, 130-A W. 4th St., Baird. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

### Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

**Usual deadline:** On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

**Late protests (if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.)** Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

**Special deadlines:**  
**Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land)** Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

**ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed)** Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

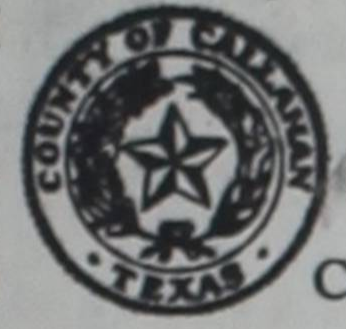

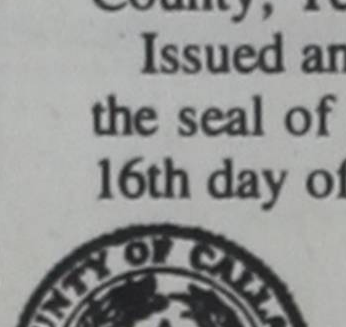

### The Social Security Disability Appeals Process

Often Social Security disability claimants are surprised and upset when their claims are denied. Many people appeal these decisions, and their claims are later approved.

There are several reasons a claim is approved on appeal rather than the time of initial application. The medical condition may worsen, new medical evidence may be available, or a condition that was expected to improve just did not. Any of these changes could cause an earlier decision to be reversed.

The following information about the approval rate at the various decision levels may be interesting:

- Of every 100 initial claims, 37 are approved. Of the 63 that are denied, 30 are asked to be reconsidered.

- Five of the 30 reconsidered claims are approved. Of the 25 that are denied, 18 are asked to be heard before an administrative law judge. Of these 18 hearings, 11 are approved.

- Four of the 7 cases denied at the hearing level are asked to be reviewed by the Appeals Council. Less than one-third of these cases are approved.

The Appeals Council is Social Security's highest level of review. Beyond that, a person must file suit in Federal court.

Overall, about 50 percent of all disability claims, including those that are appealed through all levels, are finally approved. The appeals process protects claimants' rights to benefits by assuring that, upon request, the Social Security Administration will review its decisions to be sure they are correct.

The representative can also answer any of your questions about Social Security.
