## Heartworms <br> On Increase <br> In Callahan County Area <br> By ROBERT P. HARLE, DVM

Canine heartworms is being diagnosed
very frequently in our area. An invery frequently in our area. An in-
creased incidence is likely to persist die to increased rainfall resulting in an increased nosquito population. This is
such a deadly disease that it is well worth reminding ourselves of certain facts:
The net result of heartworm diseas The net result of heartworm disease is the serious mechanical damage
causes to a dog's heart, lungs, live and kidneys. But while it is stopping up kidneys and blood flow, there are few outward signs of all of the internal damage being cau
is very far along.
Mosquitoes are key carriers of
heartworm disease. When an infected heartworm disease. When an infected
dog is bitten by a mosquito, blood is carried away which may include tiny, immature form
microfilariae.
larvae to travel through the forsues the body to enter the heart. Dozens of these larvae (some of which can ac tually become up to 14 inches long), become adults within another three

A blood test is the only way to detec heartworm disease in its early stages.

and other lab tests may be confirm heartworm infection. After the disease has progressed symptoms can include frequen
coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring
and finally labored breathing. and finally labored breathing.
If caught in time, a series of If caught in time, a series of injec-
tions of an organic arsenical drug can another drug can be used to get rid of the microfilariae.
No vaccine is available for heart worm disease, but you can give
regular doses of a drug which can preregular doses of a drug which can prevent infective larvae from develping
into adult worms. This can be in the form of a daily tablet; another
possiblity is a new monthly tablet possiblity is a new monthly tablet which has just become available. Our area was once thought to be a
low incidence area but with the rapid increase in the numbers of heartworm cases, we must take a more aggressive approach to the situation. We diagnosed twenty-one cases of heartworms in 1990, twenty-five in 1991, and thirty-
five cases in 1992, including one case of heartworms in a cat from the Put-
nam area.
Heartworms are on the increase fo these reasons: mild winters with in creased rainfall resulting in more mosquitoes; affected dogs traveling with
their owners to areas where heart worms are not normally a problem; in creased awareness of owners which
results in increased testing and results in increased testing and
diagnosis. Heartworm checks and diagnosis. Heartworm checks and
