County Considering Purchase Of Scanner Vote Counting Machine

meeting, will meet with Hart Graphics company officials from Austin to inspect an optical scanner capable of counting up to 5,000 ballots an hour. During the last presidential election, 4,800 registered county voters cast balThe action is being considered by the county after the latest Democratic Party Primary election last March demontem. Votes from all seven voting loca-
tions in the county were not counted
until $2: 00$ a.m. during the Tuesday March 8 primary election.

County Judge Bill Johnson said commissioners are looking into purchasing Hart Graphics. The county judge stated commissioners would probably purchase the machine with general funds from the county, instead of going through a lease/purchase agreement rough the company.
The judge said Hart officials will demonstrate the machine to county commissioners during the regular com-
missioners' court meeting Monday April 25 at the courthouse in Baird.

Judge Johnson said if commissioners decided to purchase the vote counting equipment, county voters would not make many changes in the way they currenly vote. He said the only change would be in the size of the ballot would be somewhat narrow, that all ballots must be marked with a \#2 pencil and the ballot must not be folded before being
placed into the locked voting box placed into the locked voting box.

He said if the vote counting system is used, the number of voting clerks would probably decrease after the system goes on line.
Judge Johnson said one problem the county is now having in holding elections, is finding help to count the ballots. He said if the vote scanner is purchase, the voles would not be counted until the polls close.
Johnson said he's also concemed with the accuracy of counting the votes by rate, according to company officils.
The judge went on to say that city and school officials could also use the optical vote counting system when hold bond or council elections for a minimal bond or co
fee.
Judge Johnson said county commissioners will probably purchase the equipment, but "they don't want to buy il until they see it work.
He said if the commissioners agree to purchase the equipment, company rep resentatives will come to Callahan County two would use the vote counting machine. After that, someone would be available by telephone in case question needed to be answered. tant scratch and pick three games of the Texas Lottery. The state lottery began may 29, 1993 with the instant scratch games.
Levine said as of March 26, there are 11 lottery retail oulets in the county-
cight of which have on-line tie-in with he state's computer in Austin, capable f selling lotto tickets, and three instant scratch-off game retail outles. scratch-of game relail outlets.
Clyde's Thrifty's Food Mart is th largest lottery selling outlet in the county, selling one in every four tickets sold in the county. Levine said that Thrifty's has sold \$ $\$ 19,639$ worth of lottery tickets since sales began almos wo years ago. Thrifty's, which is located on the north access of $1-20$ and Cherry Lane, was the first retail outle Clyde to offer on-line lottery sales.
Other on-line lotiery outels in Cly Other on-line lottery outets in Clyd
include: Allsup's Convenience Store include: Allsup's Convenience Sore,
Skinny's Convenience Store and Lawrence Brothers IGA. All four loutery outets in Clyde are located on Interstate

The county's second largest seller of outcry chances is the Lakeway Grocery Store in Cross Plains. Levine said thal akeway has sold $\$ 378,860$ worth of lottery tickets in almost two years. The Allsup's Convenience Slore in waird is the third largest lottery outle, years.

With moisture so critically short, it is necessary to be selective in the use of the available water. Decisions must be made about the most important vegetation to receive irrigation around the home. Will it be the lawn, shrubs, flowers or vegetable garden? The advantages of mulching and the advisability of using vegetation native to this area is becoming

## evident.

It may not be too late in the season to try something new, but very old. We are
always interested in the new slections, but just because it is a recent introduction does not always guarantee it will perform better than its older counterpart. One of our oldest and finest timeproven shrubs for consideration is an antique rose. For centuries roses have been our most popular flower. While we still watch for the latest All America Rose Selections winners we are also focused
on other varieties that may be 100 to 200 years old or older. They bring greater vigor and stamina, and many are even more fragrant. They are best used as freestanding shrubs.Consider old-fashioned nandiva. There are several new types that stay shorter and fuller, the old species, Nandiva domestica, or heavenly bamboo, is a long time performer here. It
grows to four or five feet tall and wide, grows to four or five feet tall and wide,
butitcan be keptshorter by remaining the tallest one-third of its canes just an inch above the ground, late every winter. Glossy abelia is another old shrub that deserves attention. It grows to five or six
feet tall and wide but it stays full and dense. Its leaves are almost evergreen and its small white bell shaped flowers are produced all summer long, Use
abelias as screening shrubs in a sunny abelias as screening shrubs in a sunny location away from your house where The real original upright type of Burford holly is an outstanding landscaping shrub. It can be used as a tall screen or allowed to grow individually
into its symmetrical oval form. It may attain heights of eight to ten feet and widths of six feet.
