Plane Crash Claims Kathy (Jones) Preston

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA-HOMA—The following is a statement from Vice President and General Manager William J. Katsafanas of KFOR-TV.

T.A.B.C. **Promotes Sting Operation**

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission is promoting a reverse sting operation designed to catch youthful offenders in the act of purchasing alcohol.

The program is called "Cops in Shops" In the sting operation, T.A.B.C. agents or police officers pose as clerks at convenience stores. Another agent waits outside in radio communication with the "clerk". When a minor purchases or attempts to purchase an alcoholic beverage, the youth is stopped by the agent outside and charged with the alcohol of-

Retail outlets participating in the program have a bright orange sign posted in their window. It reads, "Under 21 Warning! Police Officer may be posing as an employee."

During spring break, in the Brownsville and corpus Christi areas, the sting opcration resulted in 438 charges being filed. 242 charges were filed for possession/consumption of alcohol, 65 for making alcohol available to minors, 77 for attempted purchases of alcohol, and 54 for other related offenses.

The Texas Legislature made simple attempt to purchase alcohol an offense during the last legislative session.

Also participating in the promotion of the program is the Texas Department of Transportation.

DPS Offers Recruit Training

The Texas Department of Public Safety is accepting applications for out-of-state applicants until July 15, 1994 and applications for in-state applicants until August 19, 1994 for its December 1994 recruit school.

Following twenty three (23) weeks of intensive training, successful applicants will be commissioned as state troopers for the Texas Department of Public Safety, charged with enforcing traffic laws on rural Texas highways. Troopers investigate accidents, recover stolen vehicles and other property, seize illegal drugs, apprehend wanted persons and perform a variety of other law enforcement duties.

After four (4) years with the DPS, troopers will be able to compete for promotions within the Traffic Law Enforcement Division, which includes services such as Driver License, Safety Education, License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Promotional opportunities eventually will be available in other DPS areas, such as Criminal Law Enforcement Division-Narcotics, Polygraph, Criminal Intelligence, and Motor Vehicle Theft Services-and the Texas Ranger Division.

Following graduation, troopers will be paid \$1,983 per month, with a raise every six (6) months for the first year. Commissioned officers also receive hazardous duty pay and monthly allowances for meals, uniform cleaning and footwear. Uniforms and equipment are furnished by the Department.

Low Income Medicare **Beneficiaries May Qualify For Help With Payments**

"Recently announced changes in the national poverty guidelines could result in more low-income Medicare beneficiaries receiving help to pay for Medicare expenses, such as the Medicare premiums, deductibles, and coinsurance payments" said Glyn Hammons, Social Sccurity manager in Abilene. The rules vary from state to state, but in general, an individual can qualify if his or her income is near the national poverty level of \$7,600 annually (the equivalent of \$633 per month). A family of two qualifies if their income is near \$10,080 annually (\$840 per month). "Even people whose income is slightly above these limits may qualify for limited help," Hammons said.

Hammons also said the "resources" such as bank accounts and stocks are another qualifying factor. They cannot exceed \$4,000 for one person or \$6,000 for a family of two. "Generally, re-

sources are the things you own," Hammons explained. "But not everything is counted. For example, we don't count the value of the house you live in and we usually don't count the value of your car."

"Only your state can decide if you're eligible for this kind of help," said Hammons. So, if you're a Medicare beneficiary with a low income and very limited assets, contact your state or local welfare or social service agency to apply. Hammons explained another way this program helps. "If you're 65 or older with low income and very limited assets," Hammons said, "and you don't qualify for premium-free Part A Medicare because you're not eligible for Social Security, Texas may be able to pay your Part A premiums."




