News From COUNTY AGENT

Harvest Warnings

As a precaution against the further spreading of undesirable weed seeds, and particularly the bind weed, or often spoken of as passion vine, all combines should be thoroughly cleaned before going into clean fields. This is especially important with combines coming in from other counties and countries. There is some bind weed in the county and because it is very difficult and expensive to eradicate on account of its extensive and deep root system. All precaution should be used in preventing its spreading.

Combines that have cut rye and vetch, or been in wheat fields that had some rye in them should be thoroughly cleaned before entering another wheat field. Rye is the curse of millers and you will be docked in price when you go to market with your wheat if it has rye in it. With increased plantings of rye and vetch in the county the possibilities of rye infested wheat fields increases and all precautions should be taken to prevent it getting mixed with wheat.

Farmers who do not own their own combines should insist that those coming in have been thoroughly cleaned.

The machines should not be cleaned in fields or on the highway as there is danger of seed germinating and the plants spreading from these spots.

A vigil look out must be kept for grasshoppers. There has been 50 lbs. of poison (sodium fluoride) distributed this week. This is 50 lbs. more than was distributed the whole season last year.

Those receiving poison Wednesday were: Leo Clinton and Y. C. Wilson. Help your neighbor control grasshoppers by joining in on distributing poison.

Farm Labor Situation

With the rearing of wheat harvest, there is a demand for combines, combine operators, and laborers and for those interested in working in the wheat areas, here's some information you are interested in.

A large number of combines will be needed by June 10 to 12 in the south part of Texas Panhandle in Crosby, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Castro, Swisher and adjoining counties. This large demand for combines will continue through all the Texas Panhandle as wheat ripens in the counties farther north.

Some trucks will be needed in the Panhandle wheat harvest after June 12, but the total number needed will depend on how fast the wheat moves by rail from the elevators.

There now is a surplus of labor, but this surplus will disappear by June 10, and many men will be needed in all the Texas Panhandle area through this harvest season.
