

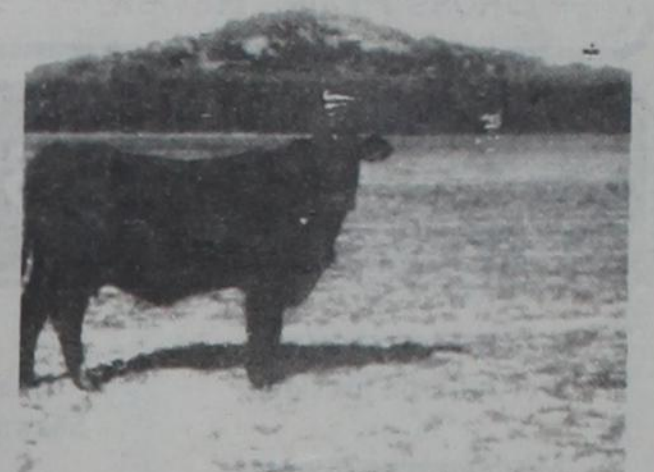

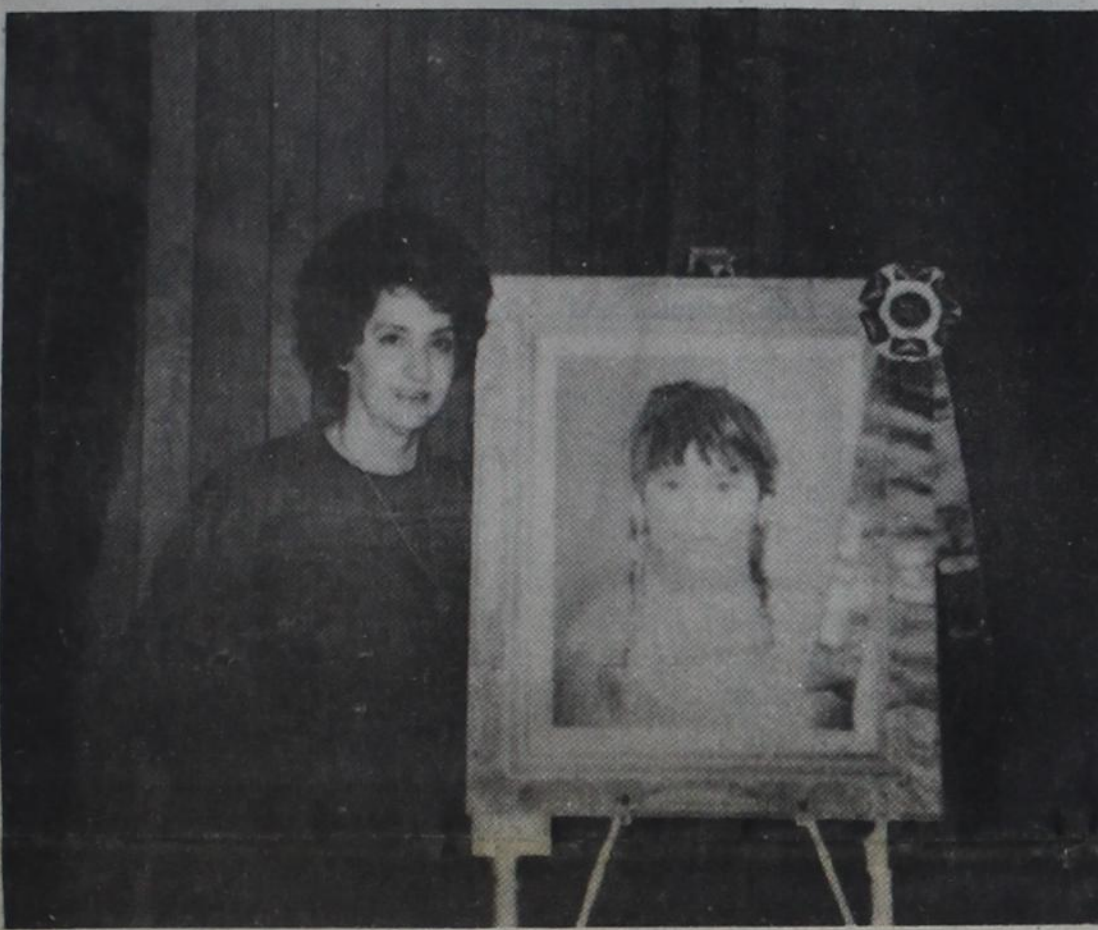

The Cross Plains Paint and Palette Club held their 21st Annual Art Show November 5 and 6 displaying 150 paintings. Martha Kiel, art instructor at Cooper High School, was the judge. County Voters Say No To Some Incumbents

Callahan County voters took a stand against incumbents, picking George Bush over Ann Richards and Phil Boone over Charles Stenholm, after unofficial election returns from the Tuesday, November 8 General Election.

A total of 3,912 votes were cast in Callahan County, including 561 straight Democratic Party ballots and 422 straight ticket ballots for the Republican Party. Another 30 straight ticket ballots were counted for the Libertarian Party.

Callahan County went for newcomer George W. Bush over incumbent Ann Richards for Governor of Texas by a 55% to 42% margin. There were 2,166 votes cast for Bush and Richards received 1,650 votes.

In the race for U.S. Representative, District 17, Callahan County voters picked Republican Phil Boone over incumbent Democrat Charles Stenholm by a 51% to 46 percent margin. Boone, an Abilene businessman, received 2,017 votes to 1,824 for Stenholm, a Stamford farmer.

In the race for U.S. Senator, incumbent Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison led Democratic challenger Richard Fisher 62% to 34%. Hutchison had 2,438 votes

cast in the county and Fisher had 1,364 votes cast.

For the office of Railroad Commissioner, Cross Plains native Democrat Mary Scott Nabers garnered 56% of the vote to 38% for Republican challenger Carole Keeton Rylander. Nabers, daughter of Cross Plains resident Jack Scott, received 2,198 votes to 1,487 votes for Rylander.

For the office of Commissioner of Agriculture, incumbent Republican Rick Perry had 74% of the vote in Callahan County to Democratic challenger Margin Gregory's 22%. Perry, a native of Haskell, had 2,911 votes to Gregory's 867 votes.

For State Senator, District 24, Democrat Bill Sims took 53% of the vote in Callahan County compared to 43% for Republican challenger Hugh Shine.

In the race for 11th Appeals Court Chief Justice, Republican Billy John Edwards led Democrat Bud Arnot 50% to 44% in Callahan County. Edwards had received 1,977 of the votes in the county to 1,729 for Arnot.

All Callahan County local candidates faced no opposition and will take their new oath of office January 1, 1995.

BUFFS HEADED FOR BI-DISTRICT

It's official...the last regular season game for the Cross Plains' Buffaloes is history with the Buffs taking their 5th straight district win, 35-8 and the District title with it. This is a notable year for the Buffs in football since it was 1956 when they won their last district title.

The game, which was called off just after the beginning of the 4th quarter due to extreme (and certainly unexpected) weather conditions, was played in Lometa on Friday, November 4.

The stats for the game are incomplete due to the weather also, and there was no game film to check. Up through what was available, quarterback Brock Walker had 5 carries for 113 yards; Cole Gilliam went 7 for 55; Jimmy Lee was 7 for 72. Matt Reed caught 3 passes for 35 yards and Donnie Dillard had 1 for 32.

Cross Plains' first score came in the 1st quarter on a 68 yard drive capped off by Mike Tollett from 2 yards out for the TD. Porcius Potter's kick was good and the Buffs were on their way.

Another 2 points was added to the score when Lometa had a bad snap deep in their own territory and Cross Plains captured a safety.

With 1:20 left in the first quarter Cross Plains scored again, this time on a 12 yard run by Lee, ending a 61 yard drive. Potter's kick was good again.

In the second quarter, Lometa got on the score board with a TD pass and a successful 2 point conversion, making the score 16-8 Buffs.

Before the first half ended, the Buffs scored again on a 32 yard pass from Walker to Dillard. True to form, Potter's PAT was successful. At the half (still enjoying good weather) the score was 23-8.

At half time the #1 rated Buffalo Band performed for the home crowd and marched off the field just barely in time as the cold front hit instantly. Within minutes everyone was running for cover from the chilling wind-driven rain...but the game played on...

In the 3rd quarter, the Buffs scored again. Walker, on a keeper, had an 81 yard run for the TD...the PAT was unsuccessful though.

Early in the 4th quarter, Lee scored again, this time on a 44 yard run. The 2 point conversion attempt failed and the game was called with a final score of 35-8.

The offensive line consisting of Quatro Davis, Mike McClure, Willie Nickerson, C.J. Parham, Porcius Potter and Matt Reed, did a great job opening up holes for the runners.

With the Buffaloes in sole possession of 1st place, they're scheduled to play the second place team from District 14A, which is Bryson. That Bi-District game is scheduled for Friday, November 11 at Breckenridge beginning at 7:30 p.m. We hope to see all loyal Buffalo fans at the game to support the football team, the cheerleaders, and the band. Friday is "Purple and Gold" day. Wear your school colors and show your support.

The Buffs have worked hard all season with hours of practice, lifting weights and watching game films. The other half of

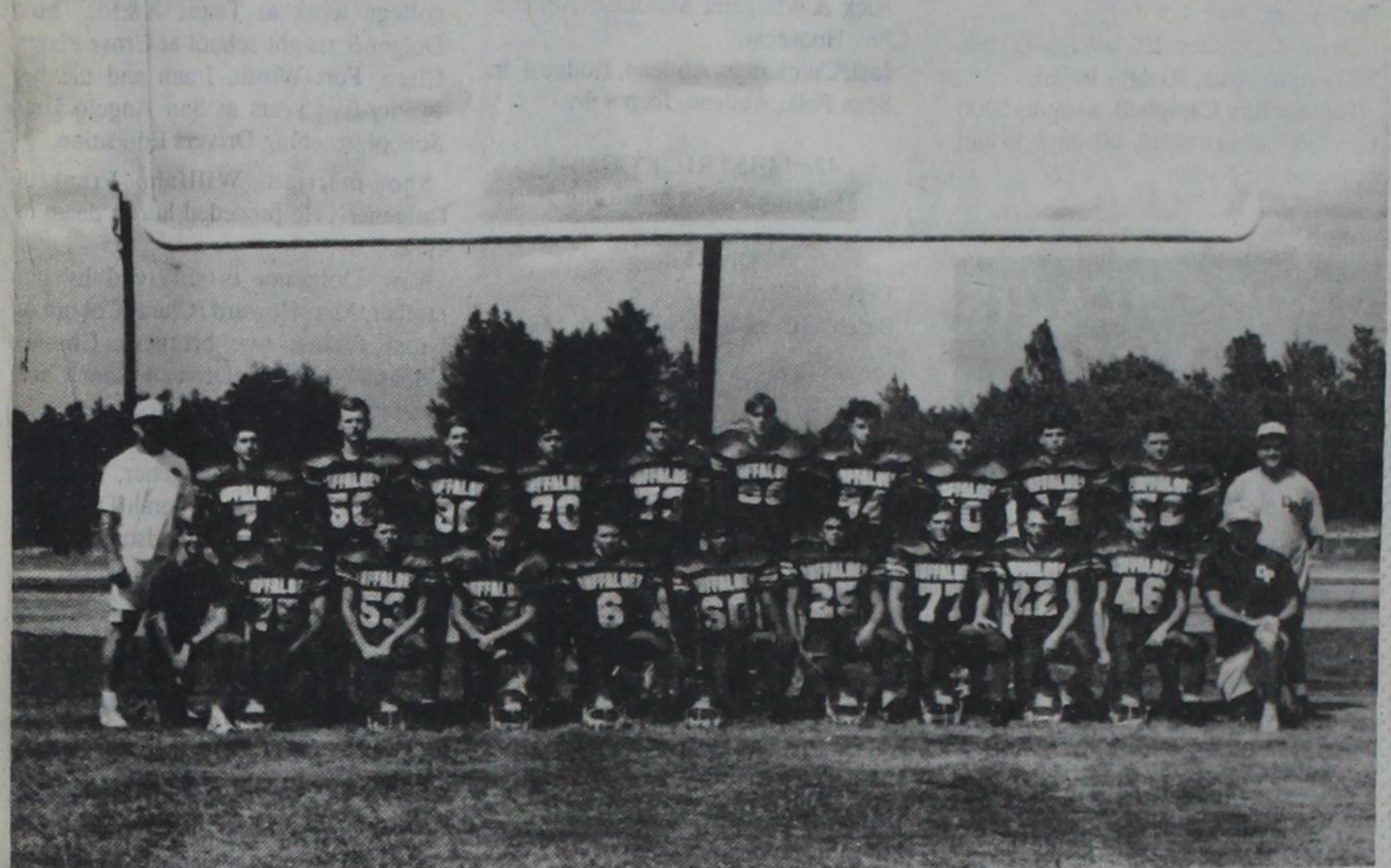
Scouts Food Drive Nov. 12

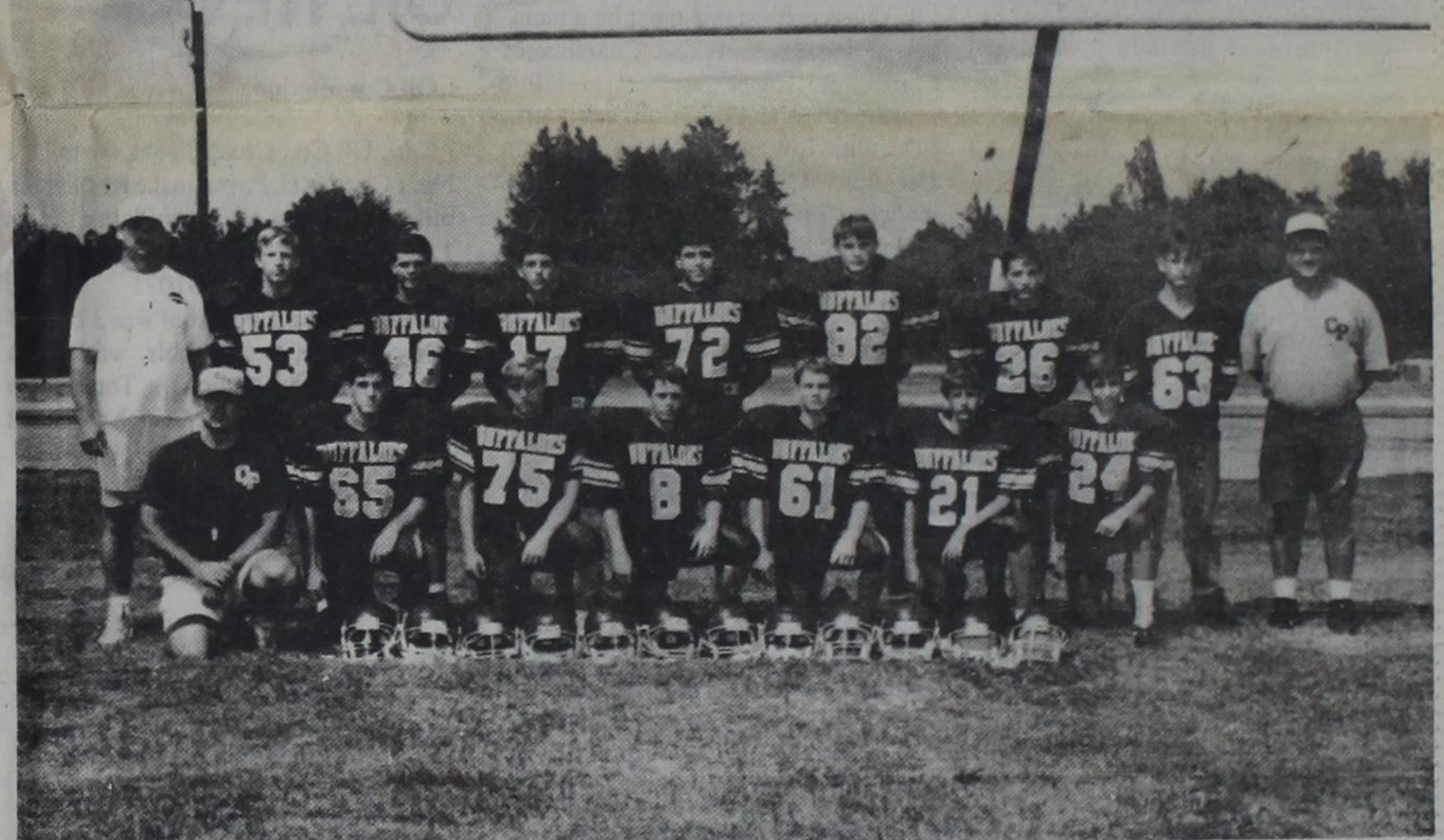

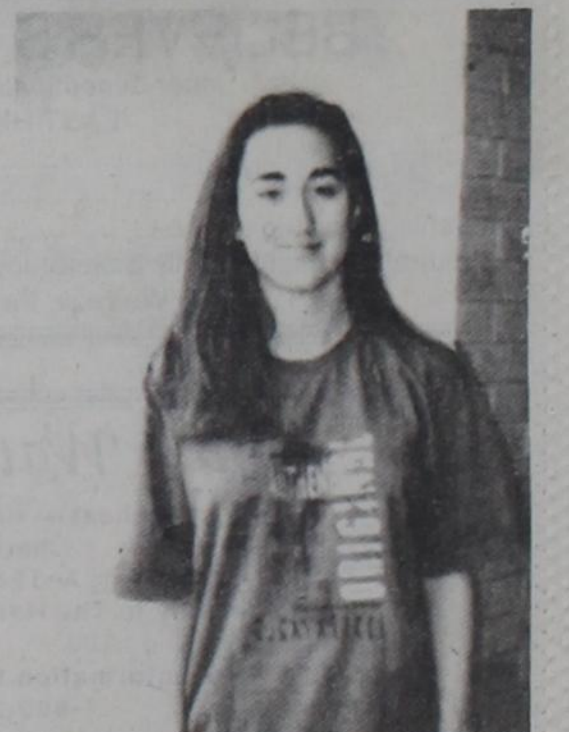
Cross Plains had 3 winners to advance to Regional. The two boys were Jason Carey and Justin Richey. Our girl competitor was Angy Phillips.

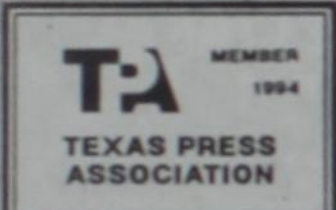



will be allowed to gradually revert to its previous overgrown condition. However, since the fences have been replaced, further damage to the tombstones by grazing cows will be prevented for many years.
