Barrett Scott Cheshier, age 16, of Cross Plains, passed away Sunday morning, January 16, 1994, in a rural Callahan County automobile accident. Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday in the First United Methodist Church of Cross Plains. Rev. Don Roath, Principal Jerry Boyd, and Coach Bill Boyd officiated. The Cross Plains High School Choir, under the direction of Bruce Morgan, and Jan Duke performed the special music. Burial was at 4:00 p.m. in Nocona Cemetery, Nocona, Texas.



# OBITUARY

## Zora DeBusk

People from Burkett, Cross Plains and surrounding countrysides thronged Higginbotham Funeral Chapel far beyond capacity here Tuesday afternoon of last week as they said final good-byes to Mrs. Jack DeBusk, 82, who died unexpectedly two days earlier in a Coleman hospital. Zora V., as she was affectionately known, was a lifelong resident of this area. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Oscar McDermett, whose families settled here before the turn of the century. With her four sisters, Zora V. attended area schools, graduating from Cross Plains High School with the class of 1929. On August 11, 1932 she and Jack DeBusk were married and began farming in the Burkett vicinity. They reared one son, J. Pat, who heads a large industrial servicing corporation with plants in 18 cities along the coastlines of Texas and Louisiana. Other survivors include Pat's wife, Suanna, and their two children, Andrew DeBusk and a daughter Mrs. Mark (Amy) Gillespie both of Houston; as well as three sisters, Mrs. Rita Knight of Cross Plains, Mrs. Susan Andes of Coleman and Mrs. Frances McAnally of

The funeral was conducted by Pastor Don J. Roath of the Cross Plains and Burkett United Methodist congregations. Burial was in the picturesque, little cemetery alongside State Highway 206 in the eastern edge of Burkett. In addition to a large floral tribute, memorials were contributed to the Burkett church of which Jack and Zora V. were among the oldest members.

In the funeral eulogy the Rev. Roath characterized the deceased as a lady whose life had been meaningful to her church, community and both family and friends. The minister stressed that it was a time for rejoicing in celebration of a life

# GARDEN TIPS FROM THE 及 Cross Plains Garden Club データー 発動 発 多 変

FOR JANUARY

Since this is the dormant season of the year, it is a good time to get gardening equipment checked, cleaned, and if need be, repaired before spring preparation and planting time arrives.

Tillers, mowers, planter, weed-eaters, chain saws, etc. should be either drained or run until dry of gasoline. Drain oil and install new filters, but tag it with a notation to replenish it before starting a dry engine.

Sharpen blades, and replace, broken, checked or stretched belts.

It is also a good time to evaluate equipment to determine if each piece is salvageable or advisable to be replaced while year-end sales are going on.

It will soon be time for preparing soil for planting English peas, onions and other really early crops.

It is never too late to get the compost pile underway. Mulched leaves layered with top soil from the garden, kept moist and as warm as possible all winter long, then returned to the garden, and tilled in returns natural fertilizer to the soil, also humus. Compost is also useful as mulching between the rows to retain moisture and discourage weeds.

This is a good time to have your garden soil tested. Your County Extension Office can furnish the information for sending the samples to the Soil Testing Lab at Texas A & M University. A small charge for the testing will be returned several-fold in money saved on fertilizers and improved plant development. The test show if fertilizer is or is not needed and the best types for the soil.

Dry plantings are more susceptible to damage from extreme temperatures. A good watering of trees and shrubs in the dry winter months is recommended.

Plants in large pots, whether pansies or other cool-season annual plants will give up 15 to 20 degrees worth of winter hardiness when grown outdoors. Because their root balls are completely exposed they suffer severe freeze damage with temperatures below 25 degrees. Be prepared to put them in the garage for a few nights.

It is a good idea to have equipment in the repair shop now rather than waiting until needed in the spring when the service can take much longer.

Someone described a tactless person as "one who says what everybody else is thinking." While there may be some merit to "telling it like it is," many times silence is indeed "golden"! And whether you call it tact or just good sense, a lot of thoughts would be better kept as such - and not expressed.

We've taken the great need to communicate way too far when we get to the point of speaking what's on our mind, regardless - without qualifications or limitation. There is great wisdom in knowing when to speak and what to say. There is also great wisdom in knowing when not to say! Dale Carnegie could condense his course on "how to win friends and influence people" to a Proverb or two - like "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh one stirs up anger," Proverbs 15:1. Someone put it this way: "Don't give your tongue too much liberty lest it take you prisoner!"

## To Exercise Loan Approval To Full County Limit

TEMPLE — "Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year," George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal Regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis said.


This action means that FmHA Supervisors at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers, and I intend to pursue this type of change in the future, wherever I can," said Ellis.

FmHA County Supervisors were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and re-reviews of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to insure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from County to County.

"I still intend to hold FmHA Supervisors to the same high standards as in the past, however, I am also dedicated to streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds available to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.





# **VETERANS NEWS**

New rates for Dependency & Indemnity Compensation (DIC)

Effective January 1, 1993, major provisions of HR 5008, DIC Reform Act of 1992, went into effect. New rates effective December 1, 1993 are:

1. Payments of the Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) will be made to all surviving spouses at a base monthly rate of \$769 per month.

2. Surviving spouses of Veterans rated totally disabled as a result of their service-connected disabilities for a continuous period of at least eight preceding death will receive an additional \$169 per month.

3. Surviving spouses of Veterans who died before January 1, 1993, will be paid DIC under the old system or the new formula, whichever would provide greater benefits.

4. The additional amount of DIC payable for each dependent child will be increased to \$100 monthly, effective January 1, 1993; to \$150 per month, effective October 1, 1993; and \$200 per month, effective October 1, 1994.




