Filings For The March 1994 **Democratic Primary Election**

Both Callahan County Commissioners precinct positions up for election in the March 1994 Democratic Primary Election will be contested, according to Democratic Party County Chairman Jon Hardwick.

Filing for all Callahan County offices up for election in the March Democratic Primary Election began December 3. Three candidates, Bryan Farmer, T.W. "Butch" Woodard and R.C. "Bud" Logan, have all filed for the County Commissioner Precinct #2 seat being vacated by Lowell Johnson.

Johnson, who has served as commissioner of precinct #2 for 24 years, announced recently he would not seek another four year term, but would retire. Farmer, who resides at Rt. 2 Box 118, Clyde, was the first to file for the precinct #2 commissioners seat. Farmer

sided in the state 37 years and in Callahan County 37 years.

Woodard, who is 47 years old, filed for the precinct #2 commissioner seat on December 8.

Woodard, who is an employee of the Callahan County Precinct #2, lists an address of Rt. 2 Box 173, Clyde. He has resided in Texas 47 years and has lived in the county 23 years.

Logan also announced his intention of seeking the commissioner precinct #2 seat on December 8. Logan, who is 59 years old, lists an occupation as a contractor.

Logan has resided in the state 59 years and is a 46 year resident of Callahan County. Logan lists an address of Rt. 2 Box 117-A, Clyde.

The Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #2 and Commissioner Precinct #4 seat are the only contested races so far.


Two candidates have so far filed for the County Commissioners Precinct #4 seat up for election also. They include Kenneth Sowell and H.D. Weaver. Sowell filed December 3 for the Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #4 seat being vacated by retiring commissioner Joe Ingram of Cross Plains. Sowell, who is 47 years old, resides at FM 880 in Cross Plains. He has lived in Texas 47 years and in Callahan County 21 years. Sowell lists an occupation as a farmer/rancher.

The offices up for election in the March Democratic Primary include: county judge, county treasurer, county clerk, 42nd District Court clerk, commissioner precinct #2, commissioner precinct #4 and all three justice of the peace precincts in the county. There is a filing fee to seek one of those offices, according to Hardwick. He said the fee is based upon the office the candidate seeks.

Hardwick added the office of County Democratic Party Chairman and the precinct chairman positions are also up for election in March 1994. He said no filing fee will be charged candidates who seek one of the chairperson positions.
