ing January 1991, and 253 didn' ing the county a jobless rate of 4.7 per cent. According to Ms. Nabers, Callahan percent in December 1990. Of the
5,446 last month, 5,229 had jobs while 217 or 4.0 percent did not.
Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County include: 4.0 in November 1990, 3.4 percent in Oc -
