School Starts Monday, Aug. 17

Cross Plains Schools will begin their 1992-93 classes on Monday, August 17, at 8:10 a.m. Kindergarten through third grade will be dismissed at 2:45 p.m.

Parents should pick up kindergarten through third grade students at the back of the school entering from the south side at the gymnasium and exiting on the north end of the playground. **PLEASE DO NOT ENTER FROM THE NORTH**, as this is a **ONE WAY** system. Remember the speed limit for the back parking space is **5 MILES PER HOUR**, as many children will be loading buses and being picked up after school. Fourth through eighth grades may be picked up in front of the

elementary building.

High school will also observe the 8:10 beginning and dismissal will be at 3:40 p.m.

Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce will be hosting a mixed volleyball tournament Saturday, August 29, during their Cruise Night.

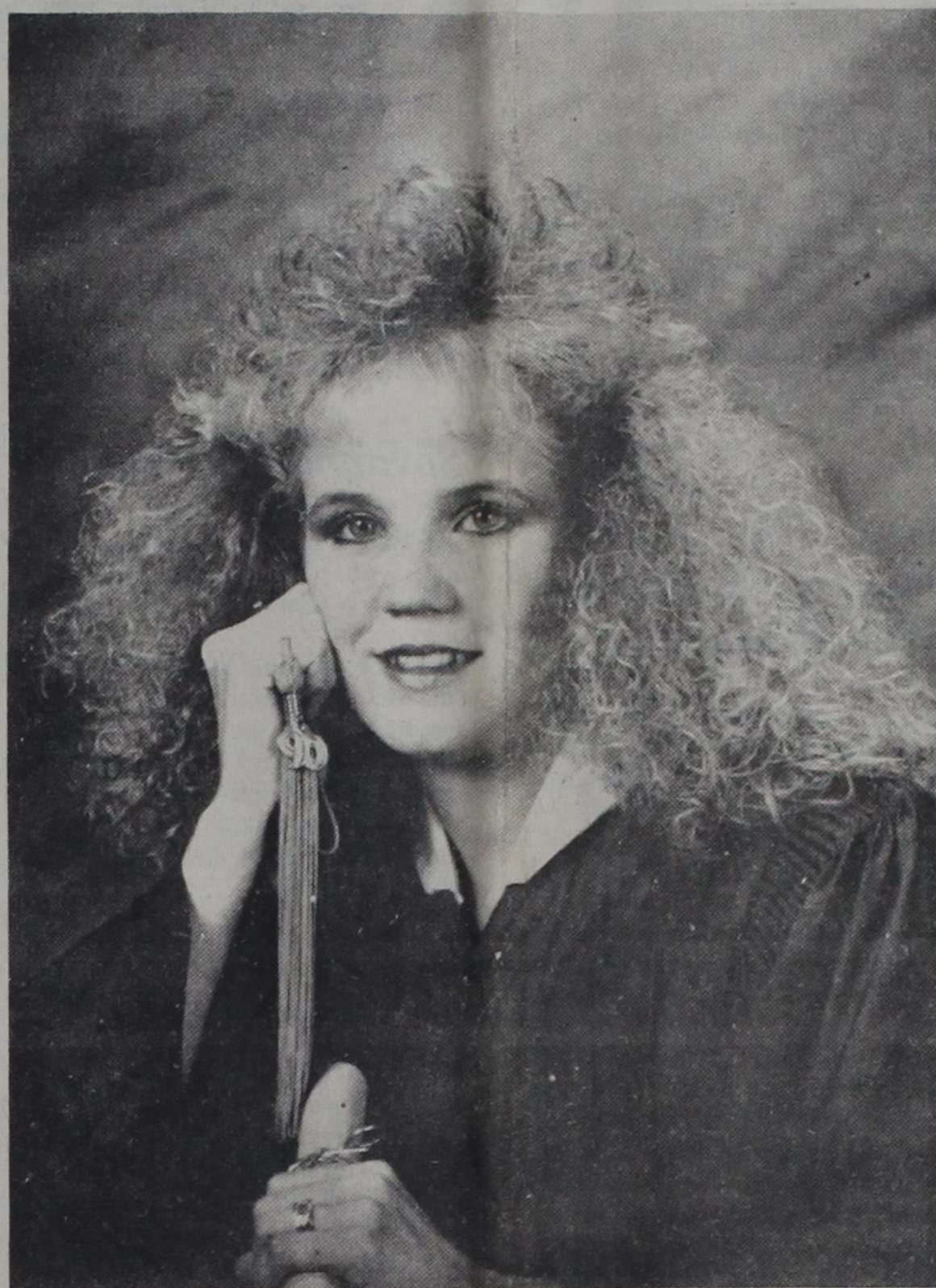

Rains Create Prussic Acid Problems

Recent rain in the area could cause prussic acid problems in Johnson grass or sorghum-sudan pastures, says Greg Gengross, County Extension Agent.

When plants are stressed due to dry hot weather and starts growing again, this usually spells trouble for beef cattle.

Scientists believe prussic acid is a by-product of rapid cell division in young actively growing sorghum or from cell damage after a frost in the fall. Prussic acid is converted in the rumen into a form of cyanide. Sudden death follows.

Poisoning may occur any time but frequently happens 24-48 hours after a rain. Producers grazing sorghum-sudan or Johnson grass field should wait 6-8 days after a rain to turn cattle back in fields. Livestock should be observed for several hours after turning into fields.

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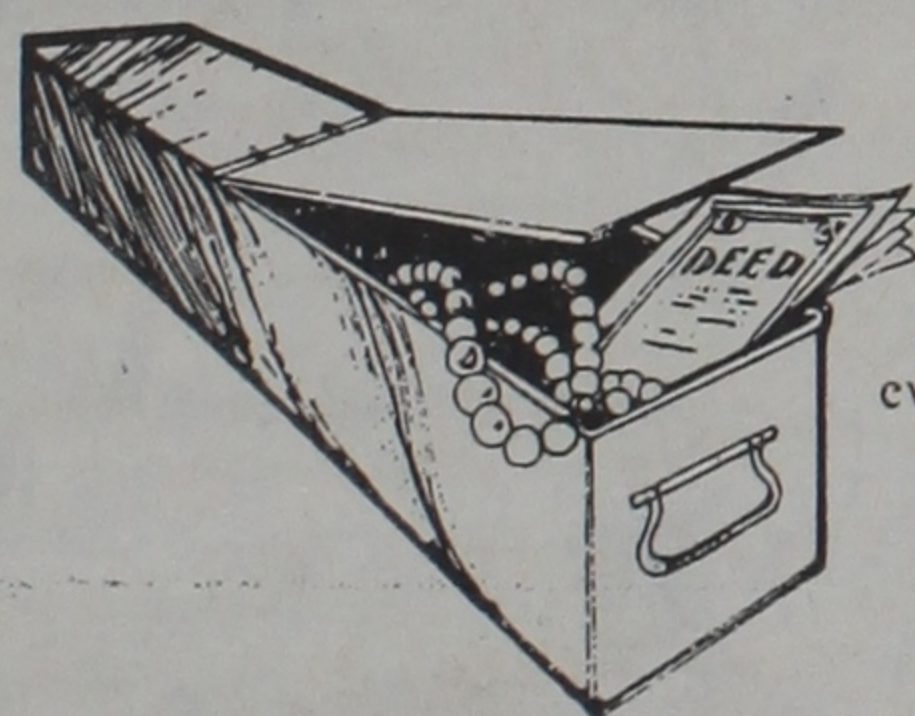

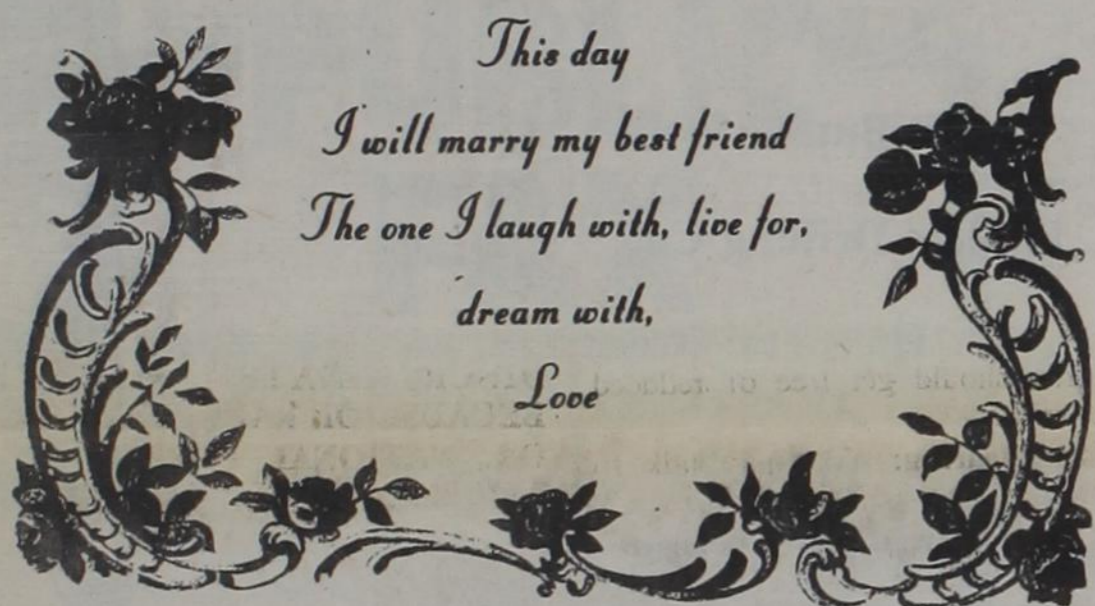

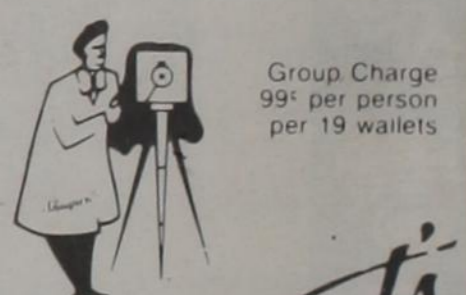

Letter To Households (Multi-Child Meals)

National School Lunch

Program/School Breakfast Program

Parent/Guardian:

The Cross Plains school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for: K-5 \$1.00, 6-12 \$1.25 and breakfast for .50 cents. Children may also get meals free or a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is .40 cents for lunch and .30 cents for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

How To Apply

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that

adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Lee Thompson, (817) 725-6121, P.O. Box 699, Cross Plains, Texas 76443.

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentially: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who

meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOUR HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D.C. 20250.

We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

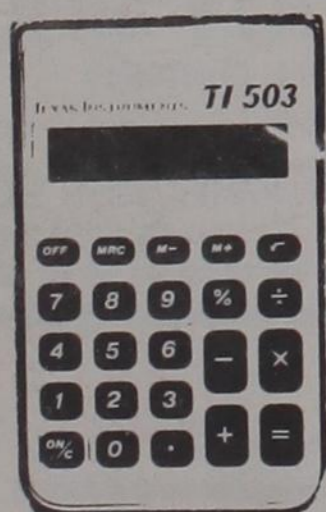

YOUR VOTE COUNTS

There is, perhaps, no act that a citizen can perform in a democracy that is more important—and more basic—than voting. The following examples of close election results in presidential elections demonstrate the significance of an individual vote:

In 1884, the equivalent of less than one vote per precinct in New York State would have elected Republican James G. Blaine president over Democrat Grover Cleveland.

In 1916, Woodrow Wilson was re-elected by carrying one state (California) by less than one percent of the vote.

In 1960, a shift of the equivalent of one vote in every precinct in Illinois would have given Richard Nixon an additional 26 electoral votes, resulting in his defeat of John Kennedy.

The upcoming presidential election is an opportunity for voters to make their voices heard. However, the first step is registering. 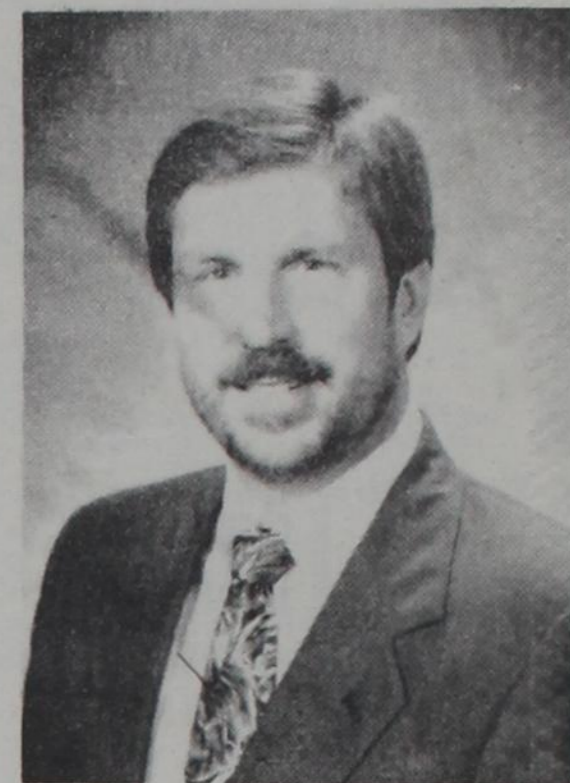

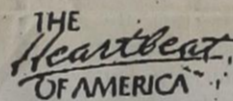
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
