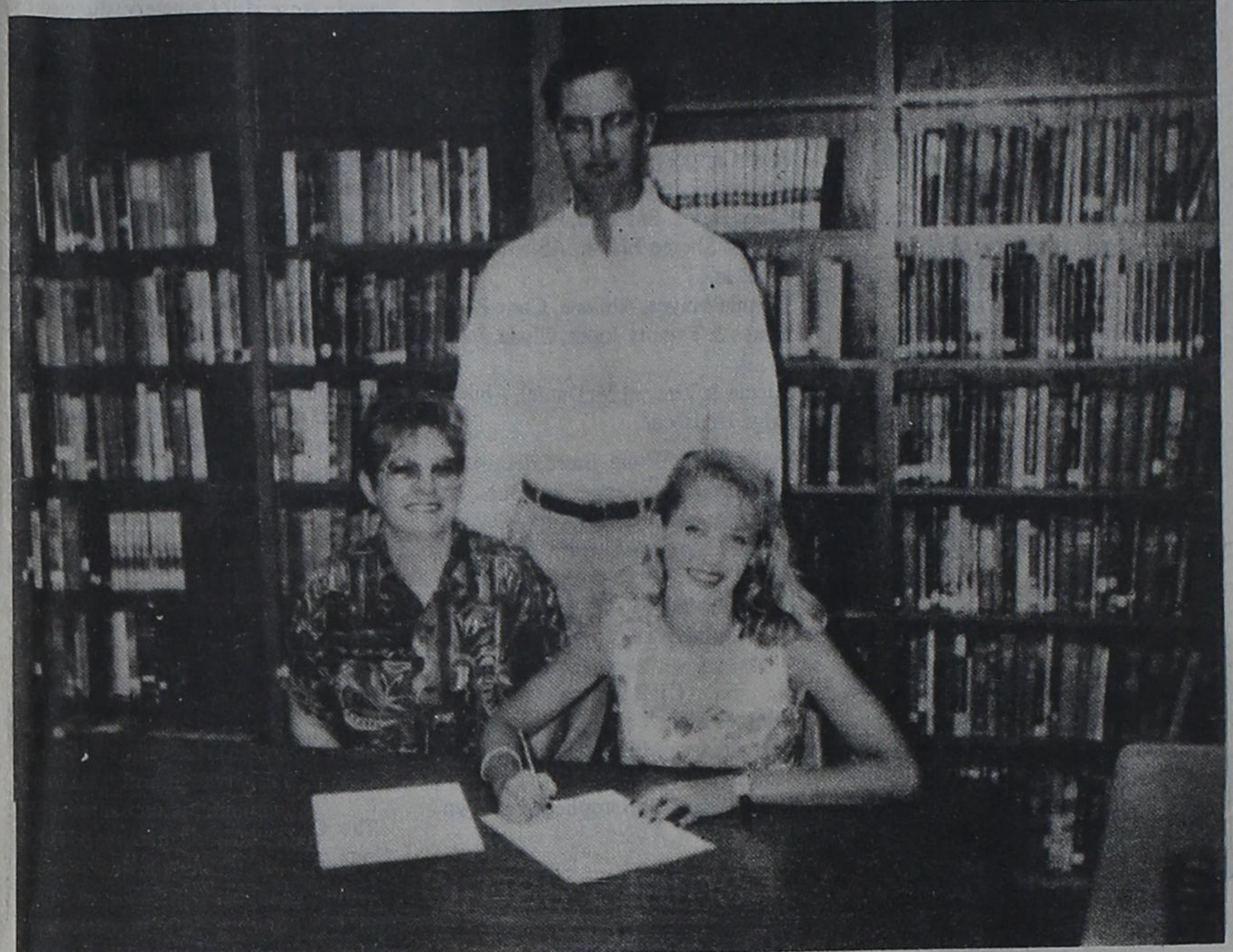

Time To Pre-Register Kindergarteners

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1994, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students.

Kindergarten screening will be conducted Wednesday, May 4, at Cross Plains Elementary School. Please call the Elementary Principal's office at 725-6123 to make an appointment for your child. The screening will take about sixty minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: three in a series of DTP and/or a booster after age 4, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and rubella. Please bring the birth certificate, immunization record, and social security number at the time of registering.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The early childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the elementary school office during Kindergarten registration.

Girl Scout Camp

The Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council is gearing up for its summer resident camp.

This year, 1994, marks the 38th year of operation for Camp Wood Lake which is located inside the State Park at Lake Brownwood. The camp has grown from one unit in 1956 to its present size of five units, a central dining hall, a health center, an activity building and a swimming pool. Each unit has bath facilities, sleeping spaces (either tents or cabins), and a unit building.

Bettie Cavanaugh is the Program Services Director for Heart of Texas Council, as well as the director of the resident camp program. Mrs. Cavanaugh says that "the open house is being held to give girls and their parents a chance to visit the campsite prior to attending camp. Some parents are unsure of sending their daughter to camp for the first time until they actually visit the facilities. It also helps girls to visit prior to their stay at camp. After the open house, I'm sure all 'fears' will be allayed."

Camping, of course, is a key element of the Girl Scout program. At resident camp, girls live and play in the out of doors for a period of time ranging from an overnight stay to 12 days.

Special overnight sessions have been scheduled for Girl Scouts between Kindergarten and fifth grades who have never been to camp. The girls attend these weekend programs with their mothers. A new addition this year is a two-day session designed for Girl Scouts of any age to attend with their fathers. These weekend sessions can be a great opportunity for parents to make very special memories for themselves and their daughters.

There will be seven programs held this summer for a period of three days and nights. The remaining sessions being offered are either 5- or 12-day stays at Camp Wood Lake. The price of camp ranges from \$30 for a parent/daughter overnight to \$240 for a 12-day session. A camp brochure with a complete listing of all sessions, requirements and costs can be obtained from the council office at 700 East Baker, Brownwood, TX 76801 or by calling the office at 915-646-1516.

"Girls who attend camp can choose from a very wide range of activities," Cavanaugh said. "Programs included in this year's line-up are sessions on bicycling, cheerleading, dinosaurs, games, campcrafts, and many other subjects. A couple of sessions for the older girls include trips to the Guadalupe and Davis Mountains. In short, we offer something for just about everyone."

Every girl has the opportunity to attend the resident camp program -- even girls who are not currently registered as Girl Scouts. The council strives to keep the price of camp to a minimum so the cost will not prohibit a girl from attending. Many girls sold enough cookies in the recent cookie sale to earn their camp fee. A campership can be obtained by Girl Scouts who cannot afford to come to camp. (Of course, donations are always accepted by the council for the campership fund.)

Girls do not have to travel far to find special fun at summer camp. Camp Wood Lake is just down the road, waiting for all girls who want to play, sing, swim, learn new things and make memories and friends that will last a lifetime.

Update On Coleman County Water Supply Corp.

The Coleman County Water Supply Corporation is in the process of acquiring bids for the phase 6 expansion to their system. The proposed 3.2 million dollar project will extend lines to the town or Burkett, East and South of Santa Anna, the Lake Ivie area and numerous other areas in the county, as well as small portions of Runnels, Taylor, Callahan, and Brown Counties.

The project includes 211 miles of pipeline. 465 meters, 2-100,000 gallon storage tanks, 2 pump stations and major renovations to several existing pump stations.

Shots Across Texas Kickoff

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Health (TDH) today formally kicked off what state officials are calling the largest immunization campaign in Texas history.

Shots Across Texas, a comprehensive campaign to raise the immunization rates of Texans age 2 and younger, was unveiled at a press conference that brought together state health officials, political leaders and volunteers. The goal of Shots Across Texas is to immunize at least 90 percent of Texas children age 2 and younger by 1996.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, said the need for Shots Across Texas is critical. "Currently, fewer than 60 percent of Texas children younger than 2 are fully immunized," Dr. Smith explained. "Texas ranks among the last in the United States and is behind many developing nations in providing immunizations against polio, measles and diphtheria for our children."

"The problem isn't that the resources aren't available. It's that many people are unaware of how important it is to immunize their children. That's why Shots Across Texas is so critically needed."

Sponsored by TDH, Shots Across Texas also is supported by Texas Medical Association (TMA), Texas Medical Association Alliance (TMAA), a number of other organizations and about 260 local coalitions throughout the state.

In addition to billboard and public service announcements, Shots Across Texas will include hundreds of immunization clinics and other activities organized by the local coalitions.

Public service air time has been secured from more than 85 television stations and 220 radio stations in the state. Outdoor companies are putting up billboards in 39 locales, and state and regional health officials are meeting with editorial boards and other journalists to communicate the importance of immunizing children age 2 and under.

According to recent surveys, many Texas parents are unaware of the risks associated with immunization-preventable disease, including brain damage and even death. A recent Houston study revealed that, while four out of five parents said their children were fully immunized, medical records

indicated fewer than half that number actually were.

Last year, the Texas Legislature passed a law requiring the age-appropriate immunization of Texas children regardless of their families' ability to pay.

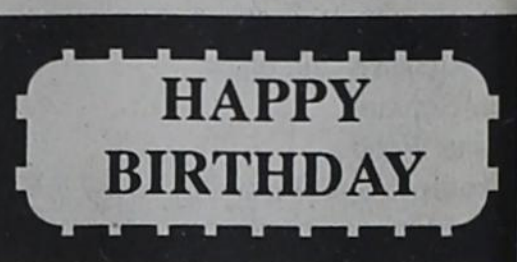

Mother Credits Baby Sitter's Quick Thinking With Saving Daughter's Life

At noon on Friday, the dispatch radio in emergency medical technician Carie Clinard's ambulance cracked with a distress call, as it does dozens of times every day.

A baby was choking to death.

But this time, it was her baby.

And this time, there was a happy ending.

A segment of an orange had lodged in the throat of 2-year-old Cierra Clinard at her baby sitter's house at 849 S. Union Blvd. Four miles away, Clinard heard the call and knew the address.

"It was my worst nightmare," Clinard said. "Listening to the call going down and realizing it was my daughter."

The baby sitter, 29-year-old Eileen Rodriguez, reacted quickly. She picked up the child, who was not breathing, and began striking her on the back. When the orange was not dislodged, she began squeezing the girl's abdomen. Within seconds, Cierra was crying — and breathing.

Moments later a medical crew from the Fire Department arrived. And right behind them were Clinard and her partner AMR Ambulance Co. Cierra was checked by Fire Department paramedics and her mother and taken to Penrod Community Hospital. She was checked there by doctors and released.

The girl had fallen asleep on Rodriguez's couch for her afternoon nap. A piece of the orange she was eating was apparently still in her mouth. Within minutes, Rodriguez — who was sitting beside the child on the couch — heard a gasp.

"She turned and looked at me and her little face was all blue and purple," Rodriguez said. "She tried to call my name, but she couldn't. It was so frightening."

Almost immediately, she said, she began lifesaving techniques that averted a tragedy — techniques taught her by Cierra's mother.

"We all know what could have happened if she hadn't acted so quickly," Clinard said. "Cierra could have died."

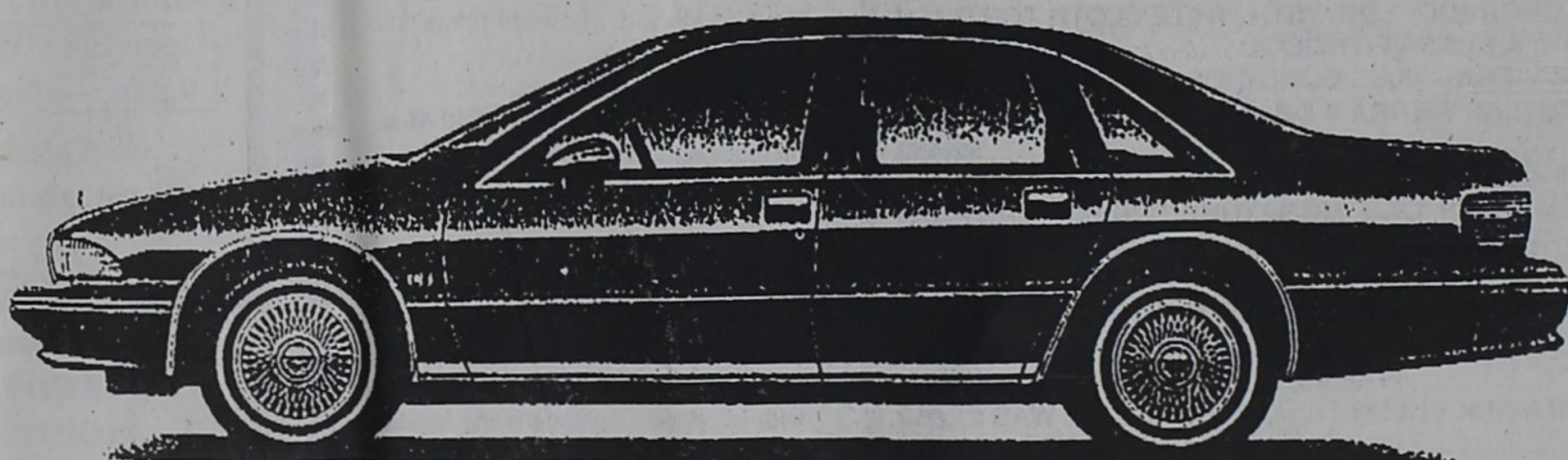
