





Jack's Place **Announces** Change In Hours



Randall C. Jackson Sr., 75, who practiced law in Baird and Abilene from 1947-84 and co-founded the Jackson Bros. and Son Hereford operation in 1955 died Saturday, June 25, 1994, in San Antonio.

Graveside services were held at 3:30 p.m. Monday in Elmwood Memorial Park with members of Abilene Masonic Lodge No. 559 officiating, directed by Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, 542 Hickory.

Mr. Jackson was born in Baird where he graduated from high school. He then served with the U.S. Army Air Corps on Guam before receiving his law degree from the University of Texas in 1946. One year later, he was admitted into the Texas Bar Association and opened up an attorney's office in Baird.

Eight years after starting work as a Baird lawyer, he and his brother, J. Rupert Jackson Jr., established the family livestock operation on land their grandfather purchased in 1889 south of town. Jackson's expertise in Hereford breeding was known statewide for many years as he was elected president of the Texas Hereford Association in 1982. He also served as a director of the West Texas Hereford Association, Concho Hereford Association and Sweetwater Hereford Association.

He moved his law practice to Abilene in 1962 where he worked for 22 more years until retiring.

From the cattleyard to the courtroom, he was a respected man. Jackson served as a director of both the Baird First National Bank and Bank of Commerce in Abilenc, and as a past president of Abilene Boys Ranch and Scars Retirement Home in Abilene. He was a past member of the Texas Securities Commission, a fellow in the American College of Probate Council, and past chairman of the board of regents at Texas Women's University in Denton. In addition, his credits included being a member of the American Bar Association and serving on the State Democratic Executive Committee. He was a past commander of the Baird American Legion Post, a 32nd-degree Mason and member of both Scottish Rite and St. Paul United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Betty Jackson of San Antonio; one son, Randall Jackson Jr. of San Antonio; and numerous cousins.





Have you ever heard the story about "The Hole in the Fence"? A little boy wanted his daddy to tell him a bedtime story so his dad told him about a certain shepherd who had some very young sheep - lambs. One was especially curious and while nosing around the fence one day, looking for greener grass, it noticed a small hole in the fence — and proceeded to squeeze-through it. As it was playing and scampering about in its new found freedom a wolf appeared and began chasing the lamb. In its attempt to evade the wolf, the lamb became lost. The shepherd found the lamb in time, however, and snatching the lamb up into his arms, returned it to safety behind the fence.

Having told the story, and expecting it to suffice to lull the boy to sleep, the father was quite surprised at the question his son quickly asked: "Daddy, did the shepherd fix the hole in the fence?"

JULY 4th HOLIDAY - Your County Veterans Office will be closed on Monday, July 4th in observance of our Nation's Independence Day. Here's wishing you a very safe and happy holiday! Be sure to fly your American

GUINEA PIG VETERANS -Participants in government research involving radioactive isotopes between 1947 and 1979 are being sought by the Department of Energy. The government wants to know if there were any ill effects from the experiments as followup records were not kept.

According to Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary, as many as 800 people may have participated in radioisotope tests conducted by V A and university research labs.

V A officials claim there has been a great deal of confusion over the issue, especially from Veterans who were involved in atomic bomb tests. The radioisotope experiments are unrelated to atomic bomb tests, V A says.

V A Secretary Jesse Brown has directed all V A hospitals to search records for data on radioisotope or radiation research between 1947 and

Veterans who think they were tested should call the Department of Energy hot line (800) 493-2998 weekdays between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. EST. NATIONAL CEMETERY MEASURE - On May 4th, President

Clinton signed PL 103-240, which will extend eligibility for burial in national cemeteries to retired members of the Reserve Component who have served 20 years or more of creditable service in the Armed Services. The spouses and minor children of those members would also qualify for the privilege.

Prior to the signing of PL 103-240, only active-duty military personnel and reserve members who died (under honorable conditions) while on active or inactive duty were eligible for burial in national cemeteries.

H.R. 821 or the "Burial Bill" is, according to sponsor Congressman Henry Bonilla of Texas, "a fitting tribute to the thousands of men and women who have served their country as members of the Reserve Component-these dedicated people finally will be eligible for burial in a national cemetery."

The Department of Veterans Affairs, which administers the nation's 114 Veterans Cemeteries opposed the bill. The V A expressed concern that expanding eligibility would greatly increase maintenance cost of the

Applications Available For Special **Enrollment** Examination

The exam helps qualify tax practitioners, other than attorneys and Certified Public Accountants, to represent their clients before the IRS for audits and related tax matters. Practitioners must have their completed applications postmarked no later than August 1.

Applicants have four years to pass all four parts of the two-day exam, provided certain conditions are met. The examination fee is \$55. The fee is \$45 for those who are required to take less than all four parts. Last year 9,000 persons applied to take the examination.



Get Higher Benefits At Age 65

If you're receiving Social Security benefits because you're a widow (or widower), you may be eligible for a higher benefit when you reach age 65. This could be possible if you have been employed and, therefore, are entitled to benefits based on your own work record. Ordinarily, you cannot change from a reduced benefit to a full benefit, but that does not apply if you're a widow or

As a widow(er) who is entitled to retirement benefits on your own earnings, you can take reduced benefits at age 62 and receive a full widow's(er) benefit at 65. Or, you can take your widow's (er) benefit at 62 and get your full retirement payment at 65.

Here's an example of how this works: Rebecca Litchfield, a widow, visited her Social Security office just before her 62nd birthday and learned she had some choices to make. Her full (age 65) widow's benefit would be \$880, but she could take a reduced widow's benefit of about \$660 at age 62. Because she had worked, she also was due a full (age 65) retirement benefit of \$600 with a reduced benefit of \$480 payable at age 62. These are her choices: (1) She could take a reduced widow's benefit of \$660 at age; 62. That would remain her benefit forever (except for annual cost-of-living increases); or (2) she could take the smaller retirement of \$480 at 62 and switch to her full widow's rate (\$800) at

Rebecca has to ask herself these questions: Can she live on the smaller income (\$480) for three years in anticipation of the higher benefit (\$800) at 65? Or would she rather get something in between (\$660) right away with no option of switching later to a higher benefit? Rebecca can get some help in making her decision by talking with a Social Security representative, who will further explain her options.

If you too are faced with making a decision on which benefit to take, we suggest you talk to a Social Security representative about the options that are available to you.
