Three races in the Democratic Primary Election set for March 10 will be contested after several candidate filings this week.

The office of County Sheriff now has three candidates vying for the position after a Cross Plains man filed.

Donald D. Childers, who lists his address at P.O. Box 721 in Cross Plains, is the latest to file for County Sheriff. The 39-year-old Childers has resided in the state 36 years and in Callahan County three years. He lists

his occupation as a farmer/rancher. Childers is seeking the office of County Sheriff along with incumbent Sheriff Bill Skinner and Eddie Curtis.

Incumbent County Attorney Brad Harris of Clyde will have an opponent after a Eula man filed for the County Attorney position December 17.

Allen D. Wright, 39, of Rt. 1 Box 314 in Clyde, has resided in the state 19 years and in Callahan County three years. Wright lists his occupation as an Assistant District Attorney of Taylor County.

The office of County Constable Precinct #5 (Eula) will also be contested between David Blalock and Dahyl Bradshaw.

Blalock, 45, filed December 17 for the County Constable position. He lists his address at Rt. 2 Box 272-C in Clyde. He has lived all his life in Texas and all 45 years in Callahan County. Blalock lists his occupation as a farmer/truck driver.

John Weeks, 42, an Abilene lawyer, was the first candidate to file for the office of 42nd District Court Judge. Weeks will be seeking the position being vacated by Don Lane, who is retiring.

Candidate filing for positions of County Attorney, Tax Assessor-Collector, Commissioner Precinct #1 (Clyde), Commissioner Precinct #3 (Baird), County Sheriff and 42nd District Court Judge is continuing at Hardwich Oil Co. in Baird. Also, the positions of all county precinct constables are up for election.

Jon Hardwick, Callahan County Democratic Party Chairman, said that filing will continue now until January 3 at his office located on West Highway 80 in Baird. Candidate filing forms are located at Hardwick's office or from the Callahan County Clerk's office.



Dear T.R.,

An employer can terminate someone for not taking corrective action to reduce body odor. Body odor falls under the category of personal hygiene, which is not a protected category under any state or federal anti-discrimination law. If this odor is caused by a substance you are taking for a medical condition and you are terminated, you might be qualified to draw unemployment benefits under the medical exemption. However, you should first get your condition verified by a medical doctor.

I recommend that you contact the Texas Commission on **Human Rights concerning any** questions you have about job discrimination.

Dear Commissioner Nabers,

My company is having to make some cutbacks due to the poor economy. Before we lay off any employees, we would like to offer an incentive package to our workers to possibly encourage some of them to voluntarily quit. If the employees who accept the offer were to apply for unemployment benefits, could they draw unemployment?

Dear D.N.,

If a person chooses to accept your incentive package and quit, he would be disqualified from drawing unemployment benefits because it would be viewed by TEC as a voluntary quit. On the

other hand, if you approached him with the choice of accepting the offer or being laid off, then it would most likely be considered a COMMISSIONER layoff and he could qualify for un-

employment.

Due to a recent court ruling, there is an important exception to the above general rules. If the choice is accepting the retirement incentive or staying and suffering a substantial reduction in the benefits and pension package, TEC would rule that the claimant had good cause to quit, and your account would be charged.






