The Cross Plains varsity Buffaloes put it all together last Friday night, September 23, and spoiled Eden's homecoming by defeating the Bulldogs 28-0 in Bulldog territory. Both the offense and defense had strong games.

Offensively, the Buffs had 308 total yards (261 rushing and 47 passing) earning them 23 first downs and 4 penetrations into the Bulldog 20 yard line. Leading this week again in rushing yardage was Jimmy Lee (Senior) with 15 carries for 118 yards and 1 TD. Be-I know the ex-students who were in hind him was Cole Gilliam (Senior) with 20 carries for 102 yards and 2 TDs. Jody Fortune (Freshman) had 7 carries for 52 yards. Walker had a 62 percent completion rate in his passing game being successful in 5 of 8 attempts with no interceptions. Receiver Mau Reed (Senior) caught 3 passes for 24 yards and Lee caught 3 for 23 yards.

Defensively, the Buffs looked good also. They held Eden to a total of 116 yards (79 rushing and 37 passing). Eden made 8 first downs and had only 2 penetrations.

Showing strong defensive effort was Lec with 6 solo tackles, 4 assists and one recovered fumble. Reed had 3 solo tackles, 3 assists, caused 1 fumble, and was credited with 1 sack. Porcious Potter had 4 solo tackles and led the assists with 9. Sean Jones had 5 solos, 4 assists and broke up one pass attempt. Mike Tollett (Senior) managed 2 interceptions thwarting bulldog drives.

Other defensive standouts contributing to the cause were J.J. Higgins, Miguel Mauricio and Willie Nickerson (who dislocated his shoulder early in last week's practice).

The Buffs scored in the 1st when Gilliam ran in for the TD. Gilliam also scored in the 2nd quarter. In the 4th quarter Lee scored and Walker scored. Switzer was 4 for 4 in the kicking department for the extra points.

When Coach Cord Woerner was asked to comment on the game, he said, "Great overall effort. I would really like to commend the offense line. You don't rack up 23 first downs and 260 yards rushing unless you're blocking somebody." The offensive line includes

Potter, Nickerson, Cory Switzer, C.J. Parham and "Quatro" Frank Davis, IV. Coach Woerner also had a positive comment about the defense, "The defense played a real solid game. They came up with 2 fumbles and 2 interceptions. Also they stopped 2 threats inside our own 20 yard line."

He went on to say, "The big difference, I believe, is that we are getting comfortable with the system and playing with a little intensity and poise. Turnovers have been a problem but we are working hard to eliminate them."

Even though the Buffs had a good game last week, Woerner is cautiously optimistic about this weeks game. "We have a really big challenge Friday, with number 8 in the state Robert Lee coming to our house (beginning at 8:00); but, we are beginning to look forward to challenges. District play begins the following week at Santa Anna."

The Buffs record at this point is 1-2-1.


# **Project Pride Busy** Making Plans For Christmas Village

The Cross Plains Independent School District and the City of Cross Plains are in need of additional playground and recreational equipment especially for handicapped children. The present equipment on the school campus does not provide such opportunities.

The Parent Teacher Organization of Cross Plains have developed a plan to install new equipment that will provide for safety and handicapped accessibility. Facilities to be installed include a inter-connected unit with surface provided for handicapped accessibility. specialized areas for the development of cyc/foot/hand coordination and balance, polyethylene slide 4' x 8' for smaller early childhood use, replacement of swings that meet CPSC (Consumer Product Safety Commission) recommendations also designed for handicapped use. This area will be enclosed and surfaced with Playsafe Protective Surfacing and Fall Saver Safety Cushioning, made of premium nontoxic rubber compounds that produce the best consistent protection against scrious head injuries available. # **Band Boosters** Make Plans For Cross Plains Homecoming




#### HORACE KING

Governor Ann Richards announced the appointment of William G. (Bud) Arnot, III of Abilene to the Texas Judicial Council.


He will serve a term ending February



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

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


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
